DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



Meeting with Year 11 and 12 Students

Mr Johnson took the opportunity to speak to Year 11 and 12 students today during separate assemblies, with students seated appropriately socially distanced. He spoke about a number of matters, now students are back at school after the period of 'learning from home', including:

- The importance of regular attendance and wearing the correct uniform
- Ensuring an appropriate attitude to learning in class
- Appropriate use of social media.

Just this week, you would all be aware of the dreadful circumstances which have besieged the United States of America, with the death of George Floyd at the hands of the State Police and the ensuing protests and civil disobedience which followed. This has been reported on, not only in our own media, but also through a range of social media outlets. Whilst we all have an opinion on the events of this week, many of these social media posts are asking people to become more active than what they naturally would like to. We have asked our students, your children, to be kind to one another during this difficult time and to not force people to engage with social media in a way they may not be comfortable with.

Online safety

As a result of COVID-19 and social distancing measures, there has been an increase in everyone's online activities of late. I have included a resource for parents in *Network* this week with links to some pertinent websites and helpful hints. This guide is developed for parents and carers to learn about online safety and how to help children have safe online experiences.

P&C Executive Meeting

Due to the situation with COVID-19, we had to cancel this week's P&C General Meeting. However, the Executive Meeting went ahead as planned via Zoom. Pleasingly, the P&C are still working behind the scenes to ensure the school receives the ongoing support of parents we've come to expect.

External Validation

Each year, a group of schools are nominated to participate in an external validation process. This provides an opportunity for schools to discuss, with a panel of peers, their judgements regarding the way they operate and the evidence which supports this. We were aware of our involvement in this process at the beginning of this year. However, the COVID-19 situation pushed our peer assessment meeting date back to 29 October 2020. As an update, I can inform you the Executive staff have had ongoing discussions regarding the process of self-evaluation and, once designated teams have been finalised, the earnest work of finding, selecting and analysing specific data/evidence to support our self-assessment will follow.

Super Mega Happy Week

One of the annual activities run by the Student Executives, which has a long-standing tradition at CTHS, is Super Mega Happy Week (SMHW). The term, 'the show must go on!' certainly rings true of late and SMHW is no exception to this. I can confirm, students will have the opportunity to participate in the following activities next week, although slightly differently to normal due to social distancing requirements.

- Monday 8 June: Queen's Birthday Public Holiday
- Wednesday 10 June: *Mufti Day* themed *Comfy in Quarantine*. Gold coin donations will be given to the Corona Relief effort in third world countries.

Borrowing limits are as follows: Years 7-10, six items Years 11-12, ten items, plus audio and eBooks.



Maximise your employment prospects while you study!

Get Work Experience Early

Employers value experience – all experience. Think about the skills you have learned from all of your casual and part-time jobs – these are transferable skills and can be built into your resume.

Start Reviewing Job Ads

Look for interesting positions, for the language used in job ads, for names of companies who advertise the jobs that interest you. Sources might include newspapers, online job boards such as Seek, Indeed and LinkedIn

Join Student Organisations and Professional Associations

Many jobs are not advertised but are filled through networking. Making contacts through these types of organisations can get your name out there if you are looking for work or work experience.

Become Known to Teachers and Faculty

Academic staff are important as references.

Attend Seminars and Workshops

Take advantage of all learning opportunities that are offered at your educational institution – you may not get credit for them but they will help you get a job.

Get References from your Employers

This includes all part-time and casual work and work experience.



Start Working on your Resume - Early

Develop your basic resume and keep updating it with new skills and jobs so it is ready at short notice when you need it. Lead time for some job applications can be very short. Use a Portfolio approach so you can so you can include examples of your work (if appropriate).

Good Results do Impress Employers

It doesn't matter what you have studied, employers will view your application more favourably if you have good results. However, many employers also look for evidence that demonstrate skills such as communication skills, social skills, leadership, etc
