PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



NSW State Principals' Conference

Last week I was one of over 300 Principals who attended the annual State Secondary Principals' Conference. The conference theme was *STEAM*; very appropriate given the challenges which lie ahead, as we move into a period of great technological change, challenge and opportunity.

We had a full complement of distinguished and impressive speakers, including Professor Fred Watson from the Australian Astronomical Observatory, John Bell, founder of the Bell Shakespeare Company and the Honourable Rob Stokes, Minister for Education.

Some highlights for me included Dr Clio Cresswell, who delivered an engaging evaluation on the teaching of Maths and presented research into new areas of measuring aspects of humanity, which will be important in future thinking. Her love and excitement for Mathematics was as palpable as her belief that everyone can love maths because abstract thinking is at the heart of who we are and it underpins our whole civilized thinking.

Following Dr Creswell, Leigh Sales enlightened us about the changing face of journalism with the rise of fast paced commentary and opinion-based news, at the expense of objective journalism. Despite presenting a bleak picture of the political implications for this change she also spoke of the core values of humanity, kindness, compassion, empathy and community that she sees and says is at the heart of so many stories she experiences.

As a Principal it was invaluable to be reminded of global perspectives and national and state agendas affecting education today.

World Refugee Day Assembly

I was privileged to sit in the whole school assembly on Tuesday, which was dedicated to the theme of World Refugee Day. My Murphy and his team from the Social Justice Group organised a wonderful presentation including guest speaker, Joshua Massaquoi, from the Australian UNHCR. Joshua spoke of his own experiences as a refugee escaping from his homeland Sierra Leone and the hardship and loss he has experienced. He also commented on his thankfulness of being accepted by the Australian people to bring up his children in a country where there is hope. The audience were spellbound by his story. Tuesday 20 June was World Refugee Day. There are currently 65.3 million forcibly displaced people in the world. Refugees flee their homes due to persecution, violence, war or natural disaster. Students from the CTHS Social Justice Group worked together to organise the main school assembly and provide items for the two year group assemblies. Their goal was three fold: Inform the audience about the global refugee crisis, help the audience develop empathy for refugees and provide them with practical advice on what they could do to help, such as the *World Vision 40 Hour Backpack Challenge*. In the main assembly, the audience watched a film by the UNHCR, *What They Took With Them,* exploring what refugees take with them when they flee and what they leave behind. The guest speaker, Mr Joshua Massaquoi (pictured), from the humanitarian aid agency, *Australia for UNHCR*, shared his experience as a refugee from Sierra Leone.

Sophie Cunningham (Year 11) and Hemanshi Kumar (Year 11), led the assembly and gave talks on the refugee crisis. Nina Qiu (Year 12) promoted an end-of-term fund-raiser film night for Médecins Sans Frontières (Doctors Without Borders). Tickets are available through the school's website. Annabelle Cote (Year 7), Tania Tabrizi (Year 7), Jessica Cox (Year 9), Shannon Kelly (Year 9), Nadee Manchanayaka (Year 11) and Mina Gillani (Year 11), spoke at the year group assemblies for Years 7 and 8.

Thank you also to Amelia Craig (Year 11), Taylor Catts (Year 10), Frenky Anam (Year 10) and other students who helped with planning the concept and content for the assemblies. Year 11 Anxiety Seminar

Valerie Ling, a CTHS Alumni, spoke earlier this year at our 2017 High Achievers' Assembly. Her speech and career background as a Clinical Psychologist, resonated well with us and our efforts to increase awareness and provide a proactive means of addressing student resilience and wellbeing. We asked Valerie and her colleague, Tehani, to come back and deliver a seminar to our Year 11 students looking at a range of strategies to use when faced with increased anxiety. The seminar was well received by students with a number nominating to receive additional help in the future. The strategies discussed included:

- 1. Pause stop, breathe, observe things around you that will take your mind off what is causing the anxiety before proceeding with purpose.
- 2. Ponder defuse the power of our thoughts that lead to the anxiety. Focus on coping statements and past successes.
- 3. Pursue goal directed action anxiety has its own agenda and tries to draw you away from your big picture purpose leading to avoidance of the task at hand. Look at what you can do and have done in the past to direct future actions.




Cherrybrook Technology High School App

An enthusiastic group of students, eager to become Barista's, spent the day learning the art of coffee making at Sydney Coffee Academy, Ryde College. The Barista course identified the different coffee species, such as Coffea Arabica and Coffea Robusta along with the history of coffee.

Students were involved in practical experience making an impressive range of coffees starting with the base of all coffee drinks, the Espresso. The Ristretto was next followed by Doppio (double espresso), Long Black Macchiato, the most popular Cappuccino, Caffe Latte and many more.

Over the next few hours the Expresso machine became the students' best friend as they mastered the art of grinding the beans, extracting the coffee, texturing the milk, pouring the milk for the specific coffee and serving and presenting the expresso coffee perfectly.

It was a most successful day, with students developing useful work based skills for industry, as well as the Barista Program at CTHS.


CTHS website

Stage 5 Elective History excursion to the Nicholson Museum

On Friday 16 June the CSI in the Ancient World archaeology class attended the Nicholson Museum at the University of Sydney. Our students were a credit to CTHS, asking thoughtful questions when examining the past and historical artefacts including a mummified head that was said to have sat on the desk of the Museum's founder Sir Charles Nicholson. Both Miss Adamou and I were very impressed by the students and their engagement with the museum guides and the exhibits. In the words of the students:

"We started at the Jericho section of the museum. Here we learnt about one of the oldest civilisations and got the chance to look at the mummified head with shells on his eyes. We were taught about the different ages throughout history such as the Stone, Bronze and Iron Age. Our tour guide explained that when the past civilisations became stationary, living in one place instead of moving around, the number of children increased. At the same time the infant mortality rate also increased due to disease and other factors." (Holly B)

"Past lives were revealed through relics displayed around the museum. A haunting child mummy showed the burial practices of the ancient Egyptians and two exquisite sarcophagi displayed the craftsmanship of the ancient civilisations' art and culture. A guide was able to take us through the museum, step by step, explaining different artefacts and their importance in understanding history. We learnt about the ancient Egyptians, Greeks and many other cultures that affected life today". (Sophia K)

"Students then took a trip to the hands-on room, one of the highlights of the excursion, where we were taught how to properly handle artefacts and how to analyze them, fit them into the past and draw conclusions about the past." (Charlotte C)

"We were able to delve into the lives of people hundreds of years ago, given the opportunity to study pots, swords, figurines and ancient lamps. It was an unforgettable experience and particularly valuable to our CSI class. It was important to be able to see, touch and examine the artefacts we were previously only able to learn about through pictures and articles." (Sophia K)

"Besides learning much about ancient history and archaeology, the University also contained an excellent cafeteria with high quality food. My friend Jordan and I enjoyed chatting to each other within the environment of the University." (Gianni D)


