School Support Allocation

In 2018, schools across NSW will be allocated \$50 million to better support the role of the School Principal through increasing administrative support. As part of the School Leadership Strategy, this additional interim funding will provide additional support to Principals for the completion of administrative duties enabling them to increase the time spent on leading teaching and learning in schools.

Principals can decide the best way to utilise the additional funds for their schools, with the aim of reducing the amount of time school leaders engage in administrative duties. The allocation of funds will reflect the size and administrative workload of schools, with each schools receiving, at a minimum, enough support allocation to engage administrative support for at least one day per week. At Cherrybrook, funds have already been allocated to support Welfare initiatives and provide support for the new finance package.

E-Safety

In last week's *Network*, Mr Townsend reminded the community of the inappropriate use of social media at school. As educators and parents, the challenges we face to ensure our students and children remain safe online and act in a responsible manner is of high importance. One of the best resources for parents is the following website <u>https://www.esafety.gov.au</u>.

A parent link can be found on this site, which provides information about the 'digital environment' and 'keeping updated on your children's technology use'. There are also guidelines for using safety settings on your family's web-connected devices, tips for choosing movies and games and strategies for keeping young people safe online. This should be your first port of call if you are having difficulties understanding any issue to do with the cyber world.

Many parents are also unaware of the large number of games, apps and social networking sites, which are freely available to children. As most of our students have smart phones they can freely access these sites. If you are unsure of the purpose of these apps, I highly recommend a visit to the web site below as it has a wealth of information.

The Secondary Principals' Council

This professional body represents Principals of Government Schools and Colleges in NSW. They work closely with senior officials from the DoE and the NSW Minister for Education and provide advice on many matters. Recently they have contributed to the Federal Government's "Review to Achieve Educational Excellence in Australian Schools".

Here are their recommendations:

- Adopt a broad view of student, school and systems success. This includes a greater focus on innovation and the wide range of skills, capabilities and interests of secondary school students.
- Recognises that performance measures for all students in all sectors must take into account that the current Gonski 20 funding model allocates for need within sectors and not across them. There is a risk that this will undermine the integrity of any improvement measures that are correlated to individual student, school or sector funding or that compare students and schools across sectors.
- Encourages success based on long-term change, growth and improvement. Measuring progress and change in knowledge, skills and behaviours is more important for students and schools than narrow 'annual snapshots' based on standardised testing. The panel has the opportunity to recommend a new approach which reflects the need for a broad set of measurements and recognises that mapping outcomes is a longitudinal process.
- · Acknowledges the diversity of learning starting points for students, particularly in areas of socio economic disadvantage, and









the impact this has on educational outcomes.

- Recognises the value of offering multiple pathways through education for students and their communities.
- Recommends the establishment of an expert educational panel to undertake research into the best practices in student assessment for secondary education. The panel should provide guidance for the design of a broader set of school and system based measures and benchmarks.

Year 8 lifesaving concluded today and by all accounts it was an outstanding success. As well as water skills and resuscitation skills gained, students also learned how to manage the varying weather conditions which occurred over the four days!! The Future Project Senior Intern Program - Year 10 2017

The Future Project is a unique collaboration between Scientists, Engineers and Secondary School students, designed to inspire and equip the next generation of Scientists and Engineers required for Australia's continued prosperity. It achieves this by providing students an opportunity to do something they can't typically do whilst at school, work with and be mentored through research projects by leading Scientists and Engineers.

This is a special program which only accepts approximately 20 Senior Interns each year as Research Interns. Pairs of interns are partnered with collaborating researchers and their organisations, to gain an insight into conducting the latest Biomedical, Agricultural, Engineering or Mechatronics research. Senior Interns will spend about two hours each week during Terms 1 - 3 designing, piloting, researching and communicating their research project. Interns will also have two, four-five day research blocks during the Term 1 and Term 2 holidays, in order to have more laboratory time conducting and finalising their research projects.

The skills learnt during the program are very valuable for life, university or the workforce. You will have worked as a team, identified a real-world research problem, designed and conducted research, taught yourself what you needed to know, failed, conducted further research and come up with new understandings which have the potential of real-world applications.

The main location for The Future Project is an industry-standard research facility at The King's School, Parramatta or other industry sites around Sydney. Students are typically involved after school (eg. 3.30pm - 5.30pm) or at a time mutually convenient to their research supervisor and during school holidays. Students are expected to arrange their own transport to and from the research locations.

You don't need to be top of your year group to be a good candidate for The Future Project. However, we are looking for Year 10 students (Year 11 2018) with special qualities, passionate and curious about Science, self-motivated learners, responsible and trustworthy.

Information regarding applications for this program is in the Daily News. An information meeting will be held for interested students during Lunch 1 in F1.1 on Tuesday 7 November.

Year 11 Career Mentoring Program

On Tuesday morning, we celebrated the formal conclusion of 2017 Year 11 Career Mentoring, with a Breakfast to recognise the valuable assistance provided by Career Mentors and to learn what the mentees have gained from the partnership. In attendance were the Year 11 mentee students, their business mentors, parents and staff. Some of these mentors were parents of the school, whilst others were sourced from local community links and the CTHS Alumni.



A key theme in the presentations was the importance of developing employability skills and the value of real work experiences, as provided in the shadowing day component of the program. Students have had the opportunity to access work spaces such as courtrooms, medical facilities, large-scale commercial kitchens, construction sites, corporate offices, airports and schools and observe experts in their field. For some, this has heightened their passion for pursuing a chosen field, whilst for a few this has helped them decide to change career direction, both are equally valuable conclusions.

It has been exciting to see the program double in size from last year, to increase the number of students who can gain access to this opportunity. We would like to thank the business mentors, whom, for without their involvement, time and effort, this program would not have been possible. The ongoing support provided to our Year 11 mentees has been invaluable with many indicating they would like to stay in touch in the future. The opportunity for mentors to network with each other has been an added benefit of the program, with many of our mentors returning for the second year.



Below is an account, by Sophie Campling, of the Year 8 Lifesaving week:

"On 28, 30, 31 October and 3 November, Year 8, alongside multiple teachers and many Year 9 and 10 Instructors, attended Macquarie, Hornsby and Waves pools for the annual Year 8 Lifesaving course.

Although the weather was very different each day, changing from 35 degree heat one day to a cold wind the next, it was a fun learning experience for all involved. Throughout the course, Year 8 learnt many water-related rescue techniques including entering and exiting water safely, how to put on a life jacket when in water and how to tread water when in clothes. They also swam different lengths depending on their level. Through their theory side they learnt how to administer CPR using the acronym of DRSABCD and a lot of information about first aid and how to help in situations where there have been injuries.

Overall, with Mr Pedley-Smith's organisation, the four days ran smoothly and everyone was able to enjoy himself or herself and many students would definitely agree they were able to take home many new techniques of rescuing whenever in such a situation."














PROCEDURE FOR EARLY LEAVERS
