Remembrance Day

Congratulations to all these students and their teachers on their wonderful achievements.



SHAPE and INTECH Exhibition 2017 HSC Nominations

The SHAPE and INTECH Exhibitions showcase a selection of outstanding major projects from the HSC Design and Technology, Textiles and Design and Industrial Technology courses.

Last year, 38 Design and Technology, Textiles and Design and Industrial Technology major projects were selected for these prestigious exhibitions. These included:

Thirteen Industrial Technology projects from 215 high achievers nominated from a total of 5,699 students Eleven Textiles and Design projects from 40 high achievers nominated from a total of 1,523 students Fourteen Design and Technology projects from 176 high achievers nominated from a total of 3,245 students.

This year, five Cherrybrook Technology High School students were nominated for selection into the SHAPE and INTECH showcases! Our successful nominees include:

Design and Technology

Dharshan Naidu, who designed a Gyroscopic Glove to assist people with hand tremors. The device assists sufferers by stabilising their hand using two small opposed gyroscopes on top of the hand. The device reduces hand tremors and could improve quality of life for hand tremor sufferers.

Jessica Panetta's Mastectomy Swimwear was designed to have aesthetic appeal, hygiene and maximum comfort while giving mastectomy patients confidence to return to swimming activities.

Rupin Chauhan designed a simple Bin Carrying Device, which can safely manoeuvre up to two bins. The design ensures safety from spiders which may be lurking around the bin handles.

Industrial Technology Timber

Bailey Hamilton's Chess Board and Pieces have been included for consideration to be part of the INTECH Exhibition. The following factors led to this prestigious honor: The painstaking hours Bailey spent on this project to ensure the high quality result; his excellent choice of contrasting timber; the attention to detail for the chess pieces and the high quality portfolio to support the project.

Industrial Technology Electronics

Adam Hanigan's Guitar Valve Amplifier, has also been nominated for selection in the INTECH Exhibition. His project combines old tube technology, from the 50s and 60s, with modern manufacturing and electronic techniques, including water jet, computer num eric controlled machinery and computer aided design.





PROCEDURE FOR EARLY LEAVERS

Year 9 Barista Training

Fifty two Year 9 students have been selected to participate in the 2018 Barista Program. They will be trained in the art of coffee at the Sydney Coffee Academy at Ryde TAFE. This includes the use of professional barista machines, coffee grinders and the steaming and pouring of milk to make a variety of different coffees. Each group of thirteen baristas will be trained separately and then hone their skills running the CTHS staff coffee shop as work experience. Students will also have the opportunity to oper ate the coffee machines at John Purchase Primary School and Inala Fair events.

Due to the popularity of the program and the fact some students missed out, we are discussing the option to give additional students the option to complete the one-day course at Ryde TAFE, as many of our students find the program invaluable in finding part time work.

Year 10 Peer Support Training

On Tuesday 21 November I will be training our 2018 Peer Support Leaders for their role in working with next year's Year 7 students, day 1 and 2 of Term 1. This is a daunting time for Year 7 and we look to our leaders to assist in the transition process and give an understanding of the CTHS experience. The leaders will also be prepared for the pre-camp activities which focus on the importance of a positive school culture and maintaining an inclusive environment at CTHS.

The leaders will also be involved in Rock and Water training with Mr Hartman as they will be working with the Rock and Water team promoting strategies for coping within the Resilience Program in Term 2. The Welfare Team looks forward to working with our new leaders in 2018.

Further Leadership Opportunities for Year 10

All Year 10 students should be looking to involve themselves in the wider school experience. Boys should consider the Boys' Initiative Group (BIG) run by Mrs Burroughs in 2017 and Miss Campbell in 2018. Girls should consider the Big Sister Program which is an extension of the Peer Support Program and works with smaller groups of Year 7 girls. Applications for the latter program will be opening soon.

Students with Anaphylaxis

Any student diagnosed with Anaphylaxis **MUST** carry their auto-injector (Epipen) with them at all times with a copy of a **2017 ASCIA Personal Plan** wrapped around it. The carrying of the auto-injector is mandatory for a normal school day and also for excursions such as the Swimming Carnival next week. All CTHS teachers are trained in the use of Epipens and we look to our students to take on the responsibility of ensuring their safety by carrying their auto-injector.

- "Finding out how whatever desk work is being done actually affects the outside world was very insightful."
- "A first-hand, vivid insight into the nature of corporate lifestyle which I really appreciated."
- "I learnt vital skills in the entrepreneurial and business world such as the importance of communication, teamwork and managing risk."
- "Witnessing a discussion between MasterCard and one of the four big banks taking place was a highlight."
- "This experience has given me the tips and connections to be a step ahead of the pack after I leave school."


