# **DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT**



#### **Dr Chris Ferrie**

On Friday, I was privileged to meet Dr Chris Ferrie, a published author of Quantum Physics and also, in what may seem to be a strange combination, children's literature. Dr Ferrie is a researcher at UTS where he specialises in Quantum Computing, an area of research in which Australian Scientists are at the absolute forefront. The potential of such technology is truly mind blowing and if successful will completely change the society in which we currently live. He has reached out to the school to develop some links and proposed a program developed by UTS, involving our students, who will peer-review research papers to determine the suitability and relevance of the language to a younger audience.

Thank you to Mr LaGinestra and Mr Fairclough whose networking has facilitated this exciting new partnership.

#### P&C Meeting

The final P&C meeting for 2017 was held on Tuesday evening and parents had the opportunity to provide invaluable feedback relating to the performance of the school. Those in attendance were able to identify the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and potential areas for improvement. The collation of this data will prove to be valuable, moving forward, as we develop our strategic plan for the next three years. #### **Swimming Carnival**

Since the closure of Parramatta Pool earlier this year to accommodate the redevelopment of Parramatta Stadium, the PDHPE staff needed to find an appropriate venue for our carnival to be held. Cue the Aquatic Centre at Homebush, where our annual carnival was held on Wednesday this week. Given it is an indoor venue, the PE staff were not avidly checking the Bureau of Meteorology, as previously has been the case, hoping for fine weather. The carnival was a resounding success, despite what can only be described as unexceptional attendance by our students. Students were able to compete, socialise and marvel at the talents of their peers. With the final result of the carnival not known until the Year 7 Swimming Carnival early next year, it was pleasing to see students participating. Thank you to the PE staff for organising the event and to the huge number of student volunteers whose assistance is essential for the smooth running of the day.

#### End of Year Arrangements






#### **Building Update**

This week has been a busy one for many staff as the English, IT, LOTE and ESL staff packed up their office space in preparation for the new modular staff rooms to be relocated from Artarmon Public School. Staff took the move in their stride and managed to uproot their resources to take up a temporary residence in the Library seminar rooms. In what is a busy time of year the professionalism of all concerned is a testament to the culture of our staff. The existing staffrooms are to be disassembled and removed from site mid next week. The contractors will establish a compound in the main staff carpark early next week and this will potentially provide further disruption on Purchase Road, particularly when the demountable rooms are removed from site.

Up in the new J Block, internal finishes are beginning to be installed on the ground floor, most of the first floor brick work is complete, and the windows are continuing to be installed. The roofing contractors are back on site, therefore we anticipate completion of the roof in the near future.

Below is a personal refection from Shaan Bakshi, Year 8, who participated in the day:

"Selected students from Years 7 and 8 were invited to participate in an event exploring Maths. This event was held in C2.1. There were 55 Year 8 students and 63 Year 7 students at the event and everything was planned well. We were assigned many different problems which we had to solve within one hour and 30 minutes. These problems were extremely difficult and students had to work in groups of four to finish them. The activities needed teamwork to be done and my group was able to perform as a team. In the end we didn't finish all the activities but, we had fun. I believe everyone gained some knowledge in solving Mathematical problems. **CAREERS UPDATE** 



#### University Info Days

If you have applied for university for 2018, you might be a bit nervous right now. Getting your results and making your final course decision can be tough. Once upon a time, students had to wait weeks or months between receiving their results and being offered a place, but now the 'Powers That Be' have made some changes to dates and everything happens much quicker than it used to.

#### What does this mean for you?

If you finished Year 12 in 2017 and have applied for university, it means you will only have a little while to change your preferences once you have received your marks before the main round of offers. This year, results are released on the dates below and in some states, the option to change your preferences for the main round closes only a week or so afterwards.

Don not freak out, there are still ways to change your mind later and a number of uni students change degree paths during their degree. It is not unusual and you are never 'locked-in' to finishing anything, but it is a good idea to change your preferences as soon as you know your results.

#### Why would you change your preferences?

- You got a better mark than you expected and want to apply for a more competitive course
- You did not do as well as you had hoped and want to change to a more realistic course
- Perhaps you have changed your mind in the time between applying and getting your results and want to take a different path
- A new (and more appealing) course has just become available or you recently found out about a course you did not know existed
- Sometimes universities choose to cancel a course and you may want to replace it.

It is a big decision, but now you have more information (ie your results) it is wise to rethink your options. To help you make the best choice, many universities hold special 'Change of Preference' sessions (sometimes they are called 'Info Days') where you can get one-on-one advice and find out about your options. You will also find lots of information about university preparation courses, extracurricular activities, accommodation services and alternative entry pathways.
