### **DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT**

#### **HSC Major Works Exhibition**

On Tuesday evening Year 12 students showcased their major artworks and projects in the MPC. The 2017 students were certainly able to demonstrate their creativity in a range of different mediums. Also on display were their process diaries, which enabled us to see the journeys they had gone through to the final product. There were many excellent artworks and projects on display with the proud students and their families there to admire the craftsmanship and creativity of the candidates. The Visual Arts staff are also to be congratulated, as they have spent many additional hours with these students to ensure the final products were of such a high standard.

Awards were presented with many viewers of this exhibition voting for the People's Choice Award. The Principal and Deputies formed a judging panel, awarding First Place and Highly Commended. The Award winners are noted later in this *Network*.

#### **HSC Music Nights**

On Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, a large crowd of parents and students supported the 2017 HSC Music candidates at their Performance Night. #### Year 12 End of Year Activities

All Year 12 parents and students would have received an email and letter recently, detailing the school's expectations, as well as the timing and cost of the various events, including official school functions, in which Year 12 students will be involved. Any parent who did not receive a copy of this letter should contact the school. Year 12 will be spoken to about the school's expectations of their behaviour in the period leading up to and during the HSC.

Any parents/students who are planning to hold private parties are encouraged to register their party with the local police. This allows the police to patrol the area and be ready to respond should problems arise.

#### Year 11 AP2 Examination Period Begins

The Year 11 AP2 examination period began on Thursday 31 August, signalling their final assessment tasks prior to heading into the HSC year. Students should be preparing in earnest for these exams as it is a good barometer leading up to the HSC. If students cannot attend for any reason they should ensure they follow the procedures as outlined in the Student Handbook. If you have any queries please contact Ms Adamou, Head Teacher Stage 6. We also ask **ALL** students be considerate of those completing examinations and keep the noise to an absolute minimum around the MPC.

#### Hints and Tips for all Senior Students

It is also important to note, during examination times, students can become anxious and stressed. With Year 11 about to begin their assessment period and the HSC looming ever closer, some advice and tips could be timely. Parents please try not to place excessive pressures on your child and keep an eye out for their welfare. There are numerous places which supply hints and tips about surviving examinations. I have included a quick summary below, which may assist you and your child:

- Develop a reasonable study routine and stick to it
- Not sleeping or pulling an 'all-nighter' will not improve performance
- · Keep good sleep patterns
- Get regular exercise
- Be positive! A positive outlook on things aids performance. Athletes do not visualise losing, think positive thoughts!
- Eat properly, healthy diets fuel the brain
- · Allow time for a social life and sports
- Keep perspective, a lower than expected result will not signal the end of the world.



#### PROCEDURE FOR LATE ARRIVALS

All students arriving to school after 8.40am *must* sign in at the student window where they will be issued with a late note. All late arrivals are required to have a note from their parent/guardian giving reasons for being late. No note results in a detention.









The school has received numerous reports regarding influenza. If your child shows signs of influenza it is recommended you see your doctor and keep your child at home until they look and feel better (five days from onset has been recommended)

## Influenza

Influenza (flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. Most people recover after a few days but for some people it can be fatal. An influenza vaccination each year provides the best protection against influenza.

What is influenza?

Influenza, or flu, is a highly contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. There are three main types of influenza virus that cause infection in humans, types A, B and C, as well as many sub-types or strains. Influenza can occur throughout the year, but influenza activity usually peaks in winter.

What are the symptoms?

People with influenza typically experience some or all of the following symptoms for at least a week:

- Fever and chills
- · Cough, sore throat and runny or stuffynose
- Muscle aches, joint pains, headaches and fatigue (feeling verytired)
- · Nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea (more common in children than adults).

Some symptoms may last for more than a week. Some people may also experience very mild symptoms, particularly if they have some immunity from a previous infection or vaccination.

How is it spread?

- Influenza viruses are mainly spread by droplets made when an infected person coughs or sneezes
- · Influenza can also spread after touching surfaces where infected droplets have landed
- · Influenza can be spread to someone by an infected person even before their symptoms begin
- Adults with influenza are infectious from the day before their symptoms start until five-seven days later
- · Young children and people with weakened immune systems may be infectious for longer.

Take action to stop the spread of influenza by remembering to:

- Cover your face when you cough or sneeze and throw used tissues in a rubbish bin
- Wash your hands thoroughly and often; wash hands for at least ten seconds, especially after coughing, sneezing or blowing your nose, or use an alcohol-based hand rub
- Stay at home until you're well. Wait at least 24 hours after your fever resolves so you that you aren't likely to infect other people. Keep sick children away from school and other activities
- Call ahead to see a doctor. If you think you may have influenza and you need to see a doctor, remember to call first so the clinic can take precautions to reduce the risk to other people.

#### Year 11 Business Studies Entrepreneur Forum Incursion

On Wednesday 16 August, a Year 11 Business Studies Entrepreneur Forum incursion was held in the library. Guest speakers were invited to talk to students about what it takes to start a business and what it's like to be an entrepreneur. Students heard from entrepreneurs, Alvin Singh, who co-founded a company and app called PocketBook, and Joey El Issa, who started a successful business with his brother, called Knafeh Bakery. They answered questions from students and enlightened them about their business experiences, the challenges they faced and their pathway to success.

Alvin Singh and his high school friend, Bosco Tan, became business partners when they founded PocketBook in 2012. With a strong background in IT and Software development, they left their high-paying jobs to develop PocketBook, where they identified a gap in the market for a personal finance expense tracker. Alvin spoke about the challenges involved in building a start-up and the vision for the business in the future in terms of helping people to manage their money. He also referred to how an app business generates profits being a free app and discussed different revenue streams which the business is involved in.

Knafeh Bakery, founded by brothers Ameer and Joey El Issa, launched in 2014, where they created a successful brand image of the Bearded Bakers. Their bakery is a mobile, travelling shipping container which sells a signature Middle-Eastern dessert called Knafeh, whilst singing, dancing and providing a vibrant atmosphere at different baking events and festivals in Sydney. Joey spoke to the students about the strong influence of his migrant background in starting his business and was always encouraged to follow the motto 'Doesn't matter what you're earning, as long as you are learning'. Always 'dreaming big' along with his brother they combined their separate talents in design and hospitality to create the unique concept of the Knafeh Bakery which brings people together from all backgrounds to share dessert.

The Business Studies syllabus was heavily incorporated in a way which made this learning experience extremely valuable. On behalf of the Business Studies cohort, I would like to thank Ms Kumar for organising this incursion, which has provided us with such a unique opportunity in getting a first-hand account of entrepreneurship and the speakers for giving up their valuable time and sharing their experiences.


- Please ensure notes to the school contain your child's FULL NAME and year plus the date and reason for absence

The required ATAR thresholds will not change throughout the preference and admissions period for 2018 entry, which includes the December, January and February UAC rounds.



#### PROCEDURE FOR EARLY LEAVERS

If a student needs to leave school early, they must provide a note from their parent/guardian giving reasons for their partial absence. The student must hand the note into the student window before 8.30am where they will be issued with a leave pass. They can then present this pass to their teacher and leave school at the appropriate time.

On Thursdays (sport days) all students in Years 9-11 must have their early leave notes signed by a member of the PE staff before presenting to the office.
