PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



Minimum Literacy / Numeracy Tests

Congratulations to all Year 10 students who sat the first online tests in literacy and numeracy last week. 165 students, who had not reached Band 8 or above in one of their Year 9 NAPLAN tests, sat a total of 260 tests.

In an outstanding effort students achieved the minimum standard in 248 of the 260 tests and went very close in the other papers.

Students are commended for their effort, attitude and sheer hard work, which led to these outstanding results.

Swimming for Life

Last week's Sun Herald newspaper ran a very interesting article, which wrote about the decline in the number of young people who had basic swimming skills.

The paper cited statistics, which showed 40 percent of students starting Year 7 couldn't swim 50 metres and one third couldn't swim 25 metres of survival strokes.

I was not at all surprised by this information as, during my sixteen years as Principal at Cherrybrook, I have noticed increasing numbers of non-swimmers starting high school and fewer and fewer students with the ability to complete a 50 metre event at the school Swimming Carnival.

In a country where the vast bulk of the population live close to the coast and in an area such as Cherrybrook, which has an enormous number of home swimming pools, I find this to be particularly alarming.

I am of the view that young people in Australia need swimming skills, just as they need literacy and numeracy skills. Parents need to take the initiative and enrol their children in swimming lessons and continue with these until such time as the young person is a proficient swimmer.

Year 11 Camp

A reminder to all Year 11 students, they will be attending camp at Jindabyne next week. During their time away students will participate in a variety of programs which meet the outcomes of the Department's Crossroads course and also have an opportunity to engage in a range of outdoor activities which are both challenging and enjoyable. Students will be departing school at 6.00am on Tuesday morning, 3 April and return on Friday evening, 6 April.

Students should note, daylight saving ends on Sunday 1 April at 3.00am when clocks are turned backward one hour to 2.00am local standard time. Sunrise and sunset will be about one hour earlier than the day before.

Staff Development Evening

On Monday afternoon / evening 9 April, staff at Cherrybrook will be involved in the second of our Staff Development sessions for 2018. The focus will be on mandatory CPR and anaphylaxis training thus ensuring all staff have the skills to cope with an emergency situation.

End of Term 1 and Start of Term 2

We are rapidly approaching the end of a long term. School will finish at 3.00pm on Friday 13 April and all students are expected to attend until the end of classes on that day. Students will not return to school until Tuesday 1 May, the only exception being Year 11 students who may have examinations on Monday 30 April.

All Year 11 students need to check their examination timetables carefully and ensure they are on time and prepared for each of their tests.

School Contributions


A big thank you to all members of the Cherrybrook community who have paid their school contributions so rapidly.


Surprise Guest Teacher

Dollarsmart Commerce Product Testing

On Thursday 15 March, Mr Fernandez' Dollarsmart Commerce class participated in product testing. As well as forming an important part of their assessment in this course, the experience proved to be a fun one for all involved. Prior to the product testing afternoon, the students were challenged by questions such as, "How important are branding and marketing in shaping the purchasing decisions of consumers." Students sought to devise practical experiments to help them answer this question in relation to common household foodstuffs. Students offered their peers samples of their chosen food as a part of a 'brand blind' taste test. In exchange, the tasters answered questions, devised by the Commerce class, about the importance of branding and marketing in consumer decisions.

Several things about the experience were very pleasing. First, it was good to see so many students learning through experience. Second, it was great to see students not only making plans and setting goals, but also seeing them through to their conclusion. Third, I am reminded of how lucky we are at Cherrybrook to be able to run innovative practical activities such as this, with the full support of staff, parents and the student body. Fewer Students Accepted into Uni Based on ATAR Alone




