PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



Link with Papua New Guinea formalised

Following an invitation from the Federal Government the school recently applied to become one of three NSW schools to pilot an innovative program linking Australian schools to schools in Papua New Guinea (PNG). Pleasingly, the school has been advised, our application has been successful.

The upshot of this means we are to begin a relationship with PNG schools which will involve some teacher and student exchange with the ultimate goal to up-skill teachers in PNG and to provide greater educational opportunities for PNG students. The Australian Federal Government is fully funding the scheme.

For the students and staff of Cherrybrook we will have an opportunity to expand our knowledge of our near neighbours and be proactive in establishing quality relations with a range of educators and students from the linked schools.

The first stage of the process gets underway in early August when we will have a school visit from twelve PNG Principals and three education department bureaucrats. These visitors will then proceed to Canberra for an official reception.

I will keep you informed as this exciting initiative develops.

The assemblies featured student voice with our Indigenous students sharing their views of growing up as a young Aboriginal person in modern day Australia and being part of our Cherrybrook community. The assemblies also featured dance, music and a guest Aboriginal artist who performed playing the didgeridoo and singing traditional songs.

My congratulations are extended to Mrs Navarro, her Year 10 Aboriginal Studies students and our Indigenous students on the magnificent job of organising and leading such an important assembly.

FIRST AID

Please note Cherrybrook Technology High School does not have any medical practitioners on the premises. We provide first aid assistance to students who are unwell or injured. *Please be advised the school does not supply any medication, including pain killers, medicated creams, eye drops etc*

PROCEDURE FOR EARLY LEAVERS

If a student needs to leave school early, they *must* provide a note from their parent/guardian giving reasons for their partial absence. **The student must hand the note in at the student window before 8.30am** where they will be issued with a leave pass. They can then present this pass to their teacher and leave school at the appropriate time.

On Thursdays (sport days) all students in Years 9-11 **MUST** have their early leave notes signed by a member of the PE staff before presenting to the office.

The school has received numerous reports regarding influenza. If your child shows signs of influenza it is recommended you see your doctor and keep your child at home until they look and feel better (five days from onset has been recommended)



Communicable Diseases Factsheet

Influenza

Influenza (flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. Most people recover after a few days but for some people it can be fatal. An influenza vaccination each year provides the best protection against influenza.

What is influenza?

Influenza, or flu, is a highly contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. There are three main types of influenza virus that cause infection in humans, types A, B and C, as well as many sub-types or strains. Influenza can occur throughout the year, but influenza activity usually peaks in winter.

What are the symptoms?

People with influenza typically experience some or all of the following symptoms for at least a week:

- Fever and chills
- · Cough, sore throat and runny or stuffy nose
- Muscle aches, joint pains, headaches and fatigue (feeling verytired)
- Nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea (more common in children than adults).

Some symptoms may last for more than a week. Some people may also experience very mild symptoms, particularly if they have some immunity from a previous infection or vaccination.

How is it spread?

- · Influenza viruses are mainly spread by droplets made when an infected person coughs or sneezes
- Influenza can also spread after touching surfaces where infected droplets have landed
- Influenza can be spread to someone by an infected person even before their symptoms begin
- · Adults with influenza are infectious from the day before their symptoms start until five-seven days later
- Young children and people with weakened immune systems may be infectious for longer.

Take action to stop the spread of influenza by remembering to:

- · Cover your face when you cough or sneeze and throw used tissues in a rubbish bin
- Wash your hands thoroughly and often; wash hands for at least ten seconds, especially after coughing, sneezing or blowing your nose, or use an alcohol-based hand rub
- Stay at home until you're well. Wait at least 24 hours after your fever resolves so you that you aren't likely to infect other people. Keep sick children away from school and other activities
- Call ahead to see a doctor. If you think you may have influenza and you need to see a doctor, remember to call first so the clinic can take precautions to reduce the risk to other people.

Notification of Measles, Chickenpox, Whooping Cough or Influenza

Dear Parents / Carers

We write to inform you a student in our school is currently receiving treatment, which results in a lowered immune system. This means the student is more prone to getting ill from infections. As the student is not contagious, but has a chronic illness, it is important he/she participates actively in the day-to-day school program without any major limitations. A major concern is if this student develops Measles, Chickenpox, Whooping Cough or Influenza, he/she could become seriously ill. We seek your cooperation in preventing this situation.

If your child has or may have Measles, Chickenpox, Whooping Cough or Influenza, we ask you to please:

- 1. Not send them to school
- 2. Notify the Stage Head Teacher as soon as possible
- 3. Take them to your GP or Medical Centre to confirm diagnosis.
