#### NAPLAN

Parents of students in Years 7 and 9 will no doubt have noted the Press frenzy following the release of the most recent NAPLAN results.

The information resulted in the annual doom and gloom predictions about the future of our youth being made by various writers in opinion pieces for the media outlets, ironically often complete with spelling and grammatical errors.

This week our school has been provided with Cherrybrook students' results and next week parents should receive individual student results.

As I have said and written many times, these results should be viewed cautiously. They are merely a snapshot of student progress on one particular day of the year and not meant to define a student. As always, our school will use the results in a diagnostic manner, not to compare and contrast students and schools.

Having said this, overall our results were exceptional with Year 9 students achieving our school's best ever results with more students in the top two bands of achievement than any other cohort whilst our Year 7 results were most admirable.

#### Year 10 bstreetsmart Youth and Road Trauma Forum

On Wednesday 11 September, Year 10 attended the *bstreetsmart* Youth and Road Trauma Forum. Westmead Hospital's trauma services designed this program to raise awareness of the need for safety, maturity and responsibility in young drivers and passengers. Held at a packed Qudos Bank Arena Homebush, our students were able to experience presentations on the arena floor, as well as interactive displays during their lunch break. All NSW Emergency Services were represented and dedicated to communicating the need for safety on the road.

The dramatisation of a car crash involving young people under the influence of alcohol and the failure to use safety devices, was thought provoking and shocking. First responders, including the fire, ambulance and police services, demonstrated their professional response to an everyday occurrence, where young drivers, passengers and third parties are seriously injured or killed. Students were also given an understanding of the experience of hospital trauma staff in assessing, rehabilitating and supporting patients, narrated by a member of the Trauma Unit. This was followed by individuals directly affected by trauma who talked about the life-changing cost of vehicle accidents. Students also heard from a mother whose life changed as a result of the loss of her child.

The clear message from the Forum was driving is to be encouraged, but in a sensible and responsible manner. To facilitate this, students were given insight into reducing risk taking behaviour through awareness of the consequences of distracted driving, inattention, speeding, drink and drug driving and driver fatigue. I would like to thank the staff who attended for their support of this excursion and also the organisers of *bstreetsmart* for their dedication to youth safety on the road.

#### Correct Procedure When Approaching a Pedestrian Crossing

As you approach a pedestrian crossing or children's crossing where a School Crossing Supervisor is displaying a 'STOP Children Crossing' sign, you must slow down and stop. You may proceed when the School Crossing Supervisor no longer displays the sign in your direction or has indicated it is safe for you to proceed.

Stop signs may be placed at an intersection immediately after a pedestrian crossing. You must stop at the stop sign even if you have already stopped at the pedestrian crossing.



**Please Note:** If the road beyond a children's crossing or pedestrian crossing is blocked, you **MUST NOT** drive onto the crossing.

#### IMPORTANT INFORMATION!!

Student Attendance in Government Schools

Dear Parents / Guardians

When your child is away from school it is important parents comply with the guidelines set out in the Student Attendance Policy, the *Student Attendance in Government Schools Procedures*, as well as established School Procedures.

Please note the following requirements:

#### 1. ABSENCE FROM SCHOOL

- Parents are required to provide an explanation of absence to the school within seven days from the first day of any period of absence.
- This explanation can take place in the form of an email, text message or written note.

#### 2. TRAVEL DURING THE SCHOOL TERM

- Parents will be required to complete an *Application for Extended Leave Travel* form and submit it to the Principal for his / her consideration. If the Principal accepts the reason for travel, the absence will be marked as 'Leave' and a *Certificate of Extended Leave Travel* will be issued.
- Please note: School Policy requires you to provide the completed *Application for Extended Leave Travel* form, along with all necessary documentation, for more than three days absence from school.
- The Application for Extended Leave Travel form can be downloaded from the Parent Portal, located under 'School Documents'. This form **must** be submitted to the student window, **two weeks prior** to the date of departure.
- Before applying for extended leave, it is the responsibility of students to discuss any scheduled assessment tasks with the Head Teacher of each of their subjects and check the school calendar for timetabled activities.
- Senior student will also be required to submit the Application for Leave Senior Student Assessment Amendment Request form.
- The Application for Extended Leave Travel form and Senior Student Assessment Amendment Request form must be submitted to the student window, two weeks prior to the date of departure. Both forms are available from the Parent Portal, located under 'School Documents'.
- If travel leave is taken without prior knowledge of the Principal, the leave will be marked as UNEXPLAINED UNJUSTIFIED.

#### 3. MISSED WORK, ASSESSMENT TASKS AND MANDATORY PROGRAMS

- It is the student's responsibility to find out and catch up on missed work from their classroom teacher or the Faculty Head Teacher.
- Students who seek permission for leave must take into consideration the timetabling of **formal assessment tasks** and **mandatory programs** such as the Life Ready Program. Students missing a formal assessment task can be given a zero (0) result if they fail to complete the tasks at the scheduled time. Application for leave during this time may *not* be approved.
- Students taking leave during periods of formal assessment tasks and mandatory programs may be recorded as EXPLAINED UNJUSTIFIED.
