


Wellbeing





Whooping Cough

With the cold weather setting in, we would like all parents to be aware that **whooping cough is highly contagious** and can be spread quite easily in a school environment.

- Whooping cough usually starts with symptoms like a cold, such as a runny nose and dry cough, which last for about one week.
- After that, a more definite cough develops, which may last for many weeks. The cough comes in long spells and often ends with a high pitched 'whoop' sound when they breathe in.
- Some children cough so much they vomit afterwards.
- Children are usually well between coughing spells.
- In more severe cases, babies and children may have problems catching their breath after a coughing spasm.
- Other infections such as pneumonia (chest infection) and middle ear infections are common.

If you are concerned about your child's health, please follow the department of Health's guidelines below:

- Children with symptoms should see a GP.
- If your doctor diagnoses whooping cough, please let the school know and keep your child at home until they have taken 5 days of antibiotics. Keep coughing children away from babies.
- Whooping cough vaccines give good protection against infection but immunity fades. If your schoolaged child has younger siblings, it's a good idea to check that they are up to date with their vaccines.

If your child is diagnosed with whooping cough, please notify your child's Stage Head Teacher.

Year 11 Biology Excursion

On Monday, Year 11 biology went on an excursion to the Field of Mars. Despite the cold conditions, everyone had a terrific time. We warmed up while climbing Sugarloaf Hill and carried out a transect to compare the biodiversity of plants at the top of the ridge with the plants along the fire trail. Plants were identified, abiotic factors were measured (and remeasuredand remeasured). We then walked through the bush down to Lane Cove River and around the edge of Sugarloaf Point, identifying animals and plants and working out the possible interactions between the organisms. A sunny spot was found to relax over lunch whilst making sure the worksheets were filled in correctly. After lunch, we investigated the abundance of crabs in the intertidal area of Buffalo Creek. We picked up crabs, counted crab holes and observed the growth and adaptations of the mangroves in area. This excursion, part of the Biology Preliminary Syllabus, was a great way to learn about our local ecosystem. An assessment task based on this excursion will take place during Week 10.


