Term 4 in full swing

Staff are also busy planning for 2015, preparing for the introduction of new courses and organising a most complex timetable housing over 5,000 periods across a two-week cycle, as well as teaching courses and participating in other important tasks and programs.

After six years of secondary school and a final twelve months of intense HSC study, students appeared to be ready to tackle the challenge of these most important exams. Hopefully, when the results are released in December, they will reflect this hard work and preparation.

Social Justice Club Cook for Good

A recent Social Justice initiative involved 46 Year 10 and 11 students, travelling by train to Bondi Junction to volunteer in the *Cook* for *Good* program at the community kitchen, *Our Big Kitchen*. *Our Big Kitchen*'s mission is to bring the community together through food in times of crisis and celebration.

The entire purpose of the initiative was to learn more about those less fortunate than us, specifically the homeless. After a debrief about what homelessness means, we were asked to slice, dice and chop a variety of vegetables, such as onions, carrots, capsicums and the like. Though this involved some tears from the onions (and more than a handful of bandaids) it was definitely a lot of fun and very rewarding, especially once I realised just how much we had managed to chop in less than an hour!


After this, we were given cookie dough and cutters, and asked to create different shaped cookies. We made over 700 cookies which were later delivered by a 'clown doctor' to sick children in hospitals throughout Sydney. This was an amazing effort and goes to show how a group of less than fifty students can make such a big a difference. We also filled 102 plastic containers with spaghetti bolognaise and 140 containers with fried rice. Considering there are millions of Australians who go for days without food, 242 meals may not seem like much, but it certainly made a huge impact on many lives. It's a nice feeling knowing you have done something selfless and really upheld the Social Justice motto of *Thinking Global, but Acting Local*.

After we left *Our Big Kitchen*, we travelled to *Rough Edges*, which is a centre for the street community of Darlinghurst and Kings Cross, and is run by St John's Anglican Church. Here we met a man who suffered HIV, homelessness, poverty, tuberculosis, meningitis and memory loss and yet, stood before us and spoke confidently about his challenging life experiences. This is truly a testament to how strong-willed and how amazing he truly is. It was certainly an eye-opening experience and I feel that, as people who live relatively privileged lives, we often forget there are others suffering and fighting battles. The entire experience definitely broadened my horizons and those of all who attended. I hope there will be other opportunities to participate in a similar program in the future.

The Social Justice Club meets every Wednesday in the open area of A block during the first half of lunch. Please come along so you too can experience wonderful opportunities like this in the future. University Scholarship Opportunity

The 2015 C.A.S. Hawker Scholarships opens on Monday 8 December 2014 and closes on Friday 2 January 2015. The scholarships are available to all Australian students. The majority have been awarded to students entering their first year of university study.

The C.A.S. Hawker Scholarship is one of the most generous privately funded scholarships available to undergraduate students in Australia. Each residential scholarship is valued at up to \$45,000 over three years. Selection is largely based on personal qualities and demonstrated leadership as well as academic ability. Undergraduate Hawker Scholars are able to attend a range of Australian educational institutions.

Science Jobs which Can Change the World

Want to make an impact on the world. Here is our guide to five jobs which can help you change things for the better.

Ecologist

Ecologists study the relationships between animals, plants, people and their physical surroundings. What qualifications do I need? The minimum qualification is usually a first degree in a biological or environmental subject such as ecology, conservation biology, environmental biology, environmental management or marine biology. Many employers look for postgraduate qualifications. Experience as a research assistant or a conservation project volunteer may also be advantageous.

Hydrologist

Hydrologists monitor, manage and conserve the earth's freshwater resources. They also monitor and analyse rainfall. What qualifications do I need? Most hydrologists hold a degree



in a relevant subject, such as geography, environmental science, civil engineering or mathematics. The Diploma in Environmental and Land-Based Studies may be relevant. Most hydrologists also have a postgraduate qualification.

Immunologist

Immunologists study the body's immune system and how it works in combating disease. They use this knowledge to treat and control a range of diseases and disorders, such as allergies, cancer and AIDS. What qualifications do I need? Doctors specialising in immunology will have completed a medical degree and specialist training. Many other immunology posts require a degree in immunology or a related subject such as medical microbiology, genetics or biomedical science. Some jobs, especially those based in universities, need a postgraduate qualification, such as an MSc or PhD.

Marine Biologist

Marine biologists study the plants and animals that live in the world's oceans. Their studies help us predict how marine ecosystems will cope with changes such as global warming, pollution, pressure from fisheries and tourism in sensitive areas. What qualifications do I need? Entrants for research posts need a relevant degree and usually a postgraduate qualification. Some entrants take a degree in marine biology or oceanography, although it is not essential to study these subjects. It is possible to do a degree in any of the biological sciences and then go on to specialise in marine biology with a masters or PhD.

Oceanographer

Oceanographers are scientists who study the relationship between seawater, fresh water, the polar ice caps and the atmosphere. Their research can influence industrial processes and government policy. What qualifications do I need? Entrants usually have a first degree in physics, chemistry, maths or biology, followed by a postgraduate degree in oceanography. For a first degree, applicants need maths and science subjects. Entry to a Masters Degree course is usually with a first degree in a science discipline. Almost all vacancies require a Masters Degree and, increasingly, employers are now looking for a PhD.




