High Achievers' Presentation Ceremony

It was my great pleasure to attend my very first High Achievers' Presentation Ceremony this week celebrating the achievements of the Graduating class of 2017 in their Higher School Certificate. Road Safety around the School

- Where a State Team has not been selected in a team sport, a student will still be considered if he/she
 has been an outstanding Sydney North Sports Association Representative.

It is worth mentioning that there are over 58,000 students in the Sydney North Sports Association and only 31 Students are awarded Blues Awards.

Is your child too sick for school?

Included in this *Network* are guidelines, set out by NSW Health to help you decide if your child is too sick for school. You can access these guidelines by following the link in the Parent Portal or on the CTHS website.

If your child has a **contagious/infectious disease** such as whooping cough, chickenpox, impetigo etc, it is essential you notify the school *in writing* via the school email address, cths.nsw.edu.au

If your child feels nauseous or has vomited prior to attending school, please keep them at home. Students should **NOT** attend school within 24hrs of vomiting.

Parking and traffic rules in school zones

You need to take extra care when driving and parking in school zones. Make sure that you and your child understand the road rules. If you break the traffic rules in a school zone you are putting not only your child but other children at risk. The parking and traffic rules around our schools are there to protect your children. If you break the rules you will be fined. **Please choose safety over convenience.**



Demerit Points:

* The **Demerit Points** Scheme is a national program that allocates penalty points (demerits) for a range of driving offences. A driver who has not committed any offences has '**zero**' points. If you commit an offence that carries demerit points, the points are added to your driving record.

If you incur the threshold number of demerit points within a three-year period, a licence suspension or refusal is applied. The three-year period is calculated between the dates the offences were committed. It ends on the day your most recent offence was committed.

Parents are required to provide an explanation of absence to the school within seven days from the first day of any period of absence.


Periodically the school sends home an 'Absentee Notice' when an explanation for absence has not been received. Explanation of absence notices will be sent home Term 1 week 4.



Too sick for school?



Generally if your child feels unwell, keep them home from school and consult your doctor. This chart and the information it contains is not intended to take the place of a consultation with your doctor.

Bronchitis	Symptoms are coughing, a runny nose, sore throat and mild fever. The cough is often dry at first, becoming moist after a couple of days. There may be a slight wheeze and shortness of breath. A higher fever (typically above 39°C) may indicate pneumonia.	until they are feeling better. Antibiotics may be needed.
Chickenpox (Varicella)	Slight fever, runny nose, and a rash that begins as raised pink spots that blister and scab.	for 5 days from the onset of the rash and the blisters have dried.
Conjunctivitis	The eye feels 'scratchy', is red and may water. Lids may stick together on waking.	while there is discharge from the eye unless a doctor has diagnosed a non-infectious cause.
Diarrhoea (no organism identified)	Two or more consecutive bowel motions that are looser and more frequent than normal and possibly stomach cramps.	for at least 24 hours after diarrhoea stops.
Fever	A temperature of 38.5°C or more in older infants and children.	until temperature is normal.
Gastroenteritis	A combination of frequent loose or watery stools (diarrhoea), vomiting, fever, stomach cramps, headaches.	for at least 24 hours after diarrhoea and/or vomiting stops.
German measles (Rubella)	Often mild or no symptoms: mild fever, runny nose, swollen nodes, pink blotchy rash that lasts a short time.	for at least 4 days after the rash appears.
Glandular Fever (Mononucleosis, EBV infection)	Symptoms include fever, headache, sore throat, tiredness, swollen nodes.	unless they're feeling unwell.
Hand, Foot and Mouth Disease (HFMD)	Generally a mild illness caused by a virus, perhaps with a fever, blisters around the mouth, on the hands and feet, and perhaps the nappy area in babies.	until all blisters have dried.
Hayfever [Allergic rhinitis] caused by allergy to pollen [from grasses, flowers and trees], dust mites, animal fur or hair, mould spores, cigarette smoke	Sneezing, a blocked or runny nose (rhinitis), itchy eyes, nose and throat, headaches.	unless they feel unwell or are taking a medication which makes them sleepy.
Head lice or nits* [Pediculosis]	Itchy scalp, white specks stuck near the base of the hairs; lice may be found on the scalp.	while continuing to treat head lice each night. Tell the school.

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Hepatitis A	Often none in young children; sudden onset of fever, loss of appetite, nausea, vomiting, jaundice (yellowing of skin and eyes), dark urine, pale stools.	for 2 weeks after first symptoms [or 1 week after onset of jaundice]. Contact your doctor before returning to school.	
Hepatitis B	Often no symptoms in young children. When they do occur, they can include fever, loss of appetite, nausea, vomiting, jaundice (yellowing of skin and eyes), dark urine.	if they have symptoms. Contact your doctor before returning to school if they have a chronic infection (not the first outbreak) and no symptoms.	
Impetigo (School sores)	Small red spots change into blisters that fill up with pus and become crusted; usually on the face, hands or scalp.	until antibiotic treatment starts. Sores should be covered with watertight dressings.	
Influenza	Sudden onset fever, runny nose, sore throat, cough, muscle aches and headaches.	until well.	
Measles	Fever, tiredness, runny nose, cough and sore red eyes for a few days followed by a red blotchy rash that starts on the face and spreads down the body and lasts 4 to 7 days.	for at least 4 days after the rash appears.	
Meningococcal Disease	Sudden onset of fever and a combination of headache, neck, stiffness, nausea, vomiting, drowsiness or rash.	Seek medical attention immediately. Patient will need hospital treatment. Close contacts receive antibiotics.	
Molluscum Contagiosum	Multiple small lumps (2–5mm) on the skin that are smooth, firm and round, with dimples in the middle. In children, occur mostly on the face, trunk, upper arms and legs. Symptoms can last 6 months to 2 years.		
Mumps	Fever, swollen and tender glands around the jaw.	for 9 days after onset of swelling.	
Ringworm* (tinea corporis]	Small scaly patch on the skin surrounded by a pink ring.	for 24 hours after fungal treatment has begun.	
Runny nose or common cold		unless there are other symptoms such as fever, sore throat, cough, rash or headache. Check with school.	
Scabies*	Itchy skin, worse at night. Worse around wrists, armpits, buttocks, groin and between fingers and toes.	until 24 hours after treatment has begun.	
Shigella	Diarrhoea (which may contain blood, mucus and pus), fever, stomach cramps, nausea and vomiting.	until there has not been a loose bowel motion for 24 hours. Antibiotics may be needed.	
Slapped Cheek Syndrome (Parvovirus B19 infection, fifth disease, erythema infectiosum)	Mild fever, red cheeks, itchy lace-like rash, and possibly cough, sore throat or runny nose.	as it is most infectious before the rash appears.	
Whooping Cough (Pertussis)	Starts with a running nose, followed by persistent cough that comes in bouts. Bouts maybe followed by vomiting and a whooping sound as the child gasps for air.	until the first 5 days of an antibiotic course has been completed. Unimmunised siblings may need to stay home too until treated with an antibiotic.	
Worms (Threadworms, pinworms)	The main sign of threadworms is an itchy bottom. Sometimes children feel 'out of sorts' and do not want to eat much. They may also have trouble sleeping, due to itching at night.	and tell the school as other parents will need to know to check their kids.

Australian Science Olympiad Summer School What is the Australian Science Olympiads Summer School?

The Australian Science Olympiads Summer School is a two week residential science program for around 100 secondary school students who are invited to attend based on their performance in the Australian Science Olympiad Exams.

Held during the January school holidays at the Australian National University in Canberra, the summer school is an opportunity for talented students to work with others who are passionate about Science.

The work schedule is intense and covers the equivalent of first-year university studies in Biology, Chemistry, Earth and Environmental Science or Physics. It's a great head start to further studies and careers in science.

High achieving students at the summer school and those who perform well in final selection exams (the top 24), earn a spot on the Australian Science Olympiads team and go on to compete at the International Science Olympiads - the Olympic Games for science students.

Rebecca McKee, who is currently in Year 12, was invited to compete at the International Science Olympiads in Physics, achieving a High Distinction in both Biology and Physics and a Distinction in Chemistry. Well done Rebecca on an outstanding result!

PROCEDURE FOR EARLY LEAVERS

If a student needs to leave school early, they *must* provide a note from their parent/guardian giving reasons for their partial absence. The student must hand the note in at the student window before 8.30am where they will be issued with a leave pass. They can then present this pass to their teacher and leave school at the appropriate time.

On Thursdays (sport days) all students in Years 9-11 must have their early leave notes signed by a member of the PE staff before presenting to the office.

PROCEDURE FOR SICK STUDENTS

Students who are sick during class should see a teacher for written permission to go to sick bay. They must present themselves promptly to the **front office** and politely follow instructions from the office staff, who will then contact a parent/guardian when necessary. Sick bay is used for a short time only. Students should not call their parents in the first instance. **Please be advised the school does not supply any medication, including pain killers, medicated creams, eye drops etc.**

Student Attendance in Government Schools - Taking leave during school terms.

Dear Parents / Guardians

When your child is away from school it is important parents comply with the guidelines set out in the Student Attendance Policy, the Student Attendance in Government Schools procedures as well as established school procedures.

TRAVEL DURING THE SCHOOL TERM

Parents will be required to complete an *Application for Extended Leave - Travel* and provide to the Principal for their consideration. If the Principal accepts the reason for travel, the absence will be marked as 'Leave' and a *Certificate of Extended Leave - Travel* will be issued.

Before applying for *Extended Leave - Travel* students should discuss any scheduled assessment tasks with the Head Teacher of the subject and check the school calendar for timetabled activities.

This application form should be submitted <u>two weeks</u> prior to the date of departure. The form is to be submitted at the student window.

If travel leave is taken without prior knowledge of the Principal, the leave will be marked as UNEXPLAINED - UNJUSTIFIED.

The Application for Extended Leave - Travel, is found under 'School Documents' on the Parent Portal.

MISSED WORK, ASSESSMENT TASKS AND MANDATORY PROGRAMS

It is the **student's responsibility** to find out and catch up on missed work from their classroom teacher or the Faculty Head Teacher.

Students who seek permission for leave must take into consideration the timetabling of *formal assessment tasks* and **mandatory programs** such as Crossroads. A student missing a formal assessment task can be given a zero (0) result if they fail to complete the tasks at the scheduled time. Application for leave during this time *may not* be approved.

Students taking leave during periods of **formal assessment tasks** and **mandatory programs** may be recorded as EXPLAINED - UNJUSTIFIED.

NSW Senior Secondary Student Concession Cards

These cards are for school students who have reached 16 years of age and over who are attending certified day school. They permit students to travel at concession rate of fare on all Sydney Trains, State Transit and privately operated buses and Government ferries. Senior Secondary Student Concession Cards also entitle the holder to purchase a child/youth opal card and a concession fare on NSW Train services.

NB: Concession cards expire on 31 March of the following year, or upon the student entering employment on leaving school. If the student enters employment, this card must be returned immediately to the Passes & Schemes Unit.

Application forms for *Senior Secondary Student Concession Cards*, for students 16 years and over, are available from the Front Office. If you have recently changed your address, your application will *not* be processed until a *Change of Address* form has been processed by the school.




