Year 7 Parents' Sleep Seminar

An intimate audience of Year 7 parents were privy to Dr Carmel Harrington's seminar on the importance of sleep for the health of our teenagers. Dr Harrington spoke about the growing problems associated with not getting enough sleep and the role bright light has in contributing to this. The teenage brain requires approximately eight to ten hours sleep each night in order to recuperate from the day's activities and maintain good cognitive functioning. Her recommendation to parents was to ensure their children turned off their devices at least one hour before bed to allow the brain time to prepare for a much needed period of rest. We thank Dr Harrington for taking time out of her busy schedule to speak with our parents.

Evacuation Drill

We took advantage of a break in the inclement weather to undertake an Evacuation Drill on Tuesday. Due to the building program, the exit point we traditionally used to access John Purchase Oval, has been significantly narrowed, which would prove to be a health and safety risk. The Evacuation Plan was, therefore, modified resulting in approximately three quarters of the student population and staff walking along the John Purchase Road footpath and entering the side gate of John Purchase Primary, in order to access the oval behind the school.

Everything ran smoothly on the day and despite the extra distance some had to walk, we were able to safely evacuate everyone within approximately ten minutes. A great effort to move such a large group of people in a short period of time. Our thanks to Mrs Bevan for her organisation of the event and for all staff and students for their understanding and settled approach to the drill.

Correct Procedure When Approaching Pedestrian Crossings

As you approach a pedestrian crossing or children's crossing where a School Crossing Supervisor is displaying a 'STOP Children Crossing' sign, you must **slow down and stop**. You may proceed when the School Crossing Supervisor no longer displays the sign in your direction or has indicated it is safe for you to proceed.



Stop signs may be placed at an intersection immediately after a pedestrian crossing. You must stop at the stop sign even if you have already stopped at the pedestrian crossing.

Please Note: If the road beyond a children's crossing or pedestrian crossing is blocked, you **MUST NOT** drive onto the crossing.

Lady Elliot Island 2017

During the second week of the April holidays, I along with sixteen of my peers and three teachers, visited Lady Elliot Island for our highly anticipated Geography field trip. As part of our Geography HSC, Mr Clements elects us to study the Lady Elliot Eco Resort as our *Economic Enterprise* topic and the Great Barrier Reef for our *Ecosystems at Risk* case study. Thus, the trip allowed us to experience the Great Barrier Reef and the resort firsthand.

It was an early start, arriving at the airport at 8am for our first flight to Hervey Bay, followed by a 30 minute flight over the Great Barrier Reef to Lady Elliot. We all got fitted for our flippers and snorkels and spent our afternoon on a glass bottom boat snorkel safari. Despite the unpleasant 3m swells and light rain, we all had a great time out in the water seeing lots of marine life, including turtles!

Later that night, we had the opportunity to watch the release of four turtle hatchlings make their way to the ocean - as unfortunately a clutch hatched on the night prior to us arriving.

Day two was our first full day on the island that began with watching the sunrise over the lagoon nice and early at 6am, foll owed by a walk around the island for some. Our first activity was a 'behind the scenes' tour around the island led by some of the islands staff that gave us insight into the process undertaken to maintain and run the island. On the tour, we looked into how the island produces its own power, the management of waste and how the island makes its own fresh water.

That afternoon, we headed over to the lighthouse for our second snorkel safari to look for Manta Rays. Today the swell was a lot calmer and making the snorkeling a lot more enjoyable. Unfortunately, we did not see any Mantas. However, we got to swim with more turtles and even saw some reef sharks. With nothing on the agenda for the night, we filled in the night by playing card games, pool, chatting and relaxing.

Our third day was another jam-packed day. To start the day's activities, we headed out to the lagoon with our poles for balance, for a guided reef walk. The reef walk, led by one of the island's marine biologists, enabled us to get up close with the coral and its creatures. Walking around the maze of hard corals and dodging the sea cucumbers, we spotted lots of marine life including sea stars, octopuses and fish. Following, we then headed out to the heritage-listed lighthouse and its small museum that gave us an insight into some of the people and past uses of the island.

After being amazed by the coral in the lagoon, many of us headed out on another snorkel. This was probably the highlight of the trip as we were able to get up close and swim with the turtles in the lagoon. To end our last afternoon on the island, we all watched the sunset over the reef before going on the island's 'ghost tour' to fill in the remainder of the night.

Our last day was another early start so we could fit in a final snorkel before breakfast. Before hopping back on the plane to Hervey Bay, it was time for some group shots to remember our trip and the amazing time we had.

Lastly, on behalf of the Year 12 Geography class, we would like to extend a big thanks to Mr Clements, who spent countless hours planning and organising our trip. We would also like to thank Mr Caccamo and Miss Nguyen, who also accompanied us. All seventeen of us are so grateful for these wonderful teachers who gave up their holidays so we could experience the wonder of Lady Elliot Island and explore the Great Barrier Reef!

Kaylee Kua (Year 7) to Represent Australia in Junior Rhythmic Gymnastics



















