DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

COVID-19 (Coronavirus) Update

We continue to keep an eye on matters related to the COVID-19 virus. The Department of Education is in contact regularly and I have included the latest update from them with regards to our approach in *Network*.

Just to update the parent body on how serious we are taking this matter, Mr Johnson reluctantly made the decision on Thursday to cancel the Year 11 Jindabyne Camp in Week 10 due to concerns about the possible transmission of COVID-19.

We have made this difficult decision in the light of recommendations made by the School of Medicine and Public Health, University of Newcastle (one of the world leaders in the field of understanding the transmission of infectious diseases) and information provided by the NSW Health Department and Department of Education.

In a camp situation, such as the one at Jindabyne, should a student exhibit signs of COVID-19, it would be very difficult to isolate the student. It would also be very difficult to have parents collect the student in a timely manner due to the distances involved.

All Year 11 students were informed of this on Thursday and a letter went home to parents of students in Year 11 explaining further details with regards to refunds. We apologise wholeheartedly, but want to assure our parent body that we are constantly assessing activities here with the best interests of your children and our staff in mind.

With this in mind, can I please ask all parents - if your child is ill in the morning prior to school please DO NOT send them to school. Our sick bay is struggling under the weight of children who are reporting to the front office with sickness and to find out they were ill prior to coming to school makes the work of our first aid officers increasingly more difficult.

Q&A - Monday 9 March

On Monday evening we had four staff and 22 of our Student Executive and Sport leaders attend a taping of the ABC Q & A program - titled 'Education: Are we failing?' The panel included our own Mr Woo, who acquitted himself well on the night. Feedback from the students was very positive and if you had the chance to watch the show you would be aware there were a number of shots of the audience with our students looking lovely in their blazers. A great opportunity for our students to be involved in a quality current affairs program. A big thank you goes to Mrs Lees, Ms Adamou and Ms Brahe for organising our involvement in the show on a very tight timeline and supervising them on the night. If you didn't see the show you can still catch it on ABC iView – it's certainly worth a look. A more detailed report follows in *Network*.

Interestingly enough, there were also a number of CTHS Alumni spotted in the audience, including our own Harry Sedha (graduated 2017), who asked the first question to the panel members. Great to see our ex-students taking such an active interest in current affairs and speaking up on an important topic!

It provides a means for parents to check on the progress of their son/daughter mid-way through Term 1. This is not a formal report, formal reports will follow towards the end of Semester 1. Year 7 and 11 Interim Reports will simply indicate if your child is 'Satisfactory' or not at this point in time. If your child's teachers have concerns about their progress, details will be provided in the Interim Report. We encourage you to speak to your son or daughter if concerns are raised.

The Australian Government has announced on 11 March 2020 that travel restrictions will be introduced for travellers arriving from Italy. Staff and students who are excluded from a school or workplace are those who departed from or transited through:

- · China within the last 14 days
- Iran within the last 14 days commencing 1 March 2020
- Republic of Korea (South Korea) commencing 5 March 2020
- Italy commencing 11 March 11

OR

- have been diagnosed with the COVID-19
- have had close contact with a confirmed case of COVID-19 infection.

Tell Them From Me student feedback survey (Term 1, 2020)

I am delighted that this term, our school, like many other public schools in the state, will participate in a Department of Education initiative: the *Tell Them From Me* student feedback survey. The survey measures factors that are known to affect academic achievement and other student outcomes. The focus of the NSW-wide survey is on student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices.

The survey is a great opportunity for our students to provide us with valuable and quick feedback on what they think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. More than 6,300 schools in Australia and around the world have used *Tell Them From Me* to survey 5.4 million students. Capturing the voices of our students will help improve how we do things at our school.

I want to assure you that the survey is confidential. The survey is conducted online and will typically take less than 30 minutes to complete. It will be administered during school hours between 9 March and 8 May. Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary.

Tell Them <u>From</u> Me student survey: Information and consent form for parents and carers



Dear Parents and Carers

In Term 1 2020, our school is taking part in the *Tell Them From Me* student survey. The survey will provide us with valuable feedback on what our students think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. Schools in Australia and around the world have used the *Tell Them From Me* survey to help them improve. The survey is completed online and is run by an independent research company, **The Learning Bar**, which specialises in school-based surveys.

Staff in schools will <u>not</u> be able to identify individual students from their responses. To ensure confidentiality, participating students will receive a unique username and password. Where fewer than five students respond to a question, the results will be suppressed. The survey typically takes 30 minutes or less to complete and will be administered by the school during normal school hours. Once the surveys are completed by students, reports are prepared and in most cases are available to schools within three business days.

As well as schools getting student feedback, the Department of Education, through the Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation (CESE), has access to data from across NSW and is running a research project to look at state-wide patterns of student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices. The research is looking at how these things impact on student outcomes, including academic performance. Individual students will **not** be identified in any CESE publications, and all information will be handled in accordance with the relevant privacy legislation. Students' personal information will not be disclosed by the department to any other person or body other than as required by law.

This research will help schools in New South Wales to better understand how to improve student wellbeing and engagement. It will also help teachers and principals discuss what works to improve student outcomes.

Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary. Your child will not take part if either you or your child do not wish. If, during the survey, your child is uncomfortable, he/she can choose to stop the survey at any time. The majority of questions in the survey can be skipped.

If you **do not want your child to take part** in the survey, please complete the attached form and return it to the school by Friday 27 March.

Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation

1. What is the *Tell Them From Me* student survey?

The Tell Them From Me student survey asks questions about factors that are known to affect academic achievement and other outcomes. It aims to help improve the learning outcomes of students. The survey is designed to measure, assess and report insights from the student point of view at the school and system levels. The focus of this NSW survey is on student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices.

2. What kind of questions will the survey ask?

The survey questions relate to the following measures for **primary schools**:

3. How have schools been selected to take part?

The survey is open to all NSW government schools at no cost to them. Your child's school has decided to participate.

4. How will taking part in this survey benefit my child's school?

The Tell Them From Me student survey will provide school principals and school leaders with insight into student engagement, wellbeing and effective teaching practices at their school, from the perspective of students.

Data collected from the survey responses are quickly compiled into reports for school leaders. Principals can then use this information to help them identify emerging issues and plan for school improvement.

5. What does my child need to do to participate in the survey?

The survey typically takes less than 30 minutes and is conducted entirely online through a secure website operated by the survey developers, *The Learning Bar.* Schools will make computers or laptops available so that students can complete the survey during school hours.

6. Does my child have to participate?

No, participation in the survey is optional. Your child will not take part if either you or your child do not wish. If, during the survey, your child is uncomfortable, he/she can choose to stop the survey at any time. The majority of questions in the survey can be skipped. Parents/students have a right to apply for access to, and correction of, a student's information.

7. Will the school be able to identify my child from their responses?

Staff in schools will not be able to identify individual students from their responses. To ensure confidentiality, participating students will receive a unique username and password. Where fewer than five students respond to a question, the results will not be made available.

A small number of staff in the department's Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation (CESE) will have access to individual student responses for the purpose of state-wide analysis. Individual students' data will be held on a secure server with access strictly limited to CESE researchers. The researchers are interested in trends only – not in individual student responses. No student will be identified in any publication. No school will be identified unless they have given permission.

8. What sort of analysis will be done on the survey data?

Once the surveys are completed by students, reports are prepared and in most cases are available to schools within three business days. School leaders can use the data to better understand the experiences and views of students at their school.

CESE will undertake state-wide analysis of the survey data in conjunction with existing student data held by the department, including performance data.

The results will help all schools better understand the relationship between wellbeing, engagement, effective teaching and student learning. Results from CESE's analysis of this data will also help teachers and principals discuss what works to improve student outcomes. This supports the department's continuing focus on quality teaching and leadership. The data will be retained for future analysis to help us better understand the nature of student engagement and wellbeing over time.

9. Can all school students participate in the survey?

The primary school survey is designed for students in Years 4 to 6. Schools are encouraged to allow as many students as possible in these year groups to participate. Secondary schools are encouraged to allow as many students as possible in Years 7 to 12 to participate.

10. When will the *Tell Them From Me* survey happen?

The surveys will be conducted in all participating schools at the end of Term 1 and (optionally) Term 3/4.

What is The Learning Bar?

The Learning Bar specialises in research-based design and facilitation of student assessments and survey solutions for both primary and secondary students. The in-house research team led by the President, Dr J Douglas Willms, undertakes extensive projects used in the school system to affect national policy. It is against this research that the survey, Tell Them From Me, has become the largest national school survey in Canada, used in nine of the ten provinces. Globally, more than 6,300 schools and 5.4 million students have participated in the survey over the last twelve years.

Dr Willms recently held the Tier 1 Canada Research Chair in Literacy and Human Development. He plays a lead role in the development of questions on student engagement for the OECD's Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA).

For purely administrative purposes, *The Learning Bar* will also have temporary access to identifiable student responses to the survey questions. Other than *The Learning Bar* and CESE researchers within the department, identifiable student responses will not be disclosed to any other person or body other than as required by law.
