Opening of New Building and Multi-Purpose Sports Courts

Remembrance Day

Today all students at Cherrybrook gathered on our new multi-purpose courts to mark one hundred years since the end of World War 1. Students were provided with some very important information about the day and held a minute's silence at 11.00am.

This year Remembrance Day will fall on Sunday and fittingly the school took the opportunity on Friday, to reflect on the fact a century has passed since the guns on the Western Front were finally stilled.

As always our students were respectful and thoughtful as they reflected on those who had given their life in the service of our country, not just in the Great War but all conflicts our troops have served in.

All parents are encouraged to attend and enjoy the evening.


Student Attendance and End-of-Year Arrangements

CTHS Teachers Continue to Lead Maths Education

On Wednesday night, seven of our Mathematics teachers took part in a TeachMeet organised by the Mathematics Association of New South Wales (MANSW) at Knox Grammar School. The event provided networking opportunities and a forum to share innovative teaching practices. The theme of the session was *My Favourite Lesson*. Four of our teachers presented either a two or seven minute session. Mrs Saxena discussed her use of models to deepen student understanding of 3D trigonometry; Mrs Halliday presented her investigative lessons on the properties of quadrilaterals; Mrs Lees discussed using M&Ms to model Exponential Growth and Decay; and Mrs Sing presented her fantastic video lessons which we will be using to prepare our students for the new Stage 6 Advanced and Extension 1 Mathematics courses in 2019. Other ideas presented included Coding in Mathematics; Great Maths Apps; and Using Foldables in the new Networks topic. The knowledge, enthusiasm and commitment of our staff, including Ms Zhang, Mrs Bartlett and Mr Ferrarin in the audience, was clearly evident. Our participation in professional development events brings new teaching and learning opportunities and quality resources to Cherrybrook Technology High School, and continues to enhance our reputation as a centre for quality teaching.

Year 7 Human Papillomavirus Vaccine (Dose 2)

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or phoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation.

To improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses throughout the year where possible.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic, either as a physical card or a text message sent to the mobile number recorded on the consent form (within one business day). Parents/guardians should ensure this record is kept for future reference and should not assume their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this Record of Vaccination.

Notification of Measles, Chickenpox, Whooping Cough or Influenza

Dear Parents / Carers

We write to inform you a student in our school is currently receiving treatment, which results in a lowered immune system. This means the student is more prone to getting ill from infections. As the student is not contagious, but has a chronic illness, it is important he/she participates actively in the day-to-day school program without any major limitations. A major concern is if this student develops Measles, Chickenpox, Whooping Cough or Influenza, he/she could become seriously ill. We seek your cooperation in preventing this situation.

If your child has or may have Measles, Chickenpox, Whooping Cough or Influenza, we ask you to please:

- 1. Not send them to school
- 2. Notify the Stage Head Teacher as soon as possible
- 3. Take them to your GP or Medical Centre to confirm diagnosis.

PROCEDURES FOR SICK STUDENTS

Students who are sick during class should see a teacher for written permission to go to sick bay. They must present themselves promptly to the **front office** and politely follow instructions from the office staff, who will then contact a parent/guardian when necessary. Sick bay is used for a short time only. Students should not call their parents in the first instance. **Please be advised the school does not supply any medication, including pain killers, medicated creams, eye drops etc.**

Clean4Shore Excursion

Enjoying picturesque conditions, we visited Bar Point, The Twin Beaches, Fisherman's Port and the Parramatta Wreck. The first item we collected during the trip was most exciting and unusual. We had the pleasure of bringing on board a unicorn floatie which we later named Starla. Having gone on the excursion on the same day as the Melbourne Cup, Mr Clements put on Starla and gave us a wonderful imitation of racing in the Melbourne Cup!

Our next large find was found by Emalee. It was a large piece of hard red plastic which was part of a semi-trailer. This just shows how far rubbish can travel, if a piece of a truck can end up in the Hawkesbury River. Alongside bottles, plastic bags, straws and other bits and bobs, we collected lots of rubbish which could have done some serious harm to the environment.

For recess we stopped at the Twin Beaches where half the group cleaned Beach One and the others cleaned Beach Two. Beach One is a campsite and hidden in the metre high grass were ripped clothes, a frisbee, tennis balls, a mess kit, as well as lots of beer bottles and cans were collected.

From rock-hopping, observing marine creatures such as crabs and jellyfish, seeing a sea eagle and of course witnessing Mr Clements gracefully falling into the muddy mangrove waters and of course collecting rubbish, the day was filled with fun. Local residents praised our efforts as we were able to clear the estuarine environment of some 220kgs of rubbish, which was then taken by Jono to Woy Woy tip.

Our thanks to Jono, Mr Clements and Mr Caccamo, plus Mitchell's assistance, for steering the large barge, as the day would not have been possible without their efforts.



Careers Update

CTHS Career Mentoring Program

Our final gathering for the Year 11 Career Mentoring Program was held last Friday morning. In attendance were the Year 11 mentee students, their business mentors, parents and staff. In a fitting finale each of the students and their mentors delivered a presentation outlining how they benefitted by participating in the Career Mentoring Program and the *Shadow Day* in the workplace. There were positive stories all round, with many students speaking of the strong connections they had made with their mentor and the appreciation they had for the time and effort they have invested in them. Many students indicated the experience had confirmed their interest in their chosen career while others indicated the Program had shown a different field of work might better suit them. A rewarding aspect of the Program, as reported by a number of the students, was the ongoing link they had with their mentors outside of the allocated session times, with many indicating they were keen to keep in touch in the future. The business mentors also spoke positively about the Program with many indicating they were keen to be involved again.

A big thank you must go to the organisers of the Career Mentoring Program, our Careers Advisers, Mrs Stallard for her important administration work behind the scenes and Mr Fisher and the Year 12 students, who assisted with the catering for the morning sessions throughout. We would also like to thank the Career Mentors, for without their involvement, time and effort, this Program would not have been possible. Some of whom were parents of the school, whilst others were sourced from our local community links and the CTHS Alumni.

MasterCard Career Mentoring Program

Ten of our students, together with some parents and Mrs Bower, visited MasterCard at their new location in St Leonards to celebrate the conclusion of the 2018 Career Mentoring Partnership Program.

This was an inspirational occasion with both mentors and mentees presenting their reflections of the Program, including highlights and important life lessons learnt. Here are some of these reflections from our students:

- "Getting a job somewhere is chiefly about *fitting in with the company's culture*, so making sure you gel with people and that the company's values align with your own are quite imperative."
- "Finding out how whatever desk work is being done actually affects the outside world was very insightful."
- "A first-hand, vivid insight into the nature of corporate lifestyle which I really appreciated."
- "I learnt vital skills in the entrepreneurial and business world such as the importance of communication, teamwork and managing risk."
- "Even if I am still not sure what I want to do when I leave school, I have learnt that I need to do what I am passionate about and make the most of any opportunity that comes my way."

We would like to formally thank the MasterCard Mentors for their ongoing support of these students and in particular, the Team Leader, Joseph Vukasovic, Global Head and Vice President MasterCard and Jocelyn Cruz, Senior Analyst, for their co-ordination of this Program in partnership with our school. We look forward to continuing this career mentoring partnership and expanding the Program in the future.

Alternative University Pathways

Universities **want** you to attend their institution (they are a business at the end of the day, and more students means more income). If you've chosen a course you really like or a uni you really want to go to, check their website for alternative pathways. For example, Macquarie University offer <u>8 different entry pathways!</u> Yes you read that right, EIGHT.

Here's a quick run-down of what they are and how they work:

- Next Step Pathway successfully complete a series of units and guarantee entry into one of eighteen Degrees on offer
- Macquarie University International College Successfully complete one of four specially designed Diplomas (also called Foundation Courses) and you are eligible for entry into the second year of a Degree, so you won't even lose time
- Internal Transfer Enrol in a Degree with a lower ATAR requirement than your preference you may have missed out on. Within six months. transfer to your preferred Degree.
- Transfer from another University Complete a minimum of twelve months on another tertiary course and apply through UAC
 to your preferred Macquarie course
- Special Tertiary Admissions Test You will have to successfully complete a series of competency and critical thinking tests
- TAFE and Private College Completed TAFE and College qualifications as a stepping stone to a Macquarie University Degree, you can apply directly for some courses and through UAC for others
- Open Universities Australia (OUA) Apply to do an online course with Macquarie, you can do this for the duration of your studies or you can apply via UAC to study on campus if you complete four units within four thirteen-week sessions.

Alternative Career Pathways

You could apply for a job straight out of school, get work experience and work your way up the career ladder. It's not an easy route by any means, but if it's an option for the career of your choice, you'll start earning straight away and be pursuing the job you wanted.

If you want to join the Police or the Fire Service then tertiary education isn't a requirement. You can apply directly through relevant State services. As long as you meet all the requirements and pass the admissions tests, you could be embarking on a career within months of leaving school. Check out the service you're interested in, entry requirements can differ between states.

If you are an Australian who has completed Year 10 you <u>may be eligible to join the Australian Defence Force (ADF)</u>. The training, qualifications and work experience you can access through the ADF is phenomenal. It's definitely worth seeing if the career you want is an option through them. You will have to commit for a period of time, but not forever if it turns out to be something you don't love. Meanwhile you'll get plenty of support, opportunities and learn lots.

Vocational Education And Training (VET)

There are literally thousands of Diplomas and Certificate qualifications available for courses delivering work-place specific knowledge and skills across lots of careers and industries. You can study anything from trades, office work, management, retail, hospitality, tourism and technology.

You can even study in-class or online through TAFE or RTOs (Registered Training Organisations). Again, there are thousands of options for institutions as well as courses.

Narrow down your options by deciding an area you want to study. Search for courses matching your requirements and then by location or on-line options. It's always worth checking if you are eligible for any grants or additional funding which can cover some or all of the costs.

Search for courses or institutions here as a great starting point.

TAFF

Technical and Further Education (TAFE) institutions are Government owned providers of VET courses. They are found throughout Australia and offer countless study options.

If you have completed Year 10 at school you can study at TAFE. The qualifications (see VET section) are just as valid and transferrable as a University Degree (and can be a pathway into university if that is your end goal) and potential employers view TAFE qualifications as favourably as degrees in many cases.

TAFE institutions offer courses on various subject areas, including:

- Agriculture
- Arts and Design
- · Building and Furnishing
- · Business and Marketing
- Community and Health
- Education and Languages
- · Engineering and Transport
- Food and Beverage
- Hair and Beauty
- Hospitality and Tourism
- Information Technology

So you will be able to find a course that "floats your boat". You can search through some of the courses here.

Apprenticeships, Traineeships and Cadetships

A great way to kick-off a career! There are over 250,000 apprentices and trainees in training around Australia, across lots of different industries.

Interested in an apprenticeship? Start here.

Cadetships are similar to apprenticeships, employers offer industry specific combined vocational training and work experience.

There are cadetships available within Australian Government Departments and lots of private companies from Jetstar through to the Guide Dogs Association and everything in between. Bear in mind that many cadetships have higher entry requirements and can be competitive.
