NAPLAN Headlines and Band 8 media concerns

Following on from the usual feeding frenzy, which the media engages in when discussing NAPLAN results, I would like to say something positive about this school's results. Unfortunately, I cannot comment just yet, as the results aren't released to schools until next week!

What I can say is that this school has an enviable record of improvement in NAPLAN and that we use the data the tests provide to determine areas we can work on to improve student outcomes.

I can also say that during the past week as a result of the media's reports, a number of parents have contacted the school expressing concern that their child may not have reached Band 8 in the literacy and numeracy tests and therefore may not, at this stage of their development, be eligible for an HSC. If this does prove to be the case for your child please do not worry.

Students who do not meet the literacy/numeracy standard at this early stage of their secondary career will have multiple opportunities over the next three years to achieve the desired outcomes via the online tests that have been discussed in earlier editions of *Network*.

Over the next three years our current Year 9 student's learning will continue and their skills and knowledge will continue to grow. I remain confident all our students will be eligible for an HSC when they complete Year 12, assuming they apply themselves diligently to their studies.

Transforming School Education

On Wednesday Mrs Bevan, Mr Woo and I attended, as special guests, a forum hosted by the NSW Business Chamber, the State's peak business group.

The aim of the forum was to identify positive solutions for systemic change so that students are fully prepared for their post-school transition to work, further study and life in the 21st century.

The Forum brought together education experts, change-makers, industry representatives and not-for-profit leaders in an interactive discussion focusing on three key themes:

- Tackling the system: Identifying opportunities for systemic change, including institutional change, the cultural mindsets that promote change and solutions that may deliver more coherent, 'big picture' policymaking for education
- Teaching and Learning: Discussing what the evidence shows about the curriculum design, teaching and learning methodologies that work, including the opportunities and limitations presented by technology
- Navigating the system the experience of students: Reflecting on the experience
 of young people as 'users' of the school system and the implications this should
 have on the design of schooling. This included discussion of the different
 pathways and needs of students transitioning between school and work.

The day proved to be tremendously interesting with many ideas, some possible, others less so, but nevertheless well worth considering. Once the data from the day is collated into a manageable format I look forward to sharing it with you.



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

AP4s Commence

Monday was the start of our trial HSC. Students were, as expected, nervous but pleasingly, also well prepared for these tests.

As always the students have conducted themselves exceptionally well during the first trying week of exams and despite the obvious pressure, remain steadfastly polite and cooperative. During the course of these exams, and indeed during the lead up to and through the HSC period, it is most important students continue to prepare well with a carefully constructed study timetable which also includes time for physical activity and leisure pursuits. Balance at this critical time is most important.

Grade Sport Finals

The finals of the winter grade sport competitions were held on Thursday and Cherrybrook had fourteen teams in the finals. At the conclusion of play, four emerged victorious. These teams included, soccer open A boys, volleyball boys' B, girls' basketball and Oztag girls' A. Whilst we also had ten join the ranks of runners-up. My congratulations are extended to all students who participated in the final matches and their coaches for the great job they have done throughout the winter season.

Year 12 Major Works and Practical Marking

Last week many very nervous Year 12 students were in a flurry of activity busily putting the final touches to major works in English, Textiles, Design and Technology, Multi-Media, Industrial Technology and Society and Culture. The quality of the students' work was outstanding, being creative, innovative and in most cases very professional. A taste of these works may be seen in the photographs featured in this *Network*.

Students also began practical examinations in Dance and LOTE and the realisation that this year's HSC was well and truly underway, has certainly dawned on our students.

Uniform

It has been very pleasing to see the vast majority of students correctly attired in full school uniform over the past few weeks. Despite the cold weather it is vital students wear their full uniform. In particular, students should have the correct footwear and pullover.

Parents and students are reminded hooded jackets are **NOT** part of the uniform and students who choose to wear these will be disciplined in accordance with the school's Fair Discipline Code.

Building Project Update

There has been significant progress made on the new building over the past two weeks. The on-site water detention (OSD) tank is now complete and the construction crew are preparing for the first floor slab to be poured. On Wednesday 16 August, 35 trucks will deliver approximately 150m³ of concrete for the first floor slab and the remainder of the ground floor slab. Due to the large number of trucks entering and exiting the school on Wednesday, traffic management marshals have been employed to control traffic on Purchase Road between 6am and 6pm.

There will be limited access through the rear gate during the concrete pour. Students who use this gate will be redirected through John Purchase Public School (JPPS), via the OOSH gate, opposite K4 and then down to the gate opposite the MPC. Students are expected to behave appropriately when walking through JPPS. Unfortunately, the oval will be closed during lunchtime on Wednesday 16 August.

Over the past week there have been a number of students walking through the construction compound from the MPC through to the back oval. This is extremely dangerous and any student caught using the compound for quick access to the back of the school (or vice-versa) will be placed on the school's level system!






















CAREERS UPDATE

University Open Days Open Doors

You might have seen a poster or ten around town. Universities and colleges are holding their open days throughout August and into September. Posters on buses and bus stops, banners on the street, and billboards. Yes, universities and colleges are extremely keen to meet students and parents alike and they have plenty to show off. It can be quite a maze to work out where, when and what so, with that in mind, here are some tips to help you get the most from university and college open days:



1. Work it out before you go

Standing at the gates of the university and hoping you'll find your way on the day is scary business. Going with a sense of direction and an idea of what you're interested in, is essential.



2. Put the dates in your calendar

The NSW Universities Admission Centre (UAC) publishes an Open Day calendar so, get your diary out and prioritise the Open Days you wish to attend <u>http://www.uac.edu.au/documents/undergraduate/opendays.pdf</u> (a copy is also included in this *Network*).

3. Prepare to be dazzled

Open Days are pretty flash affairs. There is a lot going on and a lot to figure out. So jump online and look for the Open Day program. You can download it, book in for lectures and info sessions, see when specific tours are being held and best places for lunch. Most unis have an app or planning page for their Open Day. You need this! Another big thing, book your place in the seminars! Get in as early as you can.

4. Finding the Open Day guide on the university websites

I know, from lots and lots of experience, university websites can be daunting, confusing and downright frustrating. So avoid the oneway url trails and google the answer. Like this: (*Uni Name*) Open Day 2017.

5. One more prep step

Do some homework before you get there, get a university prospectus from your school Careers Advisor or online and read up on the courses. From there, you can go to the faculty web page and have a good look at the courses and find out what you'll be studying.

6. OK, you made it!

It's Open Day and you've got your plan. You're into lectures, taking tours, chatting with enthusiastic students, but you have questions which need answers. Find the Faculty or Department stand and get in line to ask. If you've done your homework, you'll be coming up with some good questions such as, "Where do graduates go?"; "Are there jobs at the end of the degree?"; "What are the professional learning opportunities in the course?"; "Do I get to do work experience in this course and how does that work?" Listen for the answers then do your own research. Of course you can work this out in other ways, but it's good to hear it from the horse's mouth. Make sure you chat to some uni students too, their experience and insight is invaluable. They will tell it like it is for them and be happy to share the good things (and hard things) they've experienced.

7. It's not all about the ATAR

Remember to talk about ways to get into the course. Unis have all sorts of pathways which may be easy to skim over, so find out about them. The Prospective Students team will be active and ready to advise you on how to, where to and when.

8. Getting serious

Get your cuppa, take a pen and paper (actually, just take a notebook, you're bound to come home with a dozen pens). Write stuff down. Write down your impressions of the campus and the people you met. Can you imagine yourself there? Write down anything which really spoke to you, good or not so good!

ASK MORE QUESTIONS

9. Pros and cons

Write your pros and cons for the course and the university. Match your answers against criteria such as course and what you actually study. Course outcomes: Will you get a job at the end of the course? Close to home? Course costs? Extra costs? Opportunities to do more during your study ie. overseas exchange and all the things which are important to you and your family.

10. Finish well

Use your Open Day visits as a motivator to get through the rest of Year 12. In a year from now, that will be you at university. Focus, do your best and finish well.
