PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



Welcome to 2019

A big welcome to all parents and students to the 2019 academic year after what I hope was a restful and enjoyable holiday. I especially welcome our new parents who have children commencing at Cherrybrook for the first time this year. I sincerely hope your involvement with Cherrybrook Technology High will be happy and beneficial.

Outstanding HSC Results

A review of the 2018 HSC revealed many, many outstanding results. Chief among the many excellent performers were the ten students who achieved results, which led to each of them being recognised in the

All-rounders Awards. These students are Angad Singh Ahuja, Bryan Gunawan, Hemanshi Kumar, Ivan Leow, Domenic Maselli, Rebecca McKee, Archana Obeyesekera, Wanyun Qu, Tszho Seto and Dylan Vellani, who each scored a band six (or the highest band available) in each of their courses of study.

We also had four students who achieved a Top Twenty Place in three separate courses of study, these were Adelea Kee in Biology; Courtney Cockerton in Textiles and Design; and Abina Kirubaharan and Lucy Loh in Aboriginal Studies.

An analysis of students ATARs, gathered by the school, revealed at least seven students scored ATARs greater than 99 and approximately 100 students scored ATARs greater than 90. In total 148 students from the class of 2018 were recognised on the Board of Studies Honour Roll for a total of 331 credits.

Each of these students, and their parents, will attend a special Awards Ceremony at the school on Friday 15 February to celebrate their success.

Pleasingly, beyond these students, we also had the vast majority of Year 12 students achieve their personal goals and gain entry into the course of their choosing or commence work in their field of interest.

A Multi-Cultural Inclusive School

One of the things I am most proud of in this school is the fact that this school has students from 68 different language backgrounds and that each and every day our students work harmoniously together, interacting with one another in a very positive manner regardless of their ethnic heritage. Consequently, I was very surprised to recently learn that one particular ethnic and religious group has established a closed communication group aimed at seeking support for students from this particular ethnic and religious group. My understanding is this group, led by parents, is intended to be an exclusive group, which promotes support for students of the same background in a variety of different ways and in some cases, it has been suggested, seem to be seeking advantage not open to other students. I would be most disappointed if this was the case, as this is very much against the philosophy and values of this school which include promoting harmonious relationships and ensuring each and every student is valued and indeed given, "a fair go" equally.

I have also been advised some families who do not reside within the geographic boundaries of the school catchment area may be seeking support from this group to establish false residency status in order to enrol students in the school. I would remind anyone attempting to do this, or being party to such activity, that several years ago the Department of Fair Trading investigated a number of families who were found to have provided false documentation in order to gain enrolment. These families and those who provided the false documentation were then prosecuted.

School Uniform

It was really pleasing to sit in the MPC at our recent assemblies and see our students return for the beginning of the academic year so well attired.

Students looked marvellous in crisp new uniforms and appropriate black leather shoes. It is now most important this wonderful standard be maintained throughout the year. Parental support of our school uniform policy is vital to this.

School Contributions

Please be aware that school contributions will be due in the very near future. A full costing of elective contributions, and the general contribution, will be emailed home later in February.

Funds raised are necessary for student electives to continue in their current format, while the general contribution supports a variety of student programs and needs, including the purchase of the most appropriate texts and resources to support student learning. Parents will note the P&C contribution, which is also included on these schedules. The P&C do not engage in significant fund raising activities. Twenty-seven years ago the parent body determined the best way to support resources for students was via a levy rather

Tadhg Ashby at Summer School

The Aboriginal Summer School for Excellence in Technology and Science (ASSETS) is an Aboriginal summer camp which is run every year at the University of Newcastle during the summer holidays. This nine-day camp gave me the opportunity to meet other Aboriginal students from around Australia and be able to connect with them on a personal level. The camp featured the topics Water Chemistry and Solar Energy, it also included cultural activities, so I could connect with my culture.

At camp I was able to learn a lot of cultural knowledge and practises. I learnt to play the didgeridoo better and I performed with the rest of the boys on camp. I also learnt about traditional medicines, how to start a fire and stories that were relevant for the Awabakal people, being the Indigenous nation where the University is based. I spent the first six days learning about Water Chemistry and Solar Energy. The following two days were spent in my group creating, performing and analysing the results of our experiments. On the final day we presented our findings to the students, instructors and parents on our chosen topic. Our topic was 'the effects of distillation and filtering on different types of water'. We used a variety of different water types and tests on the water samples we collected to find our results. We as a group hypothesised that distillation would have the greatest impact on the water and our results supported our hypothesis.

One surprising result of the water testing done by another group proved that Newcastle tap water is better for you than any bottled water available at the supermarket.

The ASSETS program was an incredible experience where I made new friends, many happy memories and learnt more about my culture.



NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program.

In 2019 the following vaccines will be offered:

Years	Vaccine	Number of Doses
Year 7	Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine	2 doses at least 6 months apart
	Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine	Single dose
Year 10	Meningococcal ACWY vaccine	Single dose

Parent Information Kits that include an information sheet, consent form and privacy statement will be sent home to parents/guardians. To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to:

- · Read all the information provided
- Complete the consent form, including signing their name next to the vaccine/s they would like their child to receive
- Return the completed consent form to their child's school
- Ensure their child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Please note, students who commence HPV vaccination in school clinics in Year 7, but do not complete the course during the school year, may be offered catchup doses at school in Year 8. Students who have any HPV doses at their GP will be advised to complete the course with their GP.

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to or phoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation.

To improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses throughout the year where possible.

A Record of Vaccination card will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic. Parents/guardians should ensure this record is kept for future reference and should not assume their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this Record of Vaccination.

Frequently asked questions:

- My child received the Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine when they were aged 4. Do they need this one? Yes this is a booster dose that all adolescents in Year 7 require.
- My child received the Meningococcal vaccine when they were an infant. Is this the same vaccine? The Australian Childhood Immunisation Schedule included Meningococcal C vaccine. This vaccine contains four strains offering additional protection against Meningococcal ACWY.

Student Attendance in Government Schools

Dear Parents / Guardians

When your child is away from school it is important parents comply with the guidelines set out in the Student Attendance Policy, the Student Attendance in Government Schools Procedures, as well as established School Procedures.

Please note the following requirements:

1. ABSENCE FROM SCHOOL

Parents are required to provide an explanation of absence to the school within seven days from the first day of any period of absence.

This explanation can take place in the form of an email, text message or written note.

2. TRAVEL DURING THE SCHOOL TERM

Parents will be required to complete an *Application for Extended Leave - Travel* form and submit it to the Principal for his / her consideration. If the Principal accepts the reason for travel, the absence will be marked as 'Leave' and a *Certificate of Extended Leave - Travel* will be issued.

Before applying for *Extended Leave - Travel*, **it is the responsibility of students** to discuss any scheduled assessment tasks with the Head Teacher of each of their subjects and check the school calendar for timetabled activities.

Senior student will be required to submit the *Application for Leave - Senior Student Assessment Amendment Request form*

This Application for Extended Leave - Travel form and Senior Student Assessment Amendment Request form must be submitted to the student window, **two weeks prior** to the date of departure. Both forms are available from the Parent Portal, located under 'School Documents'.

If travel leave is taken without prior knowledge of the Principal, the leave will be marked as **UNEXPLAINED - UNJUSTIFIED**.

Please note: School Policy requires you to provide the completed *Application for Extended Leave - Travel* form, along with all necessary documentation, for more than three days absence from school.

3. MISSED WORK, ASSESSMENT TASKS AND MANDATORY PROGRAMS

It is the **student's responsibility** to find out and catch up on missed work from their classroom teacher or the Faculty Head Teacher.

Students who seek permission for leave must take into consideration the timetabling of *formal assessment tasks* and **mandatory programs** such as Crossroads. A student missing a formal assessment task can be given a zero (0) result if they fail to complete the tasks at the scheduled time. Application for leave during this time *may not* be approved.

Students taking leave during periods of formal assessment tasks and mandatory programs may be recorded as EXPLAINED - UNJUSTIFIED.


Periodically the school sends home an 'Absentee Notice' when an explanation for absence has not been received.


If you have reason to query the absence, please note this on the 'Reason for Absence' tear off slip. Your query will be investigated and dealt with in due course.

Remember! Road safety starts with you!

Driving Safely

- Check all passengers are buckled up.
- Stick to the 40km/h speed limit.
- Always look out for pedestrians, especially at crossings and intersections.
- Avoid U-turns and three-point-turns within the school zone.
- Look for buses pulling out and always pass a bus with flashing orange lights at 40km/h



Walking to School Plan your trip to school and use safe crossing locations if possible. Always hold your childs hand as they need help to spot dangers such as vehicles exiting driveways

School is back!

Here are some safety tips for driving and parking within school zones, as well as road rule information to help keep you and your children safe.

Drop-off and Pick-up Time

If you are able to drop your children off quickly, consider using a No Parking or Kiss & Drop zone or drop them further down the road a bit and let them walk to the gate.

How to use a No Parking zone

A No Parking zone is a drop-off, pick-up location. Remember:

- You can stop for a maximum of two minutes in the zone.
- The driver must remain within three metres of their vehicle.
- The driver must not leave their vehicle unattended.

Parking Tips

- Always follow the road rules. Remember road rules around schools are there to keep you and your children safe.
- If possible, make sure children exit your vehicle on the footpath-side or verge side when getting in and out of the car.
- Never stop on a pedestrian crossing or double park as you will obstruct sight lines for other drivers and pedestrians, which outs others at risk.
- Park safely, even if it means walking further to the school gate to drop-off or pick-up your child. It's a great way to connect with your child before and after school (away from screens).
 Pick your children up five to ten minutes
- Pick your children up five to ten minutes after the bell in the afternoon, to avoid the most congested period. Ask them to wait inside the school gate for safety.
- If you park across the road, walk over to meet your child. Never call them across the road to you.



No Stopping and Bus Zones

Never stop in a No Stopping zone as you will obstruct sight lines for other drivers and pedestrians, which puts others at risk.

Bus Zones are purely for the use of commercial buses and no other vehicles.

Child Car Seats

It is important your child is restrained in the correct child car seat for their age and size:

- It is recommended to keep older children in a booster seat until they are at least 145cm in height.
- A child that is correctly secured in an approved child car seat is less likely to be killed or injured in a crash than one who is not.

Parking and traffic rules in school zones

You need to take extra care when driving and parking in school zones. Make sure that you and your child understand the road rules. If you break the traffic rules in a school zone you are putting not only your child but other children at risk. The parking and traffic rules around our schools are there to protect your children. If you break the rules you will be fined. **Please choose safety over convenience.**



PROCEDURES FOR SICK STUDENTS

Students who are sick during class should see a teacher for written permission to go to sick bay. They must present themselves promptly to the **front office** and politely follow instructions from the office staff, who will then contact a parent/guardian when necessary. Students should not call their parents in the first instance. **Please be advised the school does not supply any medication, including pain killers, medicated creams, eye drops etc.**

PROCEDURE FOR EARLY LEAVERS

If a student needs to leave school early, they *must* provide a note from their parent/guardian giving reasons for their partial absence. The student must hand the note in at the student window before 8.30am where they will be issued with a leave pass. They can then present this pass to their teacher and leave school at the appropriate time.

On Thursdays (sport days) all students in Years 9-11 **MUST** have their early leave notes signed by a member of the PE staff before presenting to the office.




