DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Welcome Back and Staff Development Day

Welcome back to Term 3, the final term for Year 12 and 11, as well as the beginning of new Stage 5 semester courses. It is hoped all students had a restful and regenerative holiday and have returned to us ready to face new challenges having set positive goals for the rest of the year.

On Monday, staff participated in a day of intensive professional learning. The focus of the whole school sessions was on building resilience in students and supporting students who are struggling in the classroom. Sessions included an overview of the Rock and Water Resilience program which currently runs for Years 7 and 8. The aim of this session was to increase staff knowledge and share the language of the Rock and Water program enabling teachers to send the same message to students regarding when to stand firm and

when to negotiate.

We also had a session from the Learning Support Teachers on the best ways to deal with struggling students. This was supported by a proficiency rubric where teachers can set their own professional goals to improve their knowledge and practice of assisting students. This professional learning will be ongoing for Semester 2 and is part of the school focus for 2014.

Another way of supporting students and using technology to provide immediate feedback, was shared by Mr An. Some teachers have already designed lessons using the Audio Response System which Mr An presented, to trial with their classes. A very important session was on the introduction of the Professional Teachers Standards and how to maintain a professional learning log. This session was to ensure CTHS teachers are ready for the implementation of the standards in 2016. Teachers also participated in faculty groups to program and prepare for the implementation of the National Curriculum in 2015 for Years 8 and 10, in the subjects of English, mathematics, science and history. Other optional sessions included 'using Google docs'. The GATS team met to prepare for the 7T and 8T projects for 2014. It was excellent so many of our new teachers were key presenters sharing their expertise and passion with their colleagues and overall, it was a very successful day.

Celebrating NAIDOC

On Wednesday, Cherrybrook Technology High School students celebrated NAIDOC with an assembly held over two periods in the MPC. The assembly was expertly run by Year 10 and Year 11 students from the Accelerated Aboriginal Studies classes. The agenda included an explanation of what NAIDOC is, when it runs and why we celebrate it. The theme for 2014 is 'Serving Country' and the role of Indigenous service men and women was explained and recognised. One Year 10 student and two Year 12 students shared extracts from their projects. Also included was a summary of everything CTHS does to recognise the Indigenous heritage of our area and promote a positive attitude towards Indigenous culture. This includes the Poles and Murals projects which adorn the frog pond area, the Bush Tucker Garden in the same area, annual assemblies for Sorry Day and NAIDOC, Individualised plans for all Aboriginal students, Teacher training in the 'Caring for Country' inservice, the accelerated Aboriginal Studies program, as well as having a curriculum which is inclusive of Aboriginal content and culture. The assembly ended with Stasia Hendrawan's project theme, which asks us to look beyond the deficit model and think about the contribution Aboriginal people have made to Australia in the past and today.

Showcase

In the final week of Term 2 the CAPA faculty held its annual Showcase which highlighted the talents of many of our musicians and singers and gave Year 12 a performance opportunity as they prepare for their HSC. During this Showcase we also farewelled Mr Dollin, who has successfully led and grown the Cherrybrook Technology High School Concert Bands for the past few years. The String Ensemble presented an harmonious version of 'Let it Go' from the recent Disney release, 'Frozen', and the new look Choir and Vocal Ensemble gave their first official CTHS performance. The audience was entertained with their renditions of a Black Eyed Peas medley, 'Rumour Has It', and 'Someone Like You'. The Guitar Ensemble presented the biggest line up of guitars CTHS has ever seen with their excellent tribute to Led Zepplin. Some of the Year 12 students who wowed us with their performances, included the piano expertise of Annie Tan, playing 'Hungarian Rhapsody' (one of my personal favourites) and Grace Liao's beautiful version of 'Frangipani'.

There were many singers, showing the diversity and talent of our students, including Inika Dongre who usually leads the Big Band and Lois Kim who made her debut accompanied by the Big Band. Overall, it was a great evening which was well supported by the CTHS community. Thanks go to all the performers, CAPA and especially to the supporting staff whose help was much appreciated running so close on the heels of the school musical.

The aim of the workshop was to help students from different schools to work together to research, conduct experiments and ultimately present a five minute PowerPoint presentation on whether the surrounding environments were suitable enough for Long-Nosed Bandicoots to thrive in.

Although it rained on the first day, we were unfazed underneath our colourful ponchos. We were quick to make friends with the other schools and were put straight to work under the guidance of Peter Ward, a retired lecturer in Environmental Science from the University. We were able to learn a plethora of information regarding scientific experimentation and organising results which will certainly help us out in our HSC. Our personal favourite was the field study where we used a GPS and compass to navigate to our location, before getting our hands dirty with soil pH testing, lux meter readings and setting pit fall traps to capture invertebrates. Measles, Mumps and Rubella High School-Based Catch-up Vaccination Program 2014

Many teenagers and young adults are catching measles, especially while travelling abroad or from someone who has brought the disease into Australia from overseas.

Who is at increased risk?

Teenagers and young adults are at higher risk of measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) because many of them missed one or both of their routine MMR vaccinations as infants and/or the second dose of MMR vaccine was not included on the National Immunisation Schedule during their childhood.

Up to two in five students are not fully vaccinated against measles, mumps and rubella (MMR). Teenagers and young adults are also likely to travel for schoolies or other holidays to countries where measles is more common, including Thailand, the Philippines and Bali.

NSW Health has identified a need to offer a high school-based catch-up MMR vaccination program in a number of selected NSW high schools.

What can you do?

Our school has been identified as possibly having a high number of students who have not received MMR vaccination. Two doses of MMR vaccine provide life-long immunity. The local Public Health Unit will be offering one dose of free MMR vaccine to students in **Years 9 and 10** starting in the 2014 third term. Parent Information Kits have been sent home and parents should:

- Read the information provided
- Check your child's vaccination records
- Complete the consent form if you would like your child to be vaccinated and return the signed consent form to school.

Parents can check your child's immunisations in their Blue Book or ask your GP. If parents are unsure or unable to find their child's records, it is safe for your child to receive another dose of MMR vaccine.

After vaccination, a Record of Vaccination will be given to children and parents should inform your GP that MMR vaccine has been given. If this is the child's first dose of MMR vaccine, you should contact the GP to arrange for your child to receive a second dose of free MMR vaccine in four weeks' time.

What is measles?

Measles is a very infectious virus that is spread by coughing and sneezing and causes fever, cough and a rash. Measles is often a severe disease that has complications such as middle ear infection, lung infection, and diarrhoea. Measles infection during pregnancy can cause in miscarriage and premature delivery. Brain inflammation can result in permanent brain damage.

What is mumps?

Mumps is an infectious disease causing swollen neck glands and fever. One in five male teenagers/ adults with mumps develops inflammation of the testes. In females, mumps infection in the first three months of pregnancy may cause miscarriage. Mumps can sometimes cause fertility problems, permanent deafness and brain inflammation.

What is rubella?

Rubella, also known as German Measles, is an infectious disease causing rash, fever and swollen glands. A number of patients develop bruising or bleeding and many develop brain inflammation. Infection in the first three months of pregnancy will result in nine out of ten babies having a major congenital abnormality, such as deafness, blindness or heart defects.

Why is vaccination important?

MMR vaccine is safe and has been used for over twenty years. Any link between MMR vaccine and autism or other health conditions has been disproven by many studies and experts.

If your child is in Year 12 and you are concerned about the timing of the vaccination clinic and your child's performance in the HSC trials/exams, you can take your child to the GP to be vaccinated at a later date. It is important to ensure your child is fully vaccinated for MMR before he/she travels overseas and/or enrols in a higher education health course.








PROCEDURE FOR SICK STUDENTS
