## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

## Final Network for 2013 - The Last for our 21 ${ }^{\text {st }}$ Year

This will be the final Network for 2013 following what has been a most successful $21^{\text {st }}$ year for our school. Many of the highlights were discussed at last week's Presentation Assembly. However, given the limited audience who were able to attend it is worth revisiting our achievements in this our 'coming of age' year.

2013 has been a remarkably successful $21^{\text {st }}$ year for this school. A year we celebrated in a variety of very positive ways including a marvellous dinner attended by over 200 people, full of good humour and fine reminiscence. This was followed by an Open Day with wonderful displays and archival photographs, allowing past students and their families to reacquaint themselves with Cherrybrook Technology High School. Other initiatives included a commemorative badge, designed by Thomas Choo one of our exceptional Year 12 students, which was provided to all students and staff, and a recently completed anniversary garden.

Earlier, the year began with a wonderful High Achievers' Assembly which saw 163 of our class of 2012 returning to the school to be honoured for their outstanding achievement in making the HSC honour roll, remarkably for a comprehensive high school this was nearly half the students who presented for the HSC last year.

Sarah Hay, a young engineer and a former Principal's Representative, gave a wonderful speech which ranged over many things including the excellent education she received at our school and the support Cherrybrook Technology High School students give to one another to achieve excellence.

And excellence is what the class of 2012 achieved with twenty two students achieving the top band in each of their courses of study - a new 'PB' for Cherrybrook Technology High School. We also had twelve students who were among the top 20 students in the state in nine separate courses of study, and 100 students scored an ATAR in excess of 90 with twelve scoring greater than 99.

In the junior years our students in 7 and 9 completed the NAPLAN tests and demonstrated that academically, they were well beyond the state and national average.

Our successes in sport were celebrated at Thursday's special Sport Assembly. Some of the major highlights of the year included:

- Awarded the trophy as the 2012 Sydney North Champion School for the third time in the past five years
- 2013 Ku-Ring-Gai Zone Champions
- Winning school at the Ku-Ring-Gai Zone Swimming, Cross Country and Athletic carnivals
- Girls' open basketball team finished forth in the State
- Girls' 15 's basketball team finished Champion School in NSW defeating Westfield Sport High School by one point in an absolute thrilling final
- The open boys' medley relay and $17+$ boys' $4 \times 50$ freestyle relay team won gold at the Combined High School Swimming Carnival
- Declan Pluim won a gold medal in the15 years high jump at the Combined High School Carnival
- Alex Nguyen-Ha won gold medals in the 15 years long jump and triple jump at the Combined High School Carnival
- Georgia Winkcup represented Australia at the Youth 2013 Oceania Championships in Hawaii winning a gold medal in the girl's U18 2,000m steeplechase
- We also had many other students who performed with Distinction at the CHS and NSW All Schools Swimming, Athletics and Cross-Country Carnivals, and in a variety of other sports.

In the area of performing arts we produced the outstanding musical Little Shop of Horrors and the recent MADD concert, both terrific shows. We also had students participating in Regional and State Drama and Dance Festivals, in eisteddfods, in the recent Schools' Spectacular as dancers and musicians and where the big band wowed audiences. We also had our ensembles delivering wonderful performances at the Royal Easter Show and Darling Harbour Central Amphitheatre as well as many other venues.

In the field of technology it was a year of planning as the laptop program came to an end. Disappointingly, this world-leading program will wind up at the end of this year as Government funds for the project are no longer available. Next year will see considerable change in the way we do things as students in Year 9 move to a 'Bring Your Own Device' model. Hopefully, this way forward will be successful for our students.

We also continued to promote our International Program with a marvellous Multicultural Day and a very successful student visit to

France, whilst the links with our Japanese schools continue to strengthen through our video conferencing.
Again in 2013 our student leaders did a great job and amongst other things led some very positive fund raising programs. These initiatives contributed to student morale and a sense of school community as well as assisting those in unfortunate circumstances.

Environmentally, there were some marvellous changes around the school with the construction of new gardens, additional outdoor covered seating areas and further development of our biodiversity area, with a pleasing focus on our indigenous heritage. None of this would have been possible without the help and support of students, dedicated staff and our committed P\&C.

Our achievements in 2013 were certainly diverse. And these achievements were accomplished by our diverse, multicultural student population who work so harmoniously to achieve these ends.

All students are to continue attending school until 3pm on Wednesday 18 December 2013. As in previous years a very brief assembly will be held toward the end of the last period of the day from which students will be dismissed for the summer holidays.

Students in Years 7, 11 and 12 return to school on Wednesday 29 January 2014 whilst students in Years 8, 9 and 10 return on Thursday 30 January 2014.

Throughout this year, every Thursday afternoon, a group of three or four Year 10 students and Ms Tager travelled to Granville Public School to tutor young refugee kids from Thailand, Sierra Leone, Afghanistan and many other countries.

At the outset, we were assigned a buddy whom we helped improve their literacy, numeracy and for some, their social skills. Along with academic activities, we also played board games such as Connect Four, UNO and Dominoes, which the kids enjoyed very much. Also, at the end of every term, both the volunteers and the kids engaged in fun and hands-on activities such as sport, dancing, music performances and crafts.

The primary school students we worked with were all so well mannered, enthusiastic and cooperative, so it was easy to form bonds with them. After a few sessions we realised that they are just kids, like we once were. As we farewelled some of our Year 6 students, we felt like parents anxious as they start a new life in high school. We wished we could have brought them back to school with us, so they can enjoy the level of education we do and succeed academically. They deserve it as there is no difference between us.

To reward the children for their efforts at the end of the year, each volunteer wrote a personalised merit award for their buddy. Handing out these awards was definitely the highlight of my time at Bright Sparks because it was wonderful to see the friendships made between the volunteers and the students as well as the kids' bright smiling faces.

I recommend this program to all Cherrybrook Technology High School students next year who are eager to make a difference because not only does this program assist refugee kids, it also helps us become more considerate and increases our awareness about the social issues present in our community.

I'd like to thank Ms Tager on behalf of all the Spark girls for driving us to and from Granville Public School every Thursday and for helping us out with the kids. Thank you for introducing us to this great initiative because it has been such a rewarding experience!

## Debating Report

During Term 4 all students in Years 7 to 10 participated in our Debating Competition, honing their thinking and presentation skills with class activities and debates. The most proficient debaters from each class were then invited to compete in several knock-out rounds culminating in a Grand Final for each year. The standard of debating in the final rounds was very high with students demonstrating an impressive ability to research and formulate an argument, to 'think on their feet' in rebutting the arguments of the opposing team and speak persuasively and confidently.

The Year 7 Final showcased the skills of 7E students, Sanya Dua, Elske Van Rooyen, Mariam Razi and Madeline Smith, who argued the affirmative case for the topic That we learn from our mistakes. 7C students, Ariana Farahani, Alicia Spencer, Cameron Korte and Paul Lim, ably argued the negative case leading to a very close debate and a difficult decision for the adjudicator. Both teams displayed outstanding preparation and speaking skills but the strength of rebuttal ultimately led to victory for the affirmative team.

In the Year 8 Final 8C students, Avarni Singh, Yasheeka Patel, Amelia Smilie and Chiara Strilakos proposed That childhood is losing its magic, and 8B students Amelia Craig, Hansika Muthukuda, Laura Heinrichson and Dillon McGrath forcefully argued against this proposition. The affirmative highlighted the increased sexualisation of children in an image-obsessed media and the reality of child labour. The negative acknowledged these problems but argued that they were not new and in fact child labour is less common than it was in the past. In a very close debate the negative team ultimately prevailed.

The Stage 5 Finals saw engaging debates on the topic That rice is better than rights. In the Year 9 Final, the affirmative team from 9A consisted of Anuradha Narayan, Ellen Cameron, Sidath Dissanayake and Patrick Phillips, and the negative team from 9K, Zali Mahony, Chantrice Graaff, Reynard Tay and Sachin Rajapaksha. Both teams presented an engaging and well-argued debate, asking What is more essential, meeting the basic need of food or the basic need of freedom? Ultimately, the affirmative team presented the stronger case and won the debate.

In the Year 10 Final, an impressive level of skill and maturity was evident. Students Shannon Monteiro, Kevin Nguyen, Vanessa Lesicnik, Michael Gunn and Bhavik Magan from 10H, ably presented the affirmative case. However, the negative team, Lakni Weerasinghe, Merle Runde, Cassandra Barberis-Leon and Kate Ye from 10J, argued their case with passionate conviction and in a strong finish emerged the victors.

Dear Parents and Carers,
Students have been given notice of footwear requirements over the past weeks and we ask parents' co-operation in purchasing the correct footwear over the school holidays for the start of the new school year.

The Department of Education and Communities Work Health and Safety Directorate, clearly states in the publication Footwear Guidelines (October 2012) that to comply with Government policy, enclosed leather footwear must be worn by students to ensure their safety. Areas where enclosed leather footwear is required are:

- Industrial Arts and Trades workshop areas
- Science laboratories
- Canteen
- Food Technology areas
- Agriculture areas

If students present for class with inappropriate footwear the student will be offered alternative educational activities.
The school expects that students wear black leather, shiny, business-conventional type, lace-up styled shoes. They must cover the top of the foot and have a small heel. Buckle styled shoes will be accepted as long as the shoes cover the top of the foot. The following shoe styles have been endorsed by the school community:

Students MUST NOT wear black leather joggers, black sports shoes, black leather skate shoes, black desert boots, black soft leather open styled 'Mary Jane' shoes, black fabric shoes or any similar styles to those listed.
