Literary Festival

Senior Executive Planning Day

Canteen EFTPOS Facilities

We are very pleased to announce, the school canteen now has EFTPOS facilities available for student purchases. There are two dedicated EFTPOS payment windows, one for hot food and one for cold food. These windows are clearly marked and there is a \$4 minimum spend for all EFTPOS purchases. Cash purchases will **NOT** be accepted at the EFTPOS windows.

School Uniform

As the term draws to a close, we notice some students are not wearing correct school uniform on a regular basis. As a school, we pride ourselves in our school uniform and require students to wear the correct school uniform **at all times**. Active wear, such as tights/leggings are **NOT** part of the CTHS uniform and therefore, should **not** be worn to school.

The PE uniform is allowed to be worn for the whole day on Thursdays for Years 9-11 **only**. Year 7 and 8 students are required to change into their PE uniform for PE and sport classes, then back into their full summer or winter uniform for all other lessons.

If, for any reason, your child is not able to wear full school uniform, you must provide a signed parental note explaining the reason for the variation. Students who are not in full school uniform, without an explanation note from their parents, will be issued a lunchtime detention. If students are persistently out of school uniform, parents will be notified and the child will be sent home to change into the appropriate uniform, then return to school.

L'Oréal Girls in Science Excursion to the University of New South Wales

One of the major events for girls, Australian L'Oréal-UNESCO for Women in Science Forum was held at the UNSW campus, Clancy Auditorium on 13 November. Eleven girls from CTHS attended this excursion with Mrs Somasi.

The event was inaugurated by the Dean of Science, Professor Emma Johnston, who is a Marine Biologist.

The girls had the opportunity to listen to leading scientists who spoke about their scientific interests and the discoveries they had made. Each scientist gave a short presentation which was highly engaging and showcased their careers.

Other scientists who attended the event were; Dr Alisa Glukhova, a Structural Biologist from Monash University; Dr Solon, a Nutritional Biologist from University of Sydney; Dr Sung, a Paediatrician and Research Fellow from Murdoch Research Institute; and Dr Anderson, a Paediatrician Research Fellow at the University of Auckland. These scientists carried out research on proteins targeting diseases, genetic hearing loss in babies and obesity in children under five.

Our students showed great interest and passion for Science and were delighted and inspired by the many speeches about the research and experiences of these female scientists. There were discussions about how young women can pursue further study or careers in Science.

Our students also participated in the discussion forum. After the forum, students went on a tour around the UNSW campus, guided by current Science students and were each given sample bags. They also had the chance to participate in activities hosted by UNSW Science.

Students learnt about various careers and university courses after Year 12. These ranged from Data Sciences, Computer Science, Biological Sciences, Chemical Sciences and Physics. This excursion is open to girls from Years 9-11, hopefully next year it will be even more popular.
