Last week I had the pleasure of attending the Australia for UNHCR Breakfast with a group of staff and students from CTHS. The Assembly followed on from this excellent event recognising the plight of refugees and the crisis which exists given the sheer numbers of people forcibly displaced around the world today, approximately 68.5 million. We invited Ms Zimmermann from Australia for UNHCR and two guest speakers, who spoke at the breakfast in the city, Ms Afahar and Ms Hagob. Both of these young women spoke from the heart about their experiences of living in Syria, whilst the war raged around them, in what was a very raw and touching account of the atrocities they have witnessed. Following on form this, a morning tea was organised to thank our guests for their contribution to what was an outstanding Assembly. Feedback from both staff and students about the Assembly was extremely positive. A huge thank you must go to Mr Murphy, who is a long time supporter of Australia for UNHCR and their work and was instrumental in organising the Assembly content and the involvement of our special guests.







Rite of Passage Canyoning Day

On Monday 18 June, we set off at 6am to the Blue Mountains to go canyoning for the day. When we got there we had some breakfast, prepared by the boys, then started our 3km bush walk to the canyon. The walk to the canyon was amazing and, at a point when you looked out to your right, there was a view of the mountains and canyons. Also when you walked you could hear all the birds chirping.

When we arrived at the canyons the instructors set up ropes for us to abseil down. The first abseil was about 15m down into a canyon with three more ahead of us. As we got to the bottom of the fourth canyon we had our lunch, which a group of the boys made for all of us, and walked about 1km to the fifth and final abseil. It was about a 30m deep canyon. Access was through a tiny gap in the rocks and we had to twist and turn to fit in. It dropped 30m straight down into a very dark cave and personally, this was the scariest one. After all our boys and the four teachers made it back out of the cave, we trekked the 4kms back to the vans with lots of rocky mountains and steep ascents. At one point we were literally scrambling up the rock face. Although the day was quite physically and mentally challenging, it was a great opportunity for many of the boys, including Riko and myself, to overcome our fears and learn that sometimes when we start something, there is no other option but to finish. Basically, it showed us that if we start something we have to move forward and do whatever it takes to finish the task at hand.



In a new scheme designed to diversify the university's ranks, school leavers will be asked to meet a minimum threshold of community service and extra-curricular activity such as working part-time, playing sport or volunteering, on top of achieving the right score for their degree.

ANU Vice Chancellor, Professor Brian Schmidt, said students were more than "just a score" and had unique skills on offer from time spent volunteering, working part-time, excelling in sports or performance or participating in student leadership.


