International Day

After more than 10 years collaboration between Health and Education in Hornsby and Ku-Ring-Gai Council areas we present to you our final newsletter. Many of the subjects dear to our hearts in Health are now addressed by the Department of Education and with ready access to internet and good sources of information the relevance of this newsletter has declined.

Health Promoting Schools: This is Your Life!

In the early days of this newsletter it was printed and posted or hand delivered to each and every local school with a covering note and a "anything I can help you with?" offer from the nurse. This was an opportunity for close collaboration between the local schools and local health services.

During this time there has also been a great deal of collaboration between Health and Schools to implement the Healthy Canteens Program, vision and hearing screening of students, asthma, anaphylaxis and emergency training for staff to name some of the major programs delivered

Our Final Health Message

Hand washing

Why wash your hands?
Keeping hands clean is one of the most important steps we can take to avoid getting sick \and spreading germs to others.

It is best to wash your hands with soap and clean running water for 15-20 seconds However, if soap and clean water are not available, use an alcohol-based product to clean your hands.

Alcohol- based hand rubs significantly reduce the number of germs on the skin and are fast

There are many different types of germs, such as viruses or bacteria. Germs can make people as viruses or obacteria. Detains can make people sick. You can get germs on your hands when you touch objects and when you touch other people. Once germs are on your hands, they can get inside your body through a wound or when you touch your eyes, nose or mouth. You can also spread germs on your hands to objects or people


