Under the Waves

When you dive into an ocean, you're diving into a new world. Your vision is tinted blue, and the vibrant colours of land are lost to dimmer shades of dying coral. Flares of brightly coloured fish flash in your peripheral vision, peeking out from waving sea anemones. Within the ocean lies the allure of the unknown, shackled in mysterious depths and ancient stromatolite formations. The waves lap and rush overhead, but you are untouchable. You start running out of air and to avoid breaking the tranquil ambience, you float upwards, allowing your natural buoyancy to push you to the ocean's surface.

You're back in the light, squinting against the glaring sun. It's cold now and the chilly wind rips through your dripping body. You want to stay longer, dive back into the ocean and remain weightless until the sun disappears over the horizon. But you can't. Your parents wait on the shoreline, holding your towel and waiting. You trail your fingers across the water, and you leave it behind.

You anticipate returning to your little slice of heaven. You're eager for the foaming white caps to lap against your feet. Eager for the salty tang in the air and that sense of awe the ocean evokes in you. Your mind drifts as your parents words dance past, the meaning of them lost to you as you dream of your familiar friend. You ponder why you are so attached to crashing waves. You're not sure, but you know you miss it.

The night passes slowly, and you toss and turn until day breaks. You dress quickly and run past early morning joggers and bounding dogs keeping pace. Past the bakery and its smoking chimney, the smell of bread drifting through the open door. A breath of sea air enters your lungs, and you can breathe again. You're getting closer. Boat-towing cars drive past, tooting playfully at old friends. The town is waking up, the close-knit community resuming its daily duties. The deep blue fills the horizon, and you've made it. Your feet touch sand and you lunge forward, sending landslides of debris cascading down sand dunes. The water is within metres, so the flip-flops fly off, dropping beside your abandoned towel.

Then you're underwater and you're ethereal again. Your eyes sting for a moment, but they adjust quickly. You swim along the reef, watching for jellyfish or stingrays. Then you realize why you are so intent on visiting the ocean. The ocean follows no scientific laws or human countenance. It is untouched by any consuming desires other than to simply be, and to heed the moon's call. It roars and creeps up the sandy beaches. It hungrily swallows coves, unmerciful and unforgiving, it takes. Light itself bends to the mighty sea's power, refracting as it filters through the turbulent surface, and mists through the currents. Gravity has no hold on the ocean, and you float suspended in the watery medium.

You can't help but be intrigued by the expanse of the ocean. It represents that there are no limitations or boundaries. You can't imagine the deepest canyons and seafloors of the oceans, so deep it hasn't been explored and is in darkness. Animal species lie in wait at the bottom of these pits, unknown to humanity. The ocean tells us that there is always something left to discover. It speaks volumes of the mysteries that shroud Earth and even simply, possesses a wild beauty. Untamed rollers rake coves and harbours before retreating back into itself.

Your lungs start to burn and you climb up to the surface, another lungful of needed air. Children play in shallower waters or build sandcastles on the white shore. Other swimmers wear snorkel masks and idyllically paddle, observing the marine life. You take another breath and go under again. It's easy to lose track of time underwater. Your time is only divided by the frequent breaks to the surface for oxygen.

A shadow moves in your vision, too far away to make out what it is. It moves closer, unperturbed by your presence. It becomes clearer, until its hard shell is visible. Its four flippers move smoothly in the water. The turtle swims like a bird flies, graceful limbs moving in a flapping rhythm, completely coordinated. The turtle's lined face boasts of its timelessness, life untouched by its struggle to live since birth. It doesn't evaluate you back, instead it dips between coral and glides along the sea floor. It swims out of view, following the slight current.

The ocean teaches you not to fear the unknown, but to discover it. To grow past any personal doubts or inhibitions, the ocean is larger than you, as you are larger than any worries or uncertainties. Rising to the surface, you hear your parents call and you sigh, moving away from the tantalizing ocean. Sand clings to your feet as you head towards your waving parents. They look at you and smile, and you feel warm in a different way. You know you'll make it through another night away from the briny deep, and you'll be back tomorrow.






Incredible Machines

Engineering mechanics are at their best in CTHS. Despite a short time-frame, Year 9 students managed to create incredible machines (Rube Goldberg style) which go well beyond what was expected of them, creating intricate machinery out of timber. Students utilised gears, pulleys, cams, cranks, pivots and levers, with either precise calculations or a trial and error approach (usually the latter), to various degrees of success. Their task was to design the mechanical system to transfer energy from the initial input, through three different mechanical stations, all in order to pop a balloon sitting at the end of the mechanism. There was a lot of tweaking, frustration and cutting the losses. With some teams biting-off a bit more than they could chew, but in the end, the devices looked and/or performed amazingly.

Smart and Skilled Information for school leavers

Leaving school and thinking about vocational training?

From 1 January 2015, Smart and Skilled will give you the chance to gain the skills you need to get a job and advance your career. Under Smart and Skilled you can choose the training qualification and approved training provider that best suits your needs.

Smart and Skilled offers choice

Choose your training

Eligible school leavers can enrol in government subsidised courses up to and including Certificate III. Higher level qualifications (at Certificate IV and above) may also be available in targeted priority areas. Courses that help improve your reading, writing and numeracy are also available under Smart and Skilled.

Choose your training provider

You can choose to go to TAFE NSW or another approved private or community training provider.

Choose your own career pathway

There are many pathways to a successful career. Smart and Skilled offers you a range of options to help you choose your own career pathway.

For example, you can:

enrol in a Smart and Skilled course to help you find a job. Smart and Skilled courses receive

government funding because they help people get relevant job skills

- do an apprenticeship or traineeship that combines employment and work-based training with formal training to help you build your career
- choose a higher level course to increase your skills and advance your career prospects. All Smart and Skilled qualifications are nationally recognised and supported by employers and industry
- complete a qualification that provides an alternative pathway into university or further studies.

Who is eligible for Smart and Skilled?

You are eligible for Smart and Skilled training if you:

- are an Australian citizen, permanent resident, humanitarian visa holder or a New Zealand citizen
- are 15 years or older
- have left school
- live or work in NSW
- do not already have a Certificate IV or above.

Which qualifications are available?

A wide range of Smart and Skilled courses are available, including:

- Foundation Skills courses (Certificate I and Certificate II courses)
- entitlement courses up to and including Certificate III
- all apprenticeships and selected traineeships, and
- higher level courses (Certificate IV, Diploma and Advanced Diploma), subject to funding availability.

If you are not ready to do a full qualification you may be eligible for pre-vocational training which will help you access a full qualification at a later date. Further details will be released in 2015.

Please see the 2015 NSW Skills List (www.training.nsw.gov.au/smartandskilled/nsw_skills_list.html) to find out what courses are subsidised under Smart and Skilled in 2015.

How much will a course cost?

Smart and Skilled fees vary depending on the course you study. This reflects differences in the cost of training and the course level. In general, lower level courses have lower fees.

If you have a VET in Schools qualification it won't affect your eligibility for Smart and Skilled or the fee you pay.

- Your choice of training provider doesn't affect the fee you pay for any course.
- Student fees are set for the whole qualification, not year-by-year.
- Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander students, students with a disability, and students who are Commonwealth welfare recipients or dependents of recipients will be eligible for fee concessions or exemptions.
- Students undertaking Diploma and Advanced Diploma courses (and a limited number of Certificate IV courses) will be eligible for VET FEE-HELP (a loan covering the cost of the course).




