#### Premier of NSW and Minister for Education Visit

There was an air of excitement at CTHS on Thursday when we were treated to a surprise visit from none other than the Premier of NSW; the Honourable Gladys Berejiklian and the Minister for Education; the Honourable Rob Stokes. Both were keen to assess the progress of our building project, as well as meet and greet some of the and representatives of the P&C. 


#### Year 10 into 11 Subject Selection Evening


#### **NSW Titration Competition**



#### Year 11 Hospitality Italian Challenge

Italian food is one of the most popular and widely adopted cuisines all over the world. In Australia, spaghetti bolognese is a common meal served at home, it could almost be classed as our adopted national dish.

Italian recipes use a wide range of ingredients which are bold, satisfying, rich and textural using a whole palette of flavours from ingredients such as olive oil, garlic, capers, cannellini beans, fresh pasta, prosciutto, basil, oregano and mozzarella.

Year 11 Hospitality students were given a practical challenge task where they had to create their own Italian dish using typical Italian ingredients, showcasing their precision cutting skills and cooking methods mastered in class. The challenge of the task was to include a mystery ingredient, Radicchio, a quick growing leafy vegetable often used for salads in Italy's Veneto region. Although radicchio resembles red lettuce, its bitter-tasting, wine-red leaves set this vegetable apart from other leafy vegetables.

Each student successfully included the mystery ingredient into their recipes presenting dishes such as risottos, homemade ravioli, lasagne and gnocchi, caponata, pizzas, a wide range of pastas, a delicious Italian lemon cake served with a mixed berry coulis, custard and sugared radicchio!

We are after all sorts of shoes – adults, kids, male, female, sneakers, boots, sandals, heels, flats – anything! Please pair your shoes together by placing them in a bag, tying them together with their laces or with a rubber band so it's easy for us to find their other half!



# School travel update Application information - June 2017

#### Information for parents, guardians and students

Our school has partnered with Transport for NSW to use the new online School Portal for endorsing school travel applications.

You are now able to manage all your school travel needs online including applying for school travel passes and tracking the status of your application.

The application process has also been simplified so that a new or updated application for school travel passes is only needed when a student is:

- applying for a school travel pass for the first time
- requesting an additional pass as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).
- changing school or campus
- changing home address
- receiving an expiry notification
- repeating a school year
- changing their name
- requesting a new transport operator.

This means students who are progressing to year 3 and year 7 only need to reapply if they are changing circumstances.

Students who are not residents and are temporarily in Australia can also provide their visa subclass number and exchange program (if prompted) when applying online, making the application and approval process much faster.


