Mobile Device Safety

In today's digital age it can sometimes be difficult to keep track of your child's activities on their mobile device. Occasionally staff become aware of students who are using apps or posting on sites which are inappropriate and potentially very dangerous. The school, however only has limited authority over this use and by working with parents, the school is able to assist in managing incidents of this nature.

Fortunately most operating systems have thought about this and developed some easy to use tools which can be of assistance. Apple, Microsoft and Android have all developed Family Sharing/Safety mechanisms which not only allows content to be shared by family members, it also allows for purchases to be approved by the organiser (even if they are free). This is particularly useful for parents of younger children who we

occasionally have to deal with, in conjunction with their parents, due to them accessing apps/content which are intended for adults and as a result potentially placing themselves in danger or at risk. To find out more:

Aboriginal Education Consultative Group Annual Awards

On Friday 13 March I was privileged to represent Cherrybrook Technology High School at the prestigious Aboriginal Education Consultative Group Annual Awards ceremony dinner held at the Savannah Function Centre, Taronga Western Plains Zoo in Dubbo. At this glittering awards night, Cherrybrook Technology High School Year 12 student, Shelley Aquilina, was honoured for her outstanding achievement as the highest performing Aboriginal student in HSC Aboriginal Studies in 2014. Shelley received the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards NSW President's Aboriginal Studies Award for 2014 in acknowledgment of her exceptional achievement in the HSC examination.

In her characteristically modest, but moving acceptance speech, Shelley spoke of her enthusiasm for the subject, the growth in knowledge of her Aboriginal culture, her particular interest in the area of Aboriginal people and mental health (which was the subject of her HSC major project) and her desire to make a contribution in this area in her future working life. Shelley received a beautiful glass trophy and framed certificate and required assistance to carry all of this, along with the accompanying magnificent floral arrangement, away! As a young person of great integrity and a strong and inspirational Aboriginal woman, Shelley is a most deserving recipient of this accolade and she represented her culture, her family and her school with grace and pride. Dear parents and carers

At our school we aim to create a safe and supportive school community for everyone.

Sometimes, it can be difficult for parents or carers to know what to do when their child talks to them about bullying.

You are an important part of our work to prevent bullying and to respond effectively if it happens. Stopping bullying involves everyone.

If your child talks to you about bullying:

 Listen calmly and get the full story. Your calm response is important to allow your child to tell you all about the situation. After they've told you their story, ask questions to get more details if you need to: who, what, where, when. Although you may feel some strong emotions about your child's experience, try to keep calm to avoid more distress to your child.

If your child talks to you about bullying:

- 1. Listen calmly to get the full story.
- Reassure your child that they are not to blame.
- Ask your child what they want to do about it and how you can help.
- Visit www.bullyingnoway.gov.au to find some strategies.
- 5. Contact the school.
- 6. Check-in regularly with your child.



- 2. Reassure your child they are not to blame. Many children blame themselves and this may make them feel even worse. You could say things like, 'That sounds really hard to deal with. No one should have to put up with that.' or 'I'm so glad you told me. You should be able to feel safe at school; that's not fair at all'.
- 3. Ask your child what they want to do and what they want you to do. A critical part of your response is to avoid jumping in to solve the problem. While it is natural to want to protect your child, helping them to find their own solution is a better option. It helps them feel they have some power in the situation.
- 4. Visit www.bullyingnoway.gov.au to find some strategies. The website has tips and ideas for different bullying situations. One idea is to practise strategies at home to help your child feel more confident.
- 5. Contact the school. Your child may be reluctant for you to do this, so discuss the idea and reassure them that the school would want to know and is able to help. Make an appointment to meet with your child's teacher and, if you need to, ask to talk with the principal. Contact the school immediately if you have a concern about your child's safety.
- 6. Check in regularly with your child. Keep the conversation going. It can take time to resolve issues, so check in regularly with your child about their experiences and their feelings. Your ongoing support is important.




Clean-up Australia Day


ICAS (International Competitions and Assessments for Schools)

ANZAC Display in the Library Foyer

As all are aware, the Centenary of ANZAC is fast approaching and at CTHS we are planning several events to commemorate this momentous occasion. Students will be interested to know we have created a display in the library foyer. It contains some important books and memorabilia relevant to the Gallipoli Campaign and to Australia's involvement in WW1.


The centrepiece is an original copy of The Anzac Book, edited by Charles Bean and written (and illustrated) by the men at Gallipoli as the campaign drew to a close in 1915. It was published and sold in London in early 1916. This copy belonged to Lieutenant Leslie Bain who fought both at Gallipoli and the Western Front. On his return to Australia, he was involved in curating the precursor to the Australian War Memorial which was situated in Melbourne before the establishment of the AWM in Canberra. His son, Geoffrey, fought in the Pacific Campaign in WW2 and grandson Vincent was conscripted to serve in the Australian army in Vietnam.

Around the Anzac Book is a full set of the Official History of Australia in the Great War, the first volumes edited by Charles Bean. The twelve volumes cover the Gallipoli Campaign and the Western Front as well as other theatres of war including Palestine and Rabaul. This set belonged to Warrant Officer George Hartman who flew with the RAAF in Europe during WW2.

I hope students will have a look at the display on their way into the library, not only for its historical value, but for what the contents represent. There will be more news to come regarding the planning for the Anzac Commemorations in the coming issues of *Network*.

The Mathematics KLA is excited to introduce MathsPASS (Peer-Assisted Study Sessions). This new initiative is a peer-tutoring program which exists for two complementary purposes: to support students who are struggling with maths in an understanding and encouraging environment and to provide an avenue for proficient mathematics students to help others and strengthen their own skills.


The benefits of peer tutoring are well-documented. Students experiencing difficulty are able to receive individualised support and guidance from students who have developed mastery of relevant skills and concepts in recent memory, and hence are immediately familiar with the initial troubles students face. The regular encouragement provided by a peer tutor can be decisive in helping struggling students to develop the perseverance and confidence necessary to make progress and gain a deep understanding of maths.

The gains for peer tutors are also significant. By participating in MathsPASS, tutors will:

- Consolidate their own learning through the practical application and explanation of their own knowledge
- · Receive training in helpful teaching strategies
- Practise and improve a broad range of aural and visual communication skills
- Hone their ability to convey complex concepts and processes in an accessible way
- Gain effective active listening and questioning techniques and
- Have their contributions recognised formally through the CTHS award scheme.

The Mathematics KLA is now accepting applications to MathsPASS, which will commence in early Term 2. Interested Year 7 students should see Mr Watson, Head Teacher Mathematics, in the main staffroom for an application form, which is to be filled out by students and parents and returned by Friday 27 March. 
Facts about UMAT

- UMAT is a compulsory test which is used specifically to assist with the selection of students into medicine, dentistry and health science degree programs at undergraduate level
- UMAT is held once a year usually on the last Wednesday of July. Students can repeat the UMAT if they were unsuccessful the
 year before
- UMAT 2015 will be held on **Wednesday 29 July 2015**. Registration deadline is 5 June 2015 at 5pm AEST. Late registrations will be accepted until 5.00pm AEST 19 June 2015, however \$65 penalty fee on top of the registration fee applies
- UMAT is available to any candidate whose educational level at the time of sitting the test is their final year of secondary schooling, or higher
- Students can register for the UMAT only via the ACER website
- UMAT 2015 covers the areas of Logical Reasoning and Problem Solving, Understanding People, and Non-verbal Reasoning.
 Students are given three hours to complete 134 multiple choice questions. Students will be provided with ten minutes reading time.

In 2015, students will need a UMAT score to apply for 2016 undergraduate admission to any of the following courses:

On the 3rd of March, 13 students from Cherrybrook Technology High School visited Interfab at Baulkham Hills. Interfab's General Manager Brett Kingham & Production Manager Matt Hampson, took students into the high tech, precision world of metal design and fabrication—to explore where over 70,000 items a month are produced.

During the visit, students were shown every aspect of the process, from initial design concept and inception on computers, to the laser cutting and welding of the product, through to final assembly. Students were shown laser cutting, welding, a robot assembling a product, machines that can run 24hrs a day without being manned and the inventory and assembly procedures.

At the end of the visit, students were challenged to create their own mini metal chairs from pieces that had been cut using the equipment they had just seen. 85% of students said they learnt about new jobs that they previously didn't know about, and 100% of students said they would like to attend another Industry Bites visit.

92% of students also said the visit had changed their opinions of the company and working in the business.
