PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



HSC Commences

An accessible well-constructed paper was the verdict of our students and English staff following the first of the HSC papers, which all students sat on Monday of this week. Students were, as expected, slightly nervous but also very happy for the exams to be finally underway. After six years of secondary school and a final twelve months of intense HSC study, I sensed students were well prepared and ready for these most important exams.

Following the first exam students were filmed and interviewed by Channel 7 and the report aired during the evening news. As always, our students did the school proud demonstrating very positive and thoughtful responses to the interviewer's questions. Hopefully, when the HSC results are released in December, my confidence in our students will be justified.

Stage 5 Performance Night and Year 11 Retrospective

The current Year 11 and Stage 5 drama classes will present a retrospective of this year's work on Wednesday night 21 October. This will be a great night of entertainment commencing at 7pm in the school's drama space, C1.1. All welcome.

Student Radicals and the Press

In the wake of the tragic shooting at Parramatta on the Friday before school returned, the Sun Herald (11 October) ran a story about how the students, who were becoming 'radicalised', were all from state schools. Chris Bonnor, a former Principal and President of the NSW Secondary Principals' Council, penned a response to the article, which I have included below. I believe it helps to put the newspaper article into perspective.

If you think that jihadists coming mainly from state schools is worth a headline (Sun Herald October 11) then here is another scoop: There are more redheads, nurses and footballers coming from state schools. All unsurprising, because state schools enrol two out of every three kids.

But there is more. Your story blames state schools and pitches religious schools as the solution to teenage jihadism. But the My School website shows that the kids in Islamic schools come from above-average socio-educational families. It would be hardly surprising if their advantages in education, employment and family circumstances didn't create some differences.

State schools enrol more of the strugglers who start from further behind - it is a tribute to these schools that their students overwhelmingly emerge as productive and valued citizens.

Your story quotes an expert who believes that religion may not be creating the current wave of radicals. So perhaps we should join the dots between the dangerous antics of disaffected youth and the fact that we increasingly concentrate them in disadvantaged schools?

French Study Tour 2015

'CTHS French Study Tour 2015' that's what it says on our jerseys, at least. In real life? I don't think you can really call it that. As a new Year 12 student I know the meaning of study and two weeks of fun-filled adventure isn't normally part of it.

Thanks to the hard work of our teachers Ms La and Mr Robinson, seventeen of us French students from Years 10 and 11 got the wonderful opportunity to travel to another country and experience both the tourist sites and culture first-hand during the September holidays.

To put it simply, it was UNREAL! The first day we went straight from the airport to a bus tour with a lovely guide and let me tell you, I wasn't sure if I was dreaming. There was the Eiffel Tower! The Louvre! The Arc de Triomphe! That day we also went up to Montmartre and the Basilique of Sacre Coeur and then back to our hotel rooms which were rather Parisian in terms of size; not that we spent much time in them. The next day we managed to fit in the Louvre, Champs Elysees, Jardin du Tuilleries and the Arc de Triomphe all in one day by "a pied, sans" lifts! I think we ended up walking something like 15kms...or was it 25kms? The river cruise at the end was very welcome, and very beautiful.

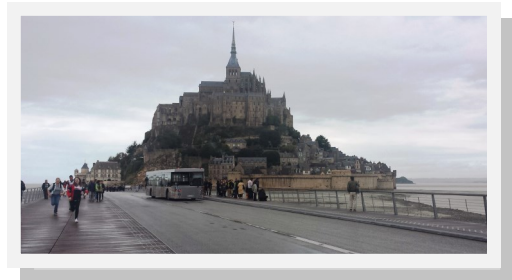
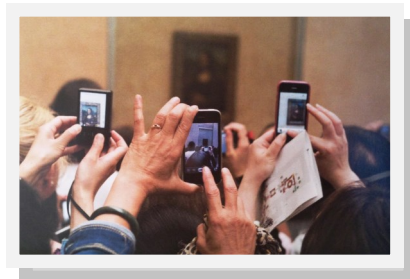
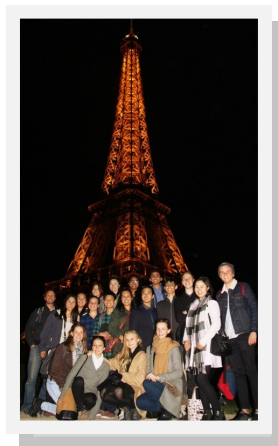
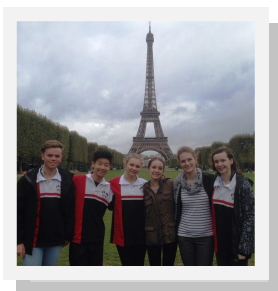
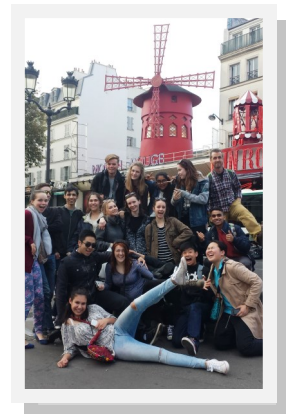
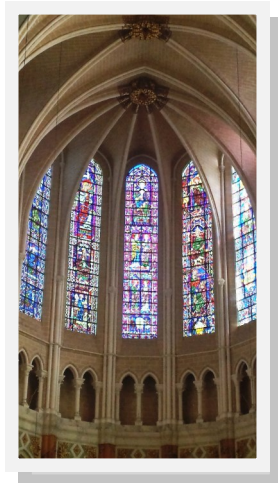
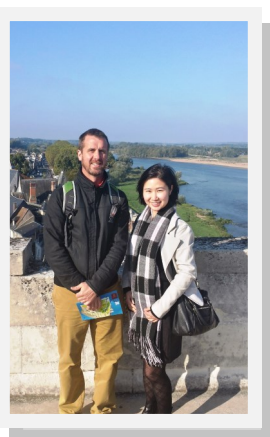
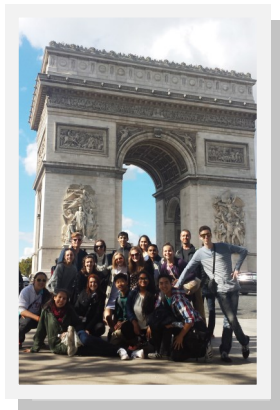
We also got in some substantial day trips, first to Mont St Michel (which essentially looked like a medieval hillside town had been transplanted onto the mudflats of Normandy) and then to le Chateau de Versailles, which was rather large and crowded too (although not by metro standards!) Both were insanely beautiful. But it wasn't all just Paris, of course. Next up was a five-day stay in Tours, a small city around three hours from Paris by bus. Only this wasn't in a hotel, it was with a family, a *French* family. For most of us English was no longer an option for the better part of the day, which made things interesting. During the day we attended L'Institut de Touraine, which is a language school. It was fantastic to learn phrases like "en ce qui me concerne". Our French improved exponentially.

I think one of the best parts of Tours was that at the start of each day at the language school, we all shared our stories, embarrassing mistakes and observations of how the French live their everyday life. It's amazing the bond you can form with people in such a short space of time and how much you can learn. It was definitely one of the most memorable experiences of my life and it was very sad to leave.

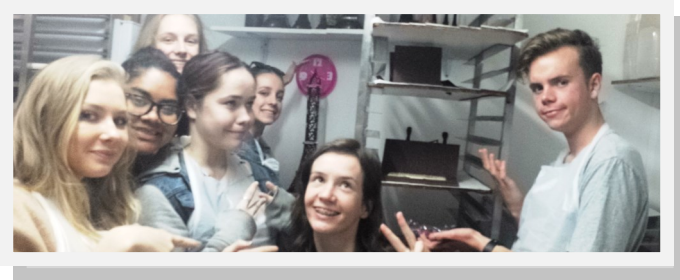
Just three more days before returning to Sydney, we travelled back to Paris, to climb the tower itself at night and sneak in a chocolate making course, a few 'interesting' dinners (escargots, quiche Lorraine, duck à l'orange etc), yet another impressive Chateau (Fontainebleau, this time!) and the Centre Pompidou, gallery of modern art before we left. And Euro Disneyland, bien sûr, despite the frequent 'technical difficulties' on more than one ride! So it was very sad then when we left, after sixteen days of the French experience in the wonderful land of baguettes and croissants. I think I speak for all of us when I say how *super* it was and how it went beyond our expectations. I look forward to saying *bonjour* again to France when I finish my HSC!

On Friday 9 October, the CTHS Mock Trial team, this time consisting of Ellen Cameron and Nikita Kapahi (barristers), Pei Wen Tan (solicitor), Natalie Windsor (court officer), Hansika Muthukuda and Laura Heinrichson (witnesses), set off to Gosford Chambers for the seventh round of the Law Society of NSW Mock Trial Competition. The winner would progress to the quarter finals of competition.

Our team was the Respondent in a family law matter about spousal maintenance. Mock Trial is judged in two ways: first in terms of the legal argument and second based on the mathematical addition of scores based on the observations of the magistrate.

We gave our best efforts but will not progress to the next round. Despite the fact that we won the legal argument by obtaining a verdict for less than the amount claimed, Green Point won the scoring 383-369.

We wish them the best of luck for the future both in this competition and internationally where they will represent Australia at an international Mock Trial Competition in New York.

This round of the Mock trial competition in particular, hosted in as grand and intimidating a venue as Gosford Council chambers, was a great learning experience for us. The Magistrate's feedback was as constructive and insightful as we have received throughout the competition.

Thank you to the school for providing us with a bus to get to Gosford, to Mr Gibbs for driving us, and to Mr Fernandez for guiding us through each trial and putting in the organisation that has not gone unnoticed.

It is great that we have improved in every trial we participated in. Mock Trial is a great experience and I encourage any interested year 10 and 11 students to become involved next year.

We are particularly proud to be the most successful Mock Trial team both in Cherrybrook and the North Western region as well as being the equal furthest progressing public school (including selective high schools) in the competition this year.

Grease is Definitely The Word!!!

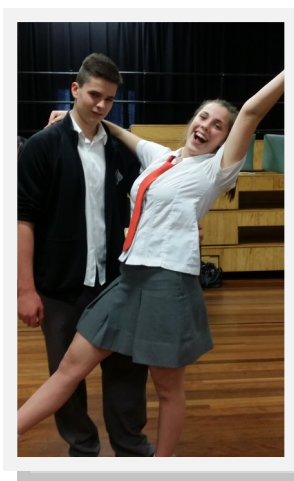
Brigitte Dalziel had this to say about the exciting process she is engaged in as our hit musical for 2016, *Grease*, continues to take shape:
