Girls in Technology Award

You may remember in the first week of Term 4 we had three ex-students/CTHS Alumni who presented to Year 10 students on the topic *Women in Technology*. All three young women are dynamic leaders in the field of Technology, working for Microsoft. Pleasingly, we had a number of Year 10 students submit applications for the Inaugural CTHS Girls in Technology Award. The judging panel met this week and were very impressed with the

quality of the students' submissions. An announcement regarding the winners will be made soon, with the overall winner awarded \$200 and the top three candidates achieving a mentorship from our three CTHS Alumni women through Microsoft.

NSW Schools' Constitutional Convention

On Monday, I participated in the 26th Annual NSW Schools' Constitutional Convention, connecting through live conference to the NSW Parliament's legislative assembly. The focus was on debating the relevance of the Australian Constitution in contemporary society, particularly in responding to national crises. Despite the fact the conference was held online due to COVID-19 restrictions, it remained an enjoyable and informative experience, with highlights being discussions with the Hon. Jonathan O'Dea MP, speaker of the NSW Legislative Assembly, and Professor of Constitutional Law Anne Twomey.

The information we gained from Prof. Twomey's address will prove invaluable in devising my application for the 2021 National Constitutional Convention, a three-day forum held in Canberra, in which we have to come up with an extended response to the question, "How has the Australian Constitution remained relevant during 2020?" Nevertheless, the experience was one I'm glad to have been invited to partake in.

Cherrybrook Students win Australian Youth Aerospace Scholarships

Raytheon Australia has supported a series of scholarships for students as an ongoing investment in STEM for young Australian students. To apply for this scholarship, students in Years 10-12 submitted a written application, expressing their interest in the Aerospace industry, with a resumé and, if they progressed to the second round, recorded and submitted a short video of themselves.

Kaylee Li and Angad Chawla (Year 11/12) were successful in winning this scholarship and will each receive \$1,000. This money will go towards their education and aid in their professional development in Scientific fields, possibly in the Aerospace industry!

Only fifteen students were selected in the final round. A big congratulations to both these keen students!

L'Oréal Women in Science Workshop

On 26 October 2020, twelve girls from Years 10-11, supervised by Mrs Yang and Ms Herat, participated in the L'Oréal UNESCO, Women in Science' initiative via a virtual platform. It was a highly informative and inspiring session. The primary purpose of this session was to encourage and support more women in the Scientific field and to assist them as they progress in their careers. Issues were discussed, such as the low percentage of females compared to males in Science careers, particularly in Engineering despite the consistent high performances of females in their school years. These facts were mainly discussed by five highly qualified speakers, Adele Morrison, Dr Emma Camp, Dr Kate Nguyen, Dr Marzi Barghamadi and Dr Shari Gallop, who have all specialised in various fields across Science. Another important aspect covered in this session was climate change and what we should do about it. This was followed up by essential questions, like the protection of our Great Barrier Reef corals from extreme temperatures and how to carry out sustainable practices.

Adele Morrison, from the Australian National University, studies ocean currents around Antarctica using computer modelling. Her predictions of humanity and global implications '1.1m of sea level rise by the end of the century, equating to over 600 million people living below the projected high tide line.' Due to the current rate of global warming and climate change was very confronting, bringing our attention to the fact we must act immediately.

From environmental climate change to heavy chemistry, Dr Marzi Barghamadi, working at CSIRO, addressed the issue of climate change by accelerating the use of renewable energy by creating the next generation of Lithium batteries. By replacing fossil fuels with these highly energy efficient batteries, they aim to reduce carbon emissions drastically, particularly in the transport sector, hence combatting climate change.

Another aspect due to climate change are the recent dangerous bushfires we have experienced, particularly in Australia. Dr Kate Nguyen, from the RMIT University, Melbourne, addressed this problem through her research in Chemical and Civil Engineering by developing a ceramic sustainable coating which fire-proofs houses. She aims to have this break-through coating available within a year, thereby helping thousands in fire-stricken areas.

With all the unprecedented events which have occurred in this unusual year, along with climate change, it is important to prepare ourselves and others, promote more women to enter these enthralling and paramount fields of Science.

PROCEDURE FOR EARLY LEAVE


We recognise Aboriginal Australians' continuing connection to the country, water and community. We pay our respect to elders, past, present and emerging.

NAIDOC Week is being held this year from 8-15 November. This years' theme is *Always was, always will be*, which reflects the connection Aboriginal peoples have had and continue to have with the land. The poster, titled Shape of Land, was designed by Noongar and Saibai Islander Tyrown Waigana. He describes the poster as the following:

"The Rainbow Serpent is represented by the snake and it forms the shape of Australia, which symbolises how it created our lands. The colour from the Rainbow Serpent is reflected on to the figure to display our connection to the Rainbow Serpent, thus our connection to country. The overlapping colours on the outside is the Dreamtime. The figure inside the shape of Australia is a representation of Indigenous Australians showing this country since the dawn of time, always was, and always will be Aboriginal land."

Students will be exploring this theme in their HSIE classes over the next week.

Correct Procedure When Approaching a Pedestrian Crossing

As you approach a pedestrian crossing or children's crossing where a School Crossing Supervisor is displaying a 'STOP Children Crossing' sign, you must slow down and stop. You may proceed when the School Crossing Supervisor no longer displays the sign in your direction or has indicated it is safe for you to proceed.

Stop signs may be placed at an intersection immediately after a pedestrian crossing. You must stop at the stop sign even if you have already stopped at the pedestrian crossing.



Please Note: If the road beyond a children's crossing or pedestrian crossing is blocked, you **MUST NOT** drive onto the crossing.
