Royal visit by Prince Edward, Earl of Wessex

On Saturday 14 September, the Duke of Edinburgh International Award celebrated its 60th anniversary with the largest Gold Award presentation outside of the UK. Four hundred recipients from all over Australia received their awards from one of sixteen well known Australians who have achieved accolades in their fields, including Dawn Fraser, Jeff McMullen, Layne Beechley and our very own Mr Woo (who received the loudest cheers from the awardees!). These well-known Australians presented the awards on behalf of Prince Edward, Earl of Wessex who was in Australia for the celebrations.

One of our ex-students, Darshan Naidoo, who graduated from CTHS in 2017, received his Gold Award during the ceremony. It was a pleasure to join his proud parents for this special occasion. We were pleased to note how completing the Gold Level of the Duke of Edinburgh International Award contributed to the confident, mature, well-rounded adult Darshan has now become. It is our hope our current award participants will be inspired by Darshan's achievements and work.

The same could be said as we walked through the main entrance. Inside the main function room, we talked to teachers and students from right across Sydney, who are also involved in the Duke of Edinburgh Program. It was fascinating to hear other people's stories, learning about the opportunities and experiences they have had during the program. After a lot of small talk and very fancy finger food and drinks, his Royal Highness was announced. It was well worth the wait to see Prince Edward, Earl of Wessex, who was the special guest at the event. After the formalities, we had the opportunity to talk to him, as he asked us about our current progress in the program. Speaking to the Prince was a once in a lifetime experience (probably the only time we will ever get to meet a member of the Royal Family). This special event has inspired us to continue with the Duke of Edinburgh International Award Program which will help us develop our practical skills and provide us with some great experiences which are highly valued by employers. 




PROCEDURE FOR EARLY LEAVERS



We warmly invite you to join the 2020 Hills Relay for Life. Being one of the biggest Relays in New South Wales, over the last two years alone we have raised more than \$600,000 for Cancer Council's research, prevention, advocacy and support services. This heartfelt experience offers the Hills community the chance to get together and have some fun.

Each Relay for Life event is organised by a local volunteer committee on behalf of Cancer Council. Teams get together and fundraise year-round. Everyone then meets at the Relay to celebrate in a relay-style walk or run. You and your team can stay as little as one hour or take the challenge to stay on the track for the whole 24 hours - it's up to you!

The 2020 event promises a fantastic weekend with something for everyone - big stage, live music, great food, and activities for kids. Participants have the opportunity to camp on-site overnight and participate in special ceremonies as a chance of reflection and remembrance to support those living with cancer or those lost to the disease.

Everyone is welcome at Relay, no matter your age or ability. Here's what else you can expect at Relay:

- Survivors of cancer and their Carers are the heart of every Relay, so each Relay begins with a lap around the track in their honour.
- Teams of Relayers can pass a baton as they keep someone on the track at all times.
- In between laps, experience all the activities you can enjoy such as entertainment from local performers, market stalls, competitions and games for the whole family.
- At sunset, we light up the darkness in memory of those we've lost during our candlelight ceremony.
- Inspiring speakers then give us hope for a cancer free future by sharing important updates about the advancements in Cancer Council's work.
- At the end of the Relay, we hold a closing ceremony that celebrates our incredible achievements and motivates us all to continue the fight against cancer.

The main stage will be opened again on the evening of 16th May for to Shave for a Cure. Any team member wishing to participate in the shave will be required to be registered online before the event and to bring their own 'hairdresser' and clippers. This is a great way to earn fundraising for your team, particularly if you have a celebrity teacher who is willing to participate. If your team has any member wishing to participate in this event, we will need these details before 8th May 2020. Due to the limited number of places available on stage, it is advisable to register early. Last minute participation in this event will not be permitted.

Earlybird registrations for each member of your team is \$15 per person until 15th November. We will also require a Youth Supervisor's Form to be completed as a result of our youth supervisor's policy.

NSW Senior Secondary Student Concession Card

The NSW Senior Secondary Student Concession Card is issued free of charge. This card proves you are a student when travelling on public transport, using an Opal child/youth card.



You must keep the Senior Secondary Student Concession Card with your Opal card or be susceptible to a Transport NSW fine.

The Senior Secondary Student Concession Card is valid until 31 March the following year unless you enter fulltime employment.

To be eligible, you must be 16 years or older and meet one of the following criteria:

- Senior secondary student concession card

 Transport

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- Enrolled in a NSW secondary school or non-Government secondary school
- Registered with NESA as a fulltime home schooled or distance education (OTEN) secondary student
- An International school student who meets the criteria.

To apply for the Senior Secondary Student Concession Card, collect an application form from the CTHS front office.

To replace lost cards, collect a Secondary Student Transport Concession Card replacement form from the CTHS front office. A replacement fee of \$10 applies.
