Correct Procedure When Approaching a Pedestrian Crossing

As you approach a pedestrian crossing or children's crossing where a School Crossing Supervisor is displaying a 'STOP Children Crossing' sign, you must slow down and stop. You may proceed when the School Crossing Supervisor no longer displays the sign in your direction or has indicated it is safe for you to proceed.

Stop signs may be placed at an intersection immediately after a pedestrian crossing. You must stop at the stop sign even if you have already stopped at the pedestrian crossing.



Please Note: If the road beyond a children's crossing or pedestrian crossing is blocked, you MUST NOT drive onto the crossing.

8T Tell Quantum Physicists How to Write

The great Richard Feynman famously said, "If you think you understand quantum mechanics, you don't understand quantum mechanics", but the Science journal *Quantum* and Dr Chris Ferrie of the University of Technology Sydney, have been working to change this idea. Published researchers from all over the world were invited to rewrite their papers in language accessible to teenagers, with the idea to republish in a new journal targeting a younger crowd called *Quantum Leaps*. During Week 6, class 8T took a break from their regular Science topic to become the esteemed experts in this project; their job was to help researchers better communicate findings to young people.

The students from CTHS were tasked with reviewing finalists for this competition with entries about gravity, time travel, quantum computing and superconductors, written by researchers from Spain, India, Slovenia and Denmark among other places. The students were asked to comment on whether the paper was easy for them to understand, how important they think the results are to society and if they think the paper should be accepted, rejected or revised. Out of seven papers, only one was accepted as it was, while the remaining six were sent back to be revised; Dr Ferrie describing the student's comments as "ruthless, but I love it".

Students in 8T said the exercise was engaging and developed a deeper understanding of the peer review process in Science as well as some knowledge about fundamental quantum physics. In one of the first endeavours of its kind, prospects about engaging high school students in areas usually reserved for post-graduate university students may help pave the way for emerging technologies and scientific discoveries earlier than anticipated.

ArtExpress 2018

On Tuesday, the Year 11 and 12 Visual Arts classes were taken by Ms Donoghue, Ms Jaeger and Mr Maynard to see ArtExpress 2018, the exhibition of selected HSC major artworks from last year. We went to the two displays, one at the NSW Gallery in the city and the other at the Armory, Homebush.

We were blown away by the ingenuity and the mastery of craft coming from high school students! While we expected to see many traditional styles and mediums of art, many of them utilised bizarre materials and explored ideas that were often confronting or peculiar, from personal interests to social issues.

We saw artworks ranging from extraordinarily realistic portrait paintings, to plants sculpted out of polystyrene cups, demonstrating students' artistic prowess as well as their creativity and the ability to push boundaries of conventional art. The works displayed exhibited thinking that was not only deep but wide! Our perceptions of everyday items were challenged and the items put under the scrutiny of an artistic lens, allowing us to see beauty where it is not normally noticed. Some of the artworks focused purely on aesthetic value, such as examining the impact of shape, lighting and colour.



After closely studying these brilliant artworks, we were prompted to expand our minds and think laterally about how to approach our own artworks. Although it was a drizzly and grey day, we left with colours blooming in our brains about our future art pieces. Thank you to the teachers who accompanied us on this enlightening experience.


