11 August 2017 Year 7 Chicken Pox (Varicella) Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (dTpa)
 Year 7 students, who are absent for this visit, will be offered dTpa and Varicella at a later visit. A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at the clinic. Parents/guardians should ensure this record is kept for future reference and should not assume their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this Record of Vaccination. On the day of the vaccinations, students are advised: To ensure they have breakfast on the day If they are nervous, to talk to their teacher (this could also include their Year Advisor, Stage HT, a chosen classroom teacher or Mrs Navarro) To bring a book or ipod with them as a distraction After their vaccination, they will be asked to sit quietly for fifteen minutes for observation before returning to class. Neighbourhood Watch Excursion

On Thursday 20 July, our Stage 6 Drama students (along with three fortunate Stage 5 Drama students) had the opportunity to see a production of *Neighbourhood Watch* at a theatre in Darling Harbour.

With the AP4's approaching, our Year 12's are required to write an essay on this work, as well as a number of other plays. Our Year 11 Drama students begin their HSC Drama course in Term 4, so seeing a production of one of the plays they will be studying is a good start to their momentous final year of school.

Year 12 Geography Students Complete Case Study of Barangaroo

Last week, our Year 12 Geography class travelled to Sydney to undertake compulsory fieldwork looking at the urban dynamics at work in a suburb of Sydney. The suburb, Barangaroo, was formerly the community of Millers Point and sits on prime inner city land adjacent to the Sydney CBD at the southern end of the Sydney Harbour Bridge. The suburb has a strong, working class history, with many of the families who grew up there still having a connection to the area and its maritime ship dock past. The area, which is now Barangaroo, was for many years a large concrete dock catering for many large overseas passenger cruise ships. The suburb has since undergone significant urban renewal, with the building of three large commercial towers and the opening of Barangaroo Reserve to the north. When it is finally completed in 2024, Barangaroo will accommodate more than 23,000 workers and residents in high rise towers and apartments, as Sydney continues to be transformed with a focus on urban consolidation.

After our tour of Barangaroo, including a presentation by a Lend Lease representative, speaking about the many sustainability initiatives included in the development, we walked through the adjacent Millers Point and Walsh Bay suburbs to investigate the gentrification which has been transforming the old terrace houses still existing there. It was clear from the protest banners hung from many of these buildings, the Government plans to move public housing tenants out of the area has not been well received.

The information and insight we gained from our first-hand visit to this suburb, will prove invaluable to our upcoming HSC exams. A great day was had by all.












Australian Cuisine - Kangaroo Kofta with Warrigal Greens, Beetroot and Feta

Australia has a rich variety of food and drinks, adopted and adapted since colonisation and developed as part of a multi-cultural society. What was once new and foreign has been transformed with new ingredients and styles into distinctly Australian food.

Stage 5 Food Technology utilised Australian native ingredients, cooking methods and equipment which originated from other countries around the world to prepare the fusion recipe Kangaroo Kofta with Warrigal Greens, Beetroot and Fetta.

Kangaroo is a rich, lean meat which lends itself to the warmth of peppery spices such as the native Australian pepper berry and the clean heat of the grill or a hot frypan, making this a healthy dinner option. The students presented their finished product beautifully and all agreed that the meal was delicious.

The CoolKids and Adolescent Health Program: Helping distressed children & adolescents suffering from somatic health complaints (including recurring headaches, stomach-aches etc).







About 40% of children and adolescents may experience functional somatic health complaints, which are medically benign (that is, they have no identified organic cause). The most common somatic-health complaints experienced by children and adolescents include *recurring abdominal pain, gastro-intestinal symptoms, recurring headaches, chest pains, dizziness and nausea*. Research has shown that these children are prone to have increased rates of school absenteeism, and this may also have an impact on their learning, peer relations and overall quality of life. Studies have also indicated that up to 80% of children and adolescents struggling to cope with these recurring functional somatic health complaints may also be experiencing anxiety and/or depressive problems.

Our new, **CoolKids and Adolescent Health Program** is designed to specifically help children learn how to concurrently cope and manage their somatic symptoms as well as learn stress management skills. This program is specifically designed for children aged 7 to 17 years who are experiencing recurring somatic health complaints for at least 3 months (and which a GP or medical specialist has confirmed that the symptoms are medically benign). The program is individually based and involves 10 x 1 hour weekly therapy sessions held either in-person at the Centre for Emotional Health (CEH) Clinic at Macquarie University or via Skype or telephone. Interested families will be invited to attend a screening assessment to determine eligibility.

Researchers: Associate Professor Maria Kangas, Prof Ron Rapee, & Prof Mike Jones.

Who is eligible? Children and adolescents aged 7-17 years who are experiencing recurring somatic health complaints for a minimum of 3-months.






PROCEDURE FOR EARLY LEAVERS

If a student needs to leave school early, they must provide a note from their parent/guardian giving reasons for their partial absence. The student must hand the note into the student window before 8.30am where they will be issued with a leave pass. They can then present this pass to their teacher and leave school at the appropriate time.

On Thursdays (sport days) all students in Years 9-11 must have their early leave notes signed by a member of the PE staff before presenting to the office.



THE SAFER DRIVERS COURSE INVOLVES TWO MODULES: MODULE ONE

A three-hour facilitated group discussion on how to manage risks on the road. This will involve a maximum of 12 participants and will be delivered by a facilitator.

MODULE TWO:

A two-hour, in-vehicle coaching session to develop low-risk driving strategies. This will involve two participants and a coach. Course cost: \$140

Participants must have completed 50 hours of actual on-road driving experience to be eligible for the course. Credits gained under the 3-for-1 scheme cannot be included.
