School Opal Card, Reminder to Tap on and off Message from Busways School Bus Service

In order to supply appropriate bus services to meet the school's needs, all students must tap on and tap off with their School Opal Cards when travelling to and from school.

Opal data, gathered by tapping on and off, is used to determine demand for bus services. If students **don't** tap on and tap off, services may be cancelled due the lack of recorded patronage.

Year 8 GAT Day

On Tuesday 3 December, 8T attended the Year 8 Gifted and Talented Day at Western Sydney University. The day started with a brief introduction to the activities and safety. After receiving lab coats and scientific reports to use during our activities, our class went to the Colour room. The first experiment in the Colour room was colouring white carnations with food dye using the property of xylems. The next experiment was chromatography of food dyes using ammonia and absorbent paper. The third experiment was observing the change in pH levels with universal indicator when hydrogen peroxide and iodide mix. The last activity was a demonstration of permanganate fire, which is when potassium permanganate and glycerol come into contact and cause a flame.

The second room was the Create room, where we made crystal gardens using inorganic salts in sodium silicate, and slime out of polyvinyl alcohol. We also examined how egg proteins affect the stability of air-liquid foams by looking at their bubbles. In the last experiment, we looked at how nylon was produced through a demonstration.

The last room was the Cool room, where we first observed the properties of dry ice, by testing the pH when the amount of dry ice is increased, slowly blowing up a glove using dry ice and extinguishing a candle flame using carbon dioxide gas. The next activity was a demonstration, where a flexible rubber tube was placed in liquid nitrogen, which then shattered after it was struck with a hammer, due to the decrease in temperature.

We ended the day with ice cream which was made from liquid nitrogen and tasted just as good as normal ice cream.

The Year 8 GAT Day at UWS was an opportunity for us to look at many different aspects of Science through hands-on experiments and demonstrations. Thank you Ms Yang for giving our class this great experience.

Technology Award Recipients Year in Review

Technology was a subject I looked forward to every week. In the first term we learnt various techniques and skills essential in the kitchen. We made many types of food including toasty eggs, muffins as well as honey jumbles. In the kitchen we also taste-tested many types of milk and honey. In textiles we let our creativity drive us. We created pillows and brought old, unneeded fabric which we transformed into a patch worked pillow. From this we learnt skills of measuring, cutting and mainly sewing. We also watched educational videos (war on waste) which taught us about the use of fabric and how it's taking a toll on the environment. In the last semester we did Woodwork. From Woodwork I learnt the basic skills of working with wood. Some of these things include sanding (using both a disc sander and hand sanding) as well as using the drill. We created a jewellery box and a cam toy. It was a fun enjoyable activity that tested our ability's. Overall this year in technology was fun and I learnt new things.

This year I undertook Technology, Food and Textiles classes and I thoroughly enjoyed each lesson. In food tech, we were taught various cutting techniques for different vegetables, which we were required to utilise in all practical lessons. The practical lessons were my favourite, as we were instructed to follow a recipe with team members, to cook a dish. This improved my confidence, socialising skills, task allocation and encouraged me to cook more often at home. Theory tasks comprised of preparing for the next project or researching qualities of foods from around the world. The two main projects were the biscuit design task, where our creative skills were tested and the MRR task, where we felt like contestants on the MKR show. In food technology, each lesson taught me something new, which I will remember for when I cook in the future.

In semester 2, I studied Textiles. We were instructed about functioning the machine, sewing in a straight line and learning different colouring/styling techniques. PROCEDURE FOR EARLY LEAVERS

If a student needs to leave school early, they **must** provide a note from their parent/guardian giving reasons for their partial absence. **The student must hand the note in at the student window before 8.30am** where they will be issued with a leave pass. They can then present this pass to their teacher and leave school at the appropriate time.

On Thursdays (sport days) all students in Years 9-11 **MUST** have their early leave notes signed by a member of the PE staff before presenting to the office.

Parking Rules


Please park safely and legally on the streets around your school. Park legally so you do not incur parking fines and demerit points. Council's Traffic Compliance Officers enforce parking around schools. If you park contrary to the road rules you will be fined!

You cannot stop or park your vehicle:



Within 10m of an intersecting road at an intersection without traffic lights (20m with traffic lights), unless a sign states you can park there (see image at left).

PENALTIES FROM: \$344 Demerit Points apply



Within 20m before and 10m after a bus stop (see image)

PENALTIES FROM: \$268
Demerit Points apply in School Zone


Parallel parking

This is the usual way to park unless signs tell you otherwise. You must park in the same direction as the adjacent traffic and parallel and as close as possible to the kerb.



You can NOT park across driveways or pedestrian kerb ramps. A vehicle can be parked up to the wings on the driveways or ramp (see image)

PENALTIES FROM: \$268
Demerit Points apply in School Zone



You should park at least one metre from any other parked vehicle and entirely within any marked parking lines where provided (see image)

PENALTIES FROM: \$114


