DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

NAIDOC Week and Remembrance Day

As Cherrybrook Technology High School, we acknowledge that we are on Dharug and Guringai land, whose people are the traditional custodians of the land we learn on. The cultures and customs of all nations, particularly the Dharug, Dharawal and Guringai, have nurtured and continue to nurture this land since the Dreaming. This always was and always will be Aboriginal land. We recognise Aboriginal Australians' continuing connection to the country, water and community. We pay our respect to elders, past, present and emerging.

This week marks NAIDOC week 2020. The theme is *Always Was, Always Will Be* and reflects the connection Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have had with the land. This week many students received specific lessons relating to Aboriginal culture, predominantly in their HSIE classes. An experience many seem

to have enjoyed. One concept, which has been explored during classes has been the connection between our land, Australia and the part our First Peoples of Australia contributed during conflict both inside and outside of Australia, which is particularly pertinent this week since NAIDOC Week coincides with Remembrance Day.

I have included an excerpt from a lesson which was delivered to our Year 9 students. The class focusses on the Aboriginal Peoples' connection to Country and role in warfare. The picture below, titled *Kulatangku angakanyini manta munu Tjukurpa (Country and Culture will be protected by spears),* hangs in the foyer of the Australian War Memorial. It is a reflection on the image by one of the artists, Frank Young.



There is a connection that Anangu [Western Desert language—speaking Aboriginal people] have with Country. It is one of the most important responsibilities looking after Country, protecting Country, and keeping Country safe. The Ancestors handed down this responsibility, and it is as important today as it was hundreds of years ago. It is a particular man that will risk his life for Country. Since the Boer War Aboriginal soldiers have fought alongside so many non-Indigenous soldiers, together with one goal to protect this Land. An ocean of blood has been lost for Australia...

...We want to remember our ancestors who have passed. We want to remember those people because we know that in other places they went to war, they come back or they got killed fighting for country. This war memorial you fellas got, we want to do the same: remember our people, what they did, what they fought.

Stage 4 HSIE classes have also been exploring this year's NAIDOC theme by using virtual reality. Using resources provided by the Aboriginal Heritage Office based in Guringai area, students were able to virtually explore Aboriginal carving sites and rock art from around northern Sydney. Through this, they considered how Aboriginal connection to Country is maintained and expressed.

The first of the cohort assemblies was held on Friday afternoon in the MPC. To align with COVID-19 restrictions, social distancing measures were applied and the event was kept brief. Students were recognised for their achievements across the Preliminary Courses, having all now commenced their HSC learning. Whilst all the major awards for students will be presented at the Presentation Night Ceremony on 8 December, it is still essential, particularly in the context of a large school, to recognise student achievement. Vaping

Recently in the press, there have been reports about the prevalence of vaping among teens. This is also an issue for us at CTHS, with a range of students participating in this activity. Whilst the long-term effects of vaping are not yet clear, there is strong evidence to suggest, e-cigarettes are not without risk. The facts are, there are a number of hazardous substances present in vapes, notably formaldehyde, acetaldehyde and acrolein, which are known to cause cancer. However, the ingredients can vary from one product to another.

Vapes can vary in their appearance and are often mistaken for other items such as pens, memory sticks and cigarettes themselves. Vapes can also contain nicotine and other illicit substances, although it is illegal to sell these in NSW. We would ask parents to be vigilant and proactive in having conversations with their teenagers about the risks, as well as having an awareness of the CTHS and DoE policy regarding the use and sale of these items, which falls under the same criteria as cigarettes.

Cherrybrook Technology High School Vaccination Clinic Friday 27 November 2020

Year 7 Human Papillomavirus Vaccine (Dose 2)

Catch-up vaccinations for absent Year 7, 8 and 10 will be done at any subsequent clinic, dependent on the interval between doses.

There is no need to go to the GP for these vaccines.

Parents will be contacted regarding catch-up vaccinations.

NSW Health is ensuring students are safely vaccinated at school during COVID-19

NSW Health has been working with education authorities to implement additional measures to ensure students in Year 7 and 10 can be safely vaccinated during the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite concerns around COVID-19, it is important the School Vaccination Program continues, to provide timely protection against other diseases.

- NSW Health will be offering Human Papillomavirus (HPV) dose 2 vaccinations to all Year 7 students on Friday 27 November 2020.
- Also, Meningococcal ACWY vaccine will be available for Year 10 students who haven't yet been
 vaccinated.

Additional Measures

NSW Health has implemented additional measures, based on expert clinical advice, to reduce the likelihood of COVID-19 transmission in school clinics, including:

- · Health screening of nurses before clinics
- Pre-vaccination screening of students
- Physical distancing restrictions at the clinic entrance, in the clinic and in the observation area
- . Ensuring the number of students and nurses at the clinic does not exceed the maximum allowed
- · Enhanced hand hygiene by nurses
- · Enhanced environmental cleaning of all surfaces.

What parents should do

Parents who have given consent for their child to receive vaccinations at school do not need to take any extra action. Parents who have **NOT** provided consent should contact the school on how to consent for vaccination or their local public health unit on 1300 066 055. *Parents must ensure their child is well and completely free of any acute respiratory illness before they attend school.*

Trust is an important part of any relationship. It represents your belief in someone's good sense, ability or honesty. As your child gets older and starts becoming more independent, it can be difficult to find the balance between a teenager's need for independence and privacy, and your need to know what's happening to keep them safe. Find out how you can stay involved in your child's life through building a trusting relationship.

This could help if you:

- · Want to understand why building trust is so important
- Are concerned about your child breaking your trust
- · Want to learn how to develop mutual trust with your child.

Why is building trust with your teenager important?

Your child needs your trust to help them in their transition through to adulthood. However, this trust needs to be mutual. You and your child need to meet in the middle and develop a healthy way to trust in each other and each of your decisions. Remember that the more this mutual trust is tested, the longer it will take to get to a place where you are both confident you can trust each other. A relationship without trust leads to second-guessing and questioning each other's honesty. When your child was young they probably trusted you unequivocally, as the person that kept them safe.

However, as children grow up and become more independent, they start to notice and question more. It's around this time that your child may notice whether you do what you say you will do, which is a key factor in building trust. As a parent, you can't demand trust. It's a gradual process that requires mutual commitment and it will inevitably strengthen your relationship. It will also set your child up to develop healthy relationships in the future. It's worth noting that teenagers are going through an intensely private time in their lives. Personal space becomes very important to them, so the desire for privacy doesn't always mean untrustworthy activity is taking place. It's important to keep that in mind.

Benefits of building trust with your teenager

By building a trusting relationship with your teenager, you're likely see many benefits, including:

- Your teenager feeling open and comfortable to talk to you about difficult things
- Your teenager demonstrating positive, trustworthy behaviours in other aspects of their life, setting them
 up for positive relationships into adulthood
- Building a relationship with your teenager that goes beyond a parent-child disciplinary relationship, and strengthening your bond for years to come.

What if my child breaches my trust?

Breaches of trust are to be expected, especially as your child starts to push boundaries to test their independence. Depending on the impact of their actions you should work with them to decide on appropriate consequences, which could range from a simple chat about your expectations, through to removal of privileges while they show that they can rebuild trust. Remember that as a parent, you're the most important role model in your child's life, and it's vital that you demonstrate honesty and trustworthiness, in order to teach your child how you expect them to behave.

Talk to them about the importance of honesty and trust, but also make sure it's reflected in your actions. If your child repeatedly breaks your trust without showing any signs of remorse or if they show self-destructive behaviours, it might be time to seek help from a professional, such as a Counsellor or Psychologist, as this could indicate other underlying issues. Consider connecting with other parents in your community to reliably stay informed about your child's activities and friends.
