### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

#### NSW State Principals' Conference

Last week I was one of over 300 Principals who attended the annual State Secondary Principals' Conference. The conference theme was 'Honouring the Past - Designing the Future', a very appropriate theme given the challenges that lie ahead as we move into a period of great change, challenge and opportunity.

As a Principal it is invaluable to be reminded of global perspectives and National and State agendas affecting education today. We had two international speakers, the most interesting of these was Professor Yong Zhao a Chinese born professor at the University of Oregon.

Professor Zhao spoke of the changing world and the worrying trends of youth unemployment, especially university graduates who were unemployed or under-employed, doing jobs such as waiting tables with an economics degree. He attributes this to the growing number of university placement for jobs that are narrowing or becoming redundant due to globalisation or mechanisation. His core message was for students to be taught creativity and be allowed a wide scope of experiences at school. He believes focusing on a deficit model of analysing what a child cannot do in NAPLAN is to the detriment of finding what they can do and nurturing that. While he did not present answers to how his creativity model might look like in schools, principals felt it was an interesting international perspective to consider.

The Minister for Education, Adrian Piccoli, also presented a keynote, outlining the reform platforms of the past four years and how the next four years should be a period of consolidation.

I also attended some interesting workshops and a 'table topics' session, where principals from across the state presented exciting ideas and initiatives to share. For my sharing session, I presented our recent work in the area of STEM and our plans to develop the teaching of LOTE with our partner public schools.

Following an exhaustive process which involved preparing a detailed Curriculum Vitae, presenting a prepared speech and answering a range of unseen questions in front of a large audience of parents, staff and students, our new school leaders for 2015/2016 have been determined. 

#### **Mathematics Year 11 Course Changes**

With the completion of this term's common assessment tasks in mathematics, students have now attempted two to three test papers in their respective courses. Their most recent papers should be returned for initial viewing early in Week 10 and then be returned to keep, by the end of term.

To ensure minimal disruption to classes, students are given specific windows of opportunity to complete course changes. Students who wish to change from mathematics extension to mathematics (2 unit) or from mathematics (2 unit) to mathematics general, have until Thursday 25 June 2015 to submit their completed Change of Subject form to Mr Watson. There will be no further opportunity to change courses in any mathematics course until after the AP2 examination period at the end of Term 3.

#### Taronga Zoo's Keeper for a Day

On Tuesday 9 June, I along with Nathan Clinch, Joshua Grain, Cameron Condor and Oscar Charlton, all of whom are involved in the school's Work Studies Program, were given a very unique opportunity to participate in Taronga Zoo's Keeper for a Day. This is a specially designed hands-on day for young people who would like to work with flora and fauna or in a job which means they contribute to the protection of the natural world when they grow up. Hosted by a team of dedicated educators, participants learn the daily routines and expectations of a Taronga Zoo Keeper.

On arrival we were met by Michelle and Del, both experienced Zoo Keepers and our hosts for the day. We were presented with our 'Keeper for the Day t shirt' and provided with information about the activities which we would be involved in during the day.

Our first task involved some hard physical work in the koala enclosure. On the way to the enclosure we picked up our tools, which included shovels, rakes, picks and wheelbarrows. We were then instructed to 'break up' the tightly compacted ground pavement in the koala enclosure with a pick and then 'refresh' it with new ground-up granite. This was hard work, but it was very fulfilling as we were working in the enclosure with the koalas. Even Mr Caccamo, who accompanied us for the day, was put to work shovelling and breaking-up the pavement!


We were then taken on a tour of the lemur enclosure and, just before lunch, we watched the amazing bird show. The afternoon session involved us participating in the zoo's animal enrichment activities. Firstly we were shown how to make 'food boxes' for the echidnas and chimpanzees. This took some skill and involved a great degree of creativity.

We then proceeded to the echidna enclosure and were given the opportunity to get up close and even touch these incredible and inquisitive animals as we gave them their 'food boxes'. We then had the opportunity to scan, touch and feed blue tongue lizards, turtles and ring tail possums.

For the final activity of the day we took the 'food boxes' that we had prepared earlier for the chimpanzee enrichment program to the chimpanzee enclosure. The Zoo Keepers then spread the boxes around the enclosure (this was done while the chimpanzees were locked in another section of their enclosure). Shortly thereafter the chimpanzees were released back into their enclosure, where they then enthusiastically and methodically collected, opened and ate the contents of the boxes, which included raisins, lucerne, special pellets, freshly made popcorn and Vegemite. They seemed to really enjoy it!!

Overall, a very interesting day which I would highly recommend to anyone who may be considering a career as a Zoo Keeper or any occupation which involves working with animals. On behalf of all the students who attended, I would like to thank Miss Kerr and Mrs Navarro for organising the activity and also Mr Caccamo who not only drove us to the Zoo, but also gave us the opportunity, at the conclusion of the program, to view some of the amazing exhibits Taronga Zoo has to offer.

The most borrowed young adult fiction titles are:

- 4. The Book Thief by Marcus Zusak (Australian/Holocaust)
- 5. Looking for Alaska by John Green (American/romance)
- 6. Percy Jackson series by Rick Riordan (American/fantasy adventure)
- 7. The Maze Runner by James Dashner (American/science fiction)
- 8. Every Breath by Ellie Marney (Australian/thriller)

- 10. Mortal Instruments series by Cassandra Clare (American/fantasy adventure).

#### **Titration Competition 2015**


On Friday 12 June, Ms Yang and eighteen Year 12 chemistry students embarked on a journey to the University of New South Wales for an interschool Titration Competition. The teams consisted of six groups of three, including Yuqi Zhu, Kevin Xi, Tyler Le Roux, Visakhan Vhythilingam, Chris Armstrong, Laymond Chu, Lakni Weerasinghe, Pragya Singhal, Trista Tao, Darren Lim, Michele Lim, Katie Lim, Bhavik Magan, Shashika Rupasinghe, Rashmi Dissanayake, Michael Italiano, Rushil Athavale and Jeffrey Bounpraseuth. Everyone had given their all in perfecting their titration skills, even sacrificing our precious lunch times for titration practice! Of course, we couldn't have done it without Ms Yang, Mr An, Ms Mello and lab staff, Anne and Gabbie, who prepared our chemical solutions and equipment.

The competition was held in one of the labs of UNSW's majestic chemistry building; everyone looked incredibly scientific and professional in their lab coats and safety goggles. A previous Year 12 student, Ricardo Lee, who had obtained a near-perfect score of 2 marks, came along to cheer us on and offer moral support. The next 90 minutes went by in a blur as we conducted separate titrations within our groups without communicating with other students.

While the results were being tabulated, we attended a fascinating lecture 'Glowing in the Dark' by Dr Elizabeth New, a researcher and lecturer at the University of Sydney's School of Chemistry. She passionately spoke about her research on fluorescence and its applications in medicine, such as the tracking of molecules in the body to better understand disease and genetics. She even showed us a sample of a molecule she created with a group of researchers, which glowed bright green under UV light. Finally the results were announced based on the accuracy of our calculations of the concentration of ethanoic acid up to four significant figures. Each individuals' deviation from the perfect score (0 mark) were added up to form the team score. A few of us had outstanding individual scores, which included Katie Lim (4 marks), Yuqi Zhu (9 marks), Lakni Weerasinghe (9 marks) and Visakhan Vythilingam (9 marks). One of our teams, which consisted of Michael Italiano, Rushil Athavale and Jeffrey Bounpraseuth, came sixth with a team score of 166. Yuqi Zhu, Kevin Xi and Tyler Le Roux came twelfth with a score of 281, while Darren Lim, Michael Lim and Katie Lim came thirteenth, with a score of 396. There were 30 teams entering the Titration Competition.

After that, we had lunch at the UNSW campus before heading back to school. It was a memorable and fun day, both as a learning experience and a chance to tighten bonds between friends and teachers. We strongly encourage future chemistry students to sign up for it!
















#### **WEEKLY SPORTS REPORT**


