DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

It has been another busy week at Cherrybrook Technology High School and students appear to have settled in well. Year 12 has many assignments and assessment tasks, and those with major projects should be well into the construction and writing process. Next week Year 12 have their study skills program on Friday 21 February, and Parent Information Evening on Thursday 20 February in C2.1. This evening is a valuable night for parents to gain insight into study tips and ways they can assist their children in the lead up to the AP3's and HSC year.

A reminder also, that Tuesday 18 February, from 4 - 7pm in the MPC, is the Year 12 Parent / Teacher Interviews. Parents should book online to secure an appointment with their child's teacher. Included in this issue is a flyer with instructions on how to do this.

P&C Meeting

The first P&C meeting for the year will be held in the staff common room on Tuesday 18 February at 8pm, after the Year 12 Parent / Teacher Interviews. We are looking forward to meeting existing members and many new parents at the meeting.

High Achievers

One of the most prestigious events on the Cherrybrook Technology High School calendar is the High Achievers' Assembly, which celebrates the HSC achievements of the previous calendar year's Year 12. This year approximately one third of students had the opportunity to walk across the stage in front of Years 7,11 and 12, teachers and parents having achieved one or more band six's or having achieved an ATAR greater than 90. This year we again increased the number of students who received band six and the school is very proud of this tradition of HSC success. Congratulations to all students for such outstanding results and especially to Longen Lan and Grant Lian for achieving the top ATAR of 99.85. I have included a copy of Mr Johnson's speech which includes a summary of the students great achievements.

Mr Johnson's speech:

I'd like to welcome everyone to this most important assembly. In particular I'd like to welcome our special guests, Mr Matthew Szwec, today's guest speaker and the Stage 5 Representative of the Cherrybrook class of 2006. Mr Matthew Erskine, manager of our local Commonwealth bank, and our long-term sponsor of the prize for the student scoring the highest ATAR, and of course the outstanding students of Year 12, 2013 and their families and friends who have joined us here today.

Today's assembly is very important to our school and the local community. Personally, it is my favourite of the year. Twelve years ago when I commenced at Cherrybrook I initiated this assembly and hoped it would grow to become a major tradition within the school and community and one which students would truly aspire to attend. I must say it has succeeded beyond my greatest hopes and our students today see representation here as vital recognition of their academic success.

Some of you may know that a little over a week ago I appeared on national television as part of a panel to discuss the merits of public education. During the course of that interview Sonia Kruger (and boys if you think I'm name dropping at this point you'd be absolutely right) asked me why Cherrybrook, a comprehensive high school was so successful. My answer was that there was no "magic bullet" but in fact it is not one factor but a combination of many. However, chief among these were the wonderful students we have at this school. Students who contribute in a powerful way to a culture of learning, a culture of learning which in fact has gathered and continues to gather its own momentum. This involves high expectations, support of one another and strong support from the parent body, a great staff and a school which constantly promotes good values within an outstanding Welfare System and the celebration of student success.

Students present here today are in fact wonderful students who have continued this fine tradition in a most emphatic way achieving excellence, not just academically, but also in so many other areas of school life.

I certainly reflected on the many achievements of our students when I was asked to prepare for another question, which unfortunately didn't air due to time restraints. The question was: Private schools have influential social networks that are known to open doors for jobs after school. Does this put public school graduates at a disadvantage?

My response was I could only speak about the graduates of Cherrybrook. Given the school has only just celebrated our 21st year, our students have gone on to have great success in many, many fields with students becoming everything from NASA advisers to Hollywood stars (Jai Courtney) of Die Hard fame & Luke Arnold (class of 2002) who is currently starring as Michael Hutchence in the INXS mini series to leaders in IT, Mining, Journalism, Law and Medicine with one former student named as one of the 20 most influential young people in the country. So lack of a private school education has certainly not disadvantaged our former students, in

fact coming from Cherrybrook, a school which I've proudly said many, many times is the best in the land, appears to be an advantage.

I suspect that in years to come we will also hear of the successes of many our high achievers gathered with us today.

One of the really satisfying things about today's assembly is that it not only recognises our very high flyers but also affords an opportunity to recognise many students who have been quietly achieving throughout their school lives, students who, at any other school, would have been constantly recognised on presentation evenings, but due to the huge competition at Cherrybrook have remained out of the limelight but nevertheless successfully worked to achieve their goals.

Despite their application, students could not have achieved these wonderful HSC goals on their own. Their teachers, their Year Advisers and Stage Head Teachers must also be congratulated. The students here today have truly reaped the rewards of the dedication and effort of Cherrybrook's marvellously talented staff.

The final part of the students' success is to be found in the support and encouragement provided by the families of these young people in an often-difficult year.

And success is what this group has achieved. Chief among the many excellent performers were the fifteen students who achieved results, which led to each of them being recognised in the all rounders awards. These students are: Chloe Chan, Thomas Choo, Elizabeth Fuller, Aaron Harichandra, Daniel Koleth, Longen Lan, Grant Lian, Harry Lim, Jiamei Liu, Haleem Abdul, Christa Pang, Zac Pluim, Nivedita Rattan, Jessica Squires and Cathy Tan who each scored a band six (or the highest band available) in each of their courses of study.

We also had six students who achieved a top ten place in at least one course of study, these were: Ryan Burger, Chloe Chan, Daniel Koleth, Harry Lim, Rachel Tsao and Aaron Harichandra.

And finally a number of students whose works have been included in Major exhibitions by the Board of Studies these are Ryan Burger in designTECH, Elizabeth Fuller in Texstyle, and Joy Li and Jaimei Liu in Artexpress.

You know twelve years ago when I first read out the names of our high fliers it took about 20 seconds - now as you've heard it is substantially longer. Nevertheless I believe it is part of an important tradition that these students are recognised in this speech.

Apart from these very high flyers we also had many students who achieved results, which placed them in the top band of achievers in one or more courses. We had at least 100 students who scored ATARs in excess of 90, this means nearly 30% of our school's HSC candidature scored an ATAR above 90 including seven students with ATARs above 99 and 146 separate students, nearly half of our 2013 cohort, who reached the top band of achievement in at least one course of study - an outstanding achievement from an extraordinarily talented group of individuals.

While the recognition of such outstanding performances is the chief focus of today, this assembly also serves another very important purpose - that is, it allows our successful students to serve as role models for students still at school. It says to each student seated in the audience today that the school community values and celebrates academic excellence.

For the students in the audience it is a powerful thing to be able to recognise and in many cases know the students who will soon be on stage to collect their awards. For Years 7, 11 and 12 what this assembly should clearly demonstrate and say to you is this - that with hard work and the right attitude to your studies you too can be successful.

I hope this is something each and every one of you will take away from today.

If you haven't already done so, now is the time to set academic goals, both short and long term and work to achieve these, just as last year's successful HSC candidates did.

In closing, I would like to thank Ms Parsons and her team for the wonderful job they have done organising this assembly and on behalf of the entire school community I would like to sincerely congratulate all of our Year 12, 2013, high achievers on your success and wish you all the very best in your future careers.

NSW SCHOOL-BASED IMMUNISATION PROGRAM

Each year NSW Ministry of Health offers the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school – based vaccination program.

In 2014 the following vaccines will be offered:

- <u>Varicella (Chickenpox) vaccine</u> 1 dose for all Year 7 students who have <u>not</u> previously received Varicella vaccine or had chickenpox disease.
- <u>Diphtheria</u>, <u>Tetanus and Pertussis</u> (Whooping cough) vaccine 1 booster dose.
 This dose was previously recommended at 15 years of age. Your child will only be offered this vaccine in Year 7.
- HPV vaccine (Human Papillomavirus) a 3 dose course. The vaccine will be offered to Year 7 male and female students and Year 9 male students as a 3-dose course over the school year. Students who commence HPV vaccination in Year 7 at school but do not complete the course will be offered catch-up doses at school in Year 8.

Parent Information Kits will be sent home to parents/guardians. To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to read all the information provided, complete the Consent Form and return it to their child's school. Please ensure the child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Parent/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so in writing to the School Principal. The Procedure for withdrawal of consent is on the NSW Ministry of Health website at www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation

To improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses throughout the year where possible.

Please note that for HPV vaccine only, parents/guardians must record their Medicare Number (all 10 digits and the 11th number beside the child's name) on the Consent Form, as this is required to record the student's information on the National HPV Register and for female students only, link to the National or State Cervical Screening Program.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at the clinic. Parents / guardians should ensure that this record is kept for future reference and should not assume that their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this record of Vaccination.


CAREERS UPDATE

Please come to the Lecture Theatre of the MPC to listen to Barbara Griffin, a Macquarie University Professor, discuss the results of a study that she has undertaken concerning UMAT and the effect of commercial coaching on performance in the tests.

No matter what year you are in at school, you are welcome to attend the session and learn more about UMAT and the research that Barbara has been undertaking.

A/Professor Barbara Griffin is the lead researcher on a program of studies investigating the effect of commercial coaching on performance in the tests (UMAT and interview) used by universities across Australia for selection into medical degrees. The results, which have been published in national and international journals, indicate the importance of deciding whether or not to undertake coaching and revealed some unexpected long-term effects. Barbara designed the Multiple Mini Interview used for selecting medical students at UWS and that has since been adapted for use at other universities. She is also a principle investigator on the team examining the validity of the UMAT test in Australian medical schools.

PROCEDURE FOR LATE ARRIVALS

All students arriving to school after 8:40am *must* sign in at the student window where they will be issued with a late note. All late arrivals are required to have a note from their parent/guardian giving reasons for being late. No note results in a detention.

PROCEDURE FOR EARLY LEAVERS

If a student needs to leave school early, they *must* provide a note from their parent/guardian giving reasons for their partial absence. **The student must hand the note in at the student window before 8:30am** where they will be issued with a leave pass. They can then present this pass to their teacher and leave school at the appropriate time

On Thursdays (sport days) all students in Years 9-11 must have their early leave notes signed by a member of the PE staff before presenting to the office.


Hillsbus Proposal
