


Year 9 Camp

Australasian Problem Solving Mathematics Olympiad

The Australasian Problem Solving Mathematics Olympiads (APSMO) is an international competition which consists of a series of five papers, each with a set of five problems which challenge your mathematical skills. Each question has a different stage of complication and also requires you to use various techniques to solve the problems.

By competing in the Maths Olympiad it opens students' minds to new problems, which allows them to discover different solving strategies.

This year, 1,385 teams participated in the competition. CTHS entered three teams, one team from Year 7 and two teams from Year 8. We achieved outstanding results with two out of the three teams being placed in the top 50. One of our Year 8 teams received a trophy for being in the top ten percent of this competition.

Of special note, four students were placed in the top two percent of all participants in the APSMO competition. Congratulations to Jack Fang, Pahan Gunaratne and Sean Yam from Year 8 and also Liya Ruan from Year 7.



























CAREERS UPDATE
