DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Chinese Study Tour 2017

On Tuesday evening there was a presentation by China Bestours (CTB), the company organising the inaugural China Study tour for CTHS scheduled for September 2017. In attendance were a keen group of LOTE students who are currently studying Chinese in Stage 5 and their parents. Details regarding the proposed itinerary were discussed and included a trip on the bullet train to Beijing to visit Tiananmen Square, the Forbidden City and the Great Wall of China. Whilst in China, the students will be attending classes at our sister school in Shanghai, Luwan Senior High School, and will be staying in a homestay arrangement with their designated Chinese buddies, with whom they will be paired. This trip will provide a great opportunity for those students intending to study the Chinese language course in Stage 6, to improve their language skills

and learn about the culture of an incredible country.

Science Week

The science KLA have been busy organising a range of exciting science related events to celebrate 'Science Week'. I was excited to see a presentation showing the wonders of Liquid Nitrogen which would have made world famous chef, Heston Blumenthal, proud! Bstreetsmart

All Year 10 students attended the Bstreetsmart event on Wednesday (previously known as the Youth and Road Trauma Forum). This event provides students with a realistic look at the trauma caused by road crashes, as well as information and strategies in an attempt to reduce serious deaths and injuries on our roads. The day includes a combination of realistic demonstrations and role plays, crash dynamics, rescue procedures and simulations of vehicle stopping distances. OPAL Ticketing Information for School Excursions

We have been informed by Transport for NSW that as of 1 August, all customers travelling inside the Opal network require a valid Opal Card. This will impact students travelling to destinations for school excursions via public transport. Please note, in these situations students **must** use their **own personal** Child/Youth Opal Card. Some students have a School Opal Card, which they use for travelling between school and home. These cards **ARE NOT** valid for travel on school excursions. Parents are reminded to ensure students' personal Opal Cards have enough credit on them to cover the cost of the school excursion travel.

Cyberbullying

I was fortunate to go to a meeting on Friday where a representative from the Office of Children's eSafety spoke. They have been given the responsibility of:

- Dealing with complaints about serious cyberbullying material affecting Australian children (under the age of 18)
- Investigating offensive or illegal online content
- Providing online safety education and training and undertaking research.

The Office works with social media services to quickly remove serious cyberbullying material. This is one area where schools receive calls from parents to help them with incidents involving their children. The Office has set up the following process on how to report cyberbullying material:

- 1. Report the cyberbullying material to the social media service
- 2. Collect evidence copy URLs or take screenshots of the material

If the content is not removed within 48 hours:

- 3. Report it to www.esafety.gov.au/reportcyberbullying
- 4. Block the person and talk to someone you trust.

Complaints can be made by a child, their parent or another responsible person the child has authorised to make the complaint for them.

The ever changing nature of the internet can pose challenges for parents who wish to keep on top of their children's technology use. While children might seem to be tech savvy, they still need a parent's guiding hand to help make sure their online experience is positive and safe. International Day

Dear Parents and Students

Cherrybrook Technology High School celebrates the diversity of cultures at International Day on Tuesday 23 August 2016. There will be food stalls prepared by students and parents to embrace this event.

Please be aware students with anaphylaxis and allergies will be participating in the International Day. Anaphylaxis is a potentially life threatening, severe allergic reaction.

The following guidelines have been put in place in accordance with the Department of Education Policy.

All ingredients in the food at International Day must NOT contain peanuts, tree nuts or any nut products. This does not include foods labelled as, "may contain traces of nuts".

As some students have anaphylactic or allergic reactions to other food types, all food being sold at International Day **must** have a sign next to it, listing the ingredients used in the production process. **This would include preparing the food wearing latex gloves.**

A copy of the 2016 ASCIA Anaphylaxis General Plan will be on display in the vicinity of the stalls. Please note students who have not been diagnosed with an allergy or anaphylaxis, could possibly have a reaction.

All students diagnosed with anaphylaxis must carry their own in-date Epipen with their ASCIA Anaphylaxis Personal Plan at all times. They will be asked to show these prior to and/or on International Day. If they cannot demonstrate both items they will not be permitted to participate.

Students should also be aware sharing food may lead to an allergic or anaphylactic reaction, as the ingredients may not be easily identifiable.

ASCIA identifies the symptoms of anaphylaxis as:

- · Difficult/noisy breathing
- Swelling of tongue
- · Swelling/tightness in throat
- · Difficulty talking and/or hoarse voice
- Wheeze or persistent cough
- Persistent dizziness and/or collapse
- Pale and floppy (in young children)

In some cases, anaphylaxis is preceded by less dangerous allergic symptoms such as:

- Swelling of face, lips and/or eyes
- Hives or welts
- · Abdominal pain, vomiting (these are signs of anaphylaxis for insect allergy)

All participants should contact a CTHS staff member immediately in an emergency.

HSC Drama Performance Night

Our annual HSC Drama Performance Night held on Tuesday night was attended by a wonderfully responsive audience made up of family, friends and staff members. The evening began with a piece entitled *The Arts*. Impetus for this work came from the apparent gaping absence of the **A** (for Arts) in the emerging push to place increasing emphasis upon the subjects which align more with the S.T.E.M focus of academic disciplines. It is predicted that 75% of future employment will be found in S.T.E.M related jobs. Erudite original thinkers will be required to tease through many perplexing conundrums posed by fast paced developments in technology.

Truth-seeking, open-mindedness, self-confidence and maturity, the capacity to deal with real-world problems which require open-ended discussions and foster inquiry-oriented experiments, are all elements which contribute to the development of critical thinking capabilities. This being the case, the acronym, S.T E.A.M, which places the importance of arts based disciplines and practices firmly within the equation, seems more than appropriate; it seems essential.

The dynamism of the collaborative process which, so often defines artistic endeavour calls upon ALL of the critical thinking capabilities previously mentioned. With the highest of all the higher order thinking skills identified as *DESIGN*, which embraces such verbs as compose, generate, invent, synthesise and *CREATE*, surely S.T E.A.M is the fusion which best promises the most balanced approach to the challenges which lie ahead for our young who must solve the many dilemmas that will demand innovative thought and judicious action.

The Group Performance entitled, *My Lord* mixed physical comedy with an intriguing plotline. When a reigning monarch becomes convinced that his grasp on power is slipping out of his reach, he enlists the counsel of his closest advisers. This work makes thinly veiled references to certain political leaders whose hold on power can be best described as tenuous.

Of our ten Year 12 HSC Drama candidates this year, eight elected to pursue the option of Individual Performance. Brendan Weal's piece entitled *Bootmen* made excellent use of his superb abilities as a dancer as well as providing him with plenty of scope for him to demonstrate his talent as an actor. Amelia Steven's comic piece, *Do You Think I'm a Good Actress*, profiled her unmistakeable prowess as a performer of considerable calibre. Amelia has an instinctive knack of knowing just how to land a well written comic line. Luke Smith's *Real Job* saw him play an aspiring rock star who tries to extract a bit more cash out of his long suffering dad so he can cut another record deal. Rachel Yong's work, *Mei Lin*, tells the true story of a Vietnamese refugee who overcomes the traumas she endured at sea and how she comes to find a new life in Australia. Eduard Geyl's monologue entitled *Biff*, plumbed significant emotional depths as we witnessed the pain of a son's efforts to confront and dissolve the long held phony dreams and expectations his father has burdened him with. Georgina Vaile was the shimmering and luminous serial monogamist bride-to-be in the piece entitled *The Happiest Day of My Life*. Unfortunately, all of her husbands have a curious habit of meeting with an untimely end. Ryan Ashtari gave us a portrayal of *Ajax*, as a disgraced hero. When the prize of Achilles' armour is awarded to another, Ajax's sense of shame sees him wrestle with the torment of this perceived failure. Jade Nelson's *The Mad Hatter*, took us into a Wonderland in crisis. Jade's unwavering conviction in this role was altogether gripping.

Georgina Banfield undertook to compile a Portfolio of Theatre Criticism. Her four finely crafted reviews focused on stage adaptations of well known novels. Jack Bainbridge designed a range of strikingly visual promotional material for Louis Nowra's play, *Summer of the Aliens*.

I would like to wish our Year 12 HSC drama students all the very best with their HSC drama performance examination which takes place next Friday 26 August. A focused group of talented performers and an all-round bunch of delightful students, they have worked hard to prepare for this big challenge.

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Northern Sydney Public Health Unit Adolescent School Vaccination Program 2016 Year 7 Reminder

When: Wednesday 24 August 2016 Year 7: Varicella Vaccine (Chickenpox)

Dear Parents/Guardians

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the School Principal or phoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic. Parents/guardians should ensure this record is kept for future reference and should not assume their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this Record of Vaccination.

On the day of the vaccinations, students are advised:

- To ensure they have breakfast on the day
- If they are nervous, to talk to their teacher (this could also include their Year Advisor, Stage HT, a chosen classroom teacher or Mrs Navarro)
- They will be given a record of vaccination by the nurse, which is to be taken home to parents (it may be required at a later date, eg when starting work/work experience or travel)
- To bring a book or ipod with them as a distraction
- After their vaccination, they will be asked to sit quietly for fifteen minutes for observation before returning to class.
