Year 7 Study Skills

The focus for the Year 7 Study Skills is to help students plan better study routines. Uniform

At Cherrybrook we are always striving to maintain high standards and meet community expectations in all we do. Our school uniform policy is quite clear in that the expectation is for all students to comply with the uniform code at all times. This includes school sport.

Helping our Teens Remain Optimistic

A school priority area this year is to help build resilience in our students. I have recently read an article by Dr Justin Coulson and would like to share his research, as optimism has been found to be one of the most positive tools for reducing the dangers of depression.

He outlines seven strategies to help maintain optimism in our teens:

- 1. **Empathise** adolescents need to know someone is there for them who is at least trying to understand how they are feeling. They need to have their feelings validated.
- 2. **Emphasise 'yet'** adolescents often tell us they can't do this or can't do that. If we acknowledge their feelings then add 'yet', adolescents start to realise they will eventually be able to do the thing they currently find so difficult.
- 3. Steer focus to things which can be controlled adolescents often worry about things which they have no control. By emphasising and asking "what options do you have?" this can help them feel more in control.
- 4. Focus on the end young people need to know things do get better. Keep the end in sight as far as school is concerned, life after high school is great!!
- 5. **Emphasise strengths** try not to focus on weaknesses, but focus on what your adolescent is good at. They need to hear adults talking about their strengths, hearing these things spoken about when they are in earshot, but not being directly spoken to, is really helpful.
- 6. **Understand mindsets** inspire the teen brain to be optimistic by talking about brain plasticity. It helps to know that their brains change and how anything is possible for them. Understanding growth mindsets is an excellent start.
- 7. Avoid the superficial if a teenager feels miserable, being told to "buck up" is unhelpful. Listen with all your heart.

NAPLAN Online Trialling Study 2015

Following the decision by Education Ministers to transition NAPLAN to a computer-based adaptive assessment, ACARA has developed a comprehensive research and development program which will enable delivery of NAPLAN tests online in 2017.

The purpose of the Online Trialling Study is to trial an initial batch of online items to support the development of the 2017 NAPLAN online tests. The study will trial Numeracy, Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar and Punctuation in approximately 120 schools across Australia. A further purpose of this study is to evaluate testlet construction and the targeting of items to assist with further development and refinement of the tailored test design.

Cherrybrook Technology High School has been selected to participate in the NAPLAN Online Trialling Study. For the purposes of the trial, students in classes 7T and 9L have been selected to undertake the test. An information letter will be provided to these students and their parents/carers, explaining in more detail the requirements of the trial.

As a school we are pleased to be a part of this very important initiative as we start to delve into the realm of online external assessment of students.

The Partners in Learning Parent Feedback Survey

Running this survey will help our school understand parents' and carers' perspectives on their child's experience at school. These include communication between parents/carers and staff, activities and practices at home and parent/carer views on the school's support of learning and behaviour. This valuable feedback will help our school make practical improvements.

The survey is conducted entirely online at home or on public computers. The survey will typically take fifteen minutes or less to complete and is completely confidential. The parent survey will be conducted between Monday 17 August and Friday 16 October. Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary. However, your responses are very much appreciated. 'Pills, powders and liquids': Everything parents should know about ecstasy, 'ice' and other illicit drugs in 2015.



Lane Cove Council and the Family Referral Service present: The second in a series of two workshops for parents by Paul Dillon Thursday 20 August 6:15pm - 8:00pm Lane Cove Library

Paul Dillon - Drug and Alcohol Research Training Australia (DARTA) has been working in the area of drug education for the past 25 years.

About the workshop:

The workshop will center on adolescents and illicit drugs. Although alcohol continues to be the most popular and problematic drug used by Australian secondary school students it is the use of illicit drugs such as ecstasy and methamphetamine ('ice') that many parents are most concerned about.

Whereas alcohol may have been their drug of choice when they were younger, many parents have little understanding of a range of newer drugs. This presentation will provide information on some of these substances, including prevalence rates amongst secondary school students, harms associated with their use and the changes we are seeing in how these drugs are being accessed by young people.

Held annually during Engineering Week, teams of students from various schools across Sydney compete in a series of three tasks, which not only test their knowledge of physics, but also logical thinking, team work and time management skills. This year's challenges included building a bridge out of the least materials possible, constructing a glider plane and making a car, which was both light and practical. The day was helpful in allowing us to experience the industry first-hand, as well as including very insightful guest speakers, who presented speeches in this field.

Ultimately, Cherrybrook Technology High School performed exceptionally well. Chris Swanepoel, Victoria Gupta, Mark Lam and Min Soo Kim participated in the challenges and performed very well. Eduard Geyl, Leo Xiang, Winston Foo and Doris Che won the *Car Obstacle Challenge* and were placed second overall out of 50 teams. ICAS Science Competition

Australian Science Olympiad Exam 2015

The Australian Science Olympiad Competition is the training and selection process for top performing secondary science students, which culminate in the International Science Olympiads, the Olympic Games for science students. To earn a spot representing Australia at the International Science Olympiads, top performing Year 11 science students must first sit an Australian Science Olympiad exam in biology, chemistry, physics and/or earth and environmental science.

This year, ten students sat the biology exam, twenty students the chemistry exam, thirteen students the physics exam and one student the earth and environmental science exam. The exams are a great way to test the knowledge of scientific concepts and their application in contemporary context, critical thinking and problem solving abilities and skills of scientific inquiry. The results will be announced later in the year.

University Open Day Hints and Tips

Who can attend?

Anybody can attend Open Day and it's important to remember, you don't have to wait until Year 12 to go along. You might be in a lower Year level at the moment and just beginning to consider university in the future. This is a great time to get a head start on finding out more about higher education and the study options available. Open days are also a great chance for parents/guardians to find out more about their child's future study options.

What happens at Open Day?

Universities run tours of their campuses, have staff and student representatives from different courses and faculties to talk about what they do and have information available about all different study services. Among the presentations, activities, food and fun, you also have an opportunity to talk informally with students who are studying in the courses you are considering. Open days also give you a chance to soak up the culture of university life while you're still deciding your options for future study. While you are there, you can take the opportunity to ask questions about courses, facilities and your future plans, as well as exploring campuses, from teaching and learning areas to libraries, cafes, social spaces and accommodation.

'Must do' items to tick off:

□Visit the areas such as students support services and student lounges to check out what it's like to be a student. Does the campus feel like a place you'd like to belong?

Go on a campus tour and see what facilities and resources are available on campus.

Don't just talk to university staff: make sure you chat with some current students of the institution. They are experts on what it's like to study there, and have recently gone through the process of selecting and getting into their course.

Bring someone along with you. Parents/guardians are a great option as they may have information they want to find out too. A friend or other family member can also be helpful and make you feel comfortable making your first trip onto campus.

□Watch out for student clubs and societies who will be around on the day. These can be an exciting addition to university life and cover a huge range of interests, often creating lots of social opportunities and freebies.

'Must find out' items to tick off:

Different pathways into the courses in which you're interested.

□Any prerequisite subjects or tasks for the courses you're considering.

The time commitment of the course you're considering (how many years it takes to complete the course, how many hours per week will you need to attend lectures and tutorials, and do extra reading and studying, uni doesn't have set hours like school). What public transport and parking options are available if you are going to travel to uni.

UWhat accommodation is available if you are considering moving away from home to go to uni.

The facilities that are available at the campus. Libraries, cafes, banks, book stores, security services are all commonly found at uni campuses.

What questions should I ask current university students?

□Why did you choose to study at this university?

□What is it like living away from home?

What do you wish you'd known before you started studying?

□What jobs does your course lead to?

What are the best and worst things about uni in your opinion?


How have you found the course so far/what are the teaching/facilities/support like?
